Dear Friends,

'I pray that God, the source of all hope will fill you completely with joy and peace because you believe in Him, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope.' Romans 15: 13

In the regular canon of my reflections, this one is (perhaps mercifully to some), short! Yet, it is amongst the hardest for me to write, as it is my last as your rector before I leave for my new ministry in Devon.

It brings with it a sense of comfort to the bereaved as well as a source of anticipation and hope, both to the dying and those grieving. There is an active understanding of the individual participating in a profound journey heavenward. Those who remain on the first shore are blessed with an assurity of their loved one beginning a new life in heaven. The inverse is also true, in that the person who is on this divine adventure is guiding those they leave behind to follow their example of faithful living so they too might be saved. Death, therefore, is not the end. Through faith in Jesus Christ, we are saved by grace, unearned and undeserved, yet freely given in God's limitless love.

So, my dear and faithful friends, it is indescribably hard to say farewell. Yet, as I face a new horizon, I have the reassurance in Jesus Christ that all shall be well for you and I entrust you all into His safekeeping. These past almost ten years, you have blessed me and my family with your fellowship and hospitality. We have all grown together and have flourished in the love and grace of Christ. And now I am literally en route to a new shoreline on the Kingsbridge Estuary. And you look forward to the next chapter in the faith journey of The Downs Benefice as you welcome the next, as yet unknown, incumbent and their family to your hearts.

Together we will continue to grow as the body of Christ; His church here on earth being refined and renewed by His Holy Spirit, ever one body, ever one heart. May our adventure to new shores bring us all closer to God and closer to each other in the assurance of His eternal love.

Report from the meeting held on 12th Sept 2023 The Parish Council met in the Colonel Jenkins Memorial Hall, with County &Borough Councillor Drew, and one members of the public attended.

The minutes of the April meeting were agreed & signed.

Finances were presented by the Responsible Finance Officer. They showed a surplus remains pending work on the War memorial restoration. The PC confirmed details on opening an online banking account, and discussed options for insurance quotes, which are one of the largest items of annual expense.

Regarding planning the PC were informed of planning applications that have been approved by TVBC including the sub-division of existing residential plot at Lytchet and erection of a two storey detached dwelling.

The PC had previously objected to this on the grounds that the housing needs survey had identified a need in the village for more smaller houses rather than another large dwelling.

Reporting on Special projects and Cllrs portfolios:

War Memorial – Cllr Bryant reported progress the War Memorial restoration, with a quote for a granite plaque to record the names of those on the memorial that are crumbling. He is seeking further quotes;& options before a decision is made.

Purvers Patch - Cllr Newell reported that although work has been done on Purvers Patch it is still overgrown. Without any volunteers to keep up the maintenance the lengthsman will be asked to help.

Wherwell Playing Fields – Cllr Hutton reported on the good work done by Shooters Football Club on grounds maintenance, but also the problems with trying to get the tennis court fencing replaced.

Wherwell Primary School has had a a lot of refurb; decoration over the summer ready for the new term, including all new desks for the children donated by a private School.

HCC &; Borough Cllr Drew presented his reports to the PC, The new Queen Elizabeth Memorial Copse has been planted and opened at Upper Clatford.

Only one school in Hampshire (in Basingstoke) is impacted by RAAC concrete issues.

HCC is partnering for a group-buying scheme for green energy called Solar Together 2023.

Regarding other matters, Cllrs discussed an update on community benefit discussions with Wherwell Solar Farm by a residents group who met with the potential developers.

An offer has been proposed for a cash-based community fund equivalent to £10k pa to Wherwell PC and £5k pa to Chilbolton PC for a period of up to 40 years of operation. There may be an option for a single up front payment rather than annual payments. Cllrs discussed the options, and supported an up-front payment, but queried the split between the two Parish Councils, and queried how to calculate an amount and how to decide if it was best value.

The next scheduled meeting will be the Parish Assembly which will take place on Tuesday 14th November at 7:00 pm, to which local residents are welcome to attend and bring any comments or concerns.

LOOKING AFTER THE COMMON – A place for water to go.

The Common, as well as being a lovely place to walk is very important for another reason - it helps with flooding. Water has to have places to go and when it is very wet and the ground water levels rise the Common gets good and soggy as we know. It's meant to! It's part of the water budget of our area; it sops up the excess, stopping it from going down stream and flooding other places. It also copes with runoff from the village streets. A little stream called the Abbotts stream rises in the Village in Frog Lane collecting all the surface water from Martins lane and Winchester street. It flows under the sleeper bridge on the Common and takes it down to the Purleygig Leader. Another drain takes water from Drove Road down Joys Lane and to the Test beyond the Old Cottage. One further drain takes water from the greens opposite the shop, under the road and down another ditch to the Common. The Chilbolton Flood Advisory Group makes sure that Chilbolton Parish Council is fully aware of the health of all these essential water courses and that they and the culverts are flowing well. We have the help of Southern Water, Hampshire Highways, the lengthsman and George Whitefield and George Marits to do this, but we need more!!

The Abbotts stream gets choked with river vegetation. To make sure that it is doing its job preventing flooding in the village it is cleared every October. This is where the CPC Open Spaces Committee comes in. The Common is a Site of Special Scientific Interest so we are not supposed to use machinery. Over the years we have been indebted to Mervyn Sheldrake, Ian Daubney and our lengthsman for doing this, BUT it's too much for one person. This year we have been promised the help of Sparsholt College second year Countryside Management students on Mondays 25th Sept and October 2nd AND the wonderful Hampshire Conservation Volunteers will be there on Saturday 7th October.

All sorts of wriggly river creatures will turn up and if you and your family are around at lunchtime on the Mondays or on the Saturday morning please come and see what is happening and (wearing wellies of course!) join in!!

In October 'A Year in Provence' by Peter Mayle, and


In November 'Treasure Island' by Robert Louis Stevenson

Stockbridge Practice Patient News

We will be offering joint covid and flu vaccination appointments to patients aged 65 and over or in at-risk groups from 7 October 2023. Patients will also be able to book just the flu vaccination if they choose. If you receive a text invitation, please book online if using the link if you are able- this will keep the phone lines free for patients who do not have online access.

Children aged 2 and 3 years on 31 August are entitled to receive the nasal flu. You can contact the surgery to book this appointment or wait to receive an invitation.

Physiotherapy appointments

We are making some of our physiotherapy appointments available to patients to book online. These are for new joint problems in adults.

Shingles vaccination

There have been some changes to the national shingles programme. We will now be inviting patients as they turn 65 and 70 years of age. Unfortunately, if you are aged between 66-69 years of age you will have to wait until you turn 70 before becoming eligible.

If you are aged between 70-80 years of age and have not received the shingles vaccination, please contact the surgery to book an appointment.

NHS App

If you have the NHS App with notifications turned on you will start to see text messages sent by the surgery appear as notifications. If notifications are not read the message will revert to a text. This is a national change which has not been instigated by the surgery.

Test Valley Devons - Beef Cattle and Climate Change



Earlier this year we heard how, in the Winter months, Max Childs' herd of Red Devons grow thick coats and munch their way through hundreds of bales of straw to protect against the colder weather. The Devons are a reassuringly familiar feature of our local landscape, whether 'at home' on the farm in the Wallops, or grazing the pastures that line the Test. In fact, it is hard

to imagine how one could not welcome their presence.


And yet, it is widely reported in the media that the cattle farming industry at large contributes unnecessarily to climate change, partly through the expulsion by cattle of methane, a greenhouse gas that over time converts into CO², and partly because of the amount of carbon that goes into the production of feed and the fuel used to transport both feed and animals around the countryside. Is this a fair criticism of cattle farming, or is there another side to the story? The answer lies firstly in an important natural process, known as the biogenic carbon cycle and, secondly, in the critical difference between high and low intensity farming.

What is the biogenic carbon cycle?

The biogenic carbon cycle centres on the ability of plants to absorb and sequester carbon. Through the process of photosynthesis, plants absorb CO² from the atmosphere and deposit that carbon into plant leaves, roots, and stems, while oxygen is released back into the atmosphere. When plants perform photosynthesis, carbon is primarily converted to cellulose, a form of carbohydrate that is one of the main building blocks for growing plants. Cellulose content is particularly high in grasses and shrubs found on marginal lands, which are places where grains and other human edible crops cannot grow. Over 40% of all agricultural land in the UK is permanent grassland, full of cellulose dense grasses that are indigestible to humans – but not cattle. Cattle use the cellulose for growth, milk production, and other metabolic processes. As a by-product of consuming cellulose, cattle belch out methane, thereby returning that carbon sequestered by plants back into the atmosphere. After about ten years, that methane is broken down and converted back to CO².

Once converted to CO², plants can again perform photosynthesis and fix that carbon back into cellulose. From here, cattle can eat the plants and the cycle begins once again. In essence, the methane belched from cattle is not, therefore, adding new carbon to the atmosphere. Rather it is part



of the natural cycling of carbon through the biogenic carbon cycle.

Keeping carbon inputs and outputs in balance

With *intensive* cattle farming common in some parts of the world, for example, the USA, the area of grazing land is so small compared to the large number of cattle that the quantity of CO² absorbed by the land can never hope to balance out CO² from methane expulsion, feed production and transport. By contrast, in *extensive* farming, where a smaller number of cattle graze a wide area, there is ample scope for CO² sequestration from the soil, hedgerows, organic matter and woodland to offset the methane, as well any CO² emitted through the use of fuel, or in the production of cattle feed.

When we understand the biogenic carbon cycle, it is easy, therefore, to see how Test Valley Devons extensive farming methods of low input, conservation grazing, enables the organisation to achieve a carbon balance calculation that is environmentally positive – currently 8.52 tonnes per annum of CO² emitted, countered by 10.93 tonnes of carbon absorbed through sequestration. Not only do a small number of animals graze a large expanse of land, but the cattle feed purely on grass, meaning there is virtually no carbon used in food production and transport, other than in making sure hay bales are in the right place at the right time to provide Winter feed.



So far from their professional partners 1443 referrals have been received and they are feeding 3457 people of which nearly a third of this number are children She said that this year the squeeze on everyone's finances is now affecting donations. The Food Bank has received some generous cash donations which have enabled them to buy in food and essential toiletries but they are really concerned about the number of empty shelves that they now have in their warehouse.

News cutting about Mr Edwin Wallis – 45 Years a Gamekeeper



(1982) Mr. Edwin Wallis, of Wyfield, Chilbolton, died suddenly in Winchester Hospital on August 19th, two months after his 80th birthday. For 45 years, Mr. Wallis was well known as head gamekeeper of Manor Farm Estate.

Born at Kenner Farm, Dummer, near Basingstoke, he came to Chilbolton at six months old when his father became bailiff to Manor Farm.

Affectionately known, as "Eddie" by all who knew him, he was educated at Chilbolton and Andover Grammar Schools, leaving at 15 to help his father. Then, with his brother- in-law he went into

a greengrocery business at New Malden, Surrey, but a few years later returned as head Keeper to the estate.

He was very fond of wildlife and the estate at Manor Farm had one of the biggest and best partridge shoots in the country. Over 1500 birds were bagged in 1927, his first season, but due to the increase in mechanisation and pesticides, when he retired in 1972 the figure was as low as 30 brace a year. Eddie had held 436 shoots at Manor Farm.

Since 1930, Wyfield Cottage in Village Street, opposite the Village Hall, had been his home. For a time, Eddie was both water and gamekeeper, and in the late fifties found the World War II bomb in the River Test, at the foot of the downs in the place where children had paddled and swam for many years in a favourite village picnic and beauty spot.

Eddie was the last member of the Abbot's Mitre Evergreen Club, and seven years ago 77-year-old Mr. Vincent Reiss, of May Cottage, Wherwell, Mr. Percy Trodd, 88, of Mountainview, Wherwell (who helped build the pub in 1921) and Mr. Cecil Tiller, 75, of Windmill Cottage, Gravel Hill Crossroads, met Eddie at the pub bar and swopped twice weekly reminiscences of by-gone Chilbolton days, to the hilarious entertainment of all their friends.

At Manor Farm, he never had a day off through ill health and his long service was rewarded by the Country Land Owners' Association with a silver medal displaying a shooting dog and gun. He was also active in the community, serving nine years as Chairman of the Parish Council. For 17 years he was Treasurer and Secretary of the Village Hall Committee and for many years he served on the committee of Wherwell Home Guard Club. Until 1971 he was a Special with the Hampshire Constabulary with 33 years' service. He was one of the three bell ringers, who with Mr. Fred Eastman and Mr. Ted Smith, rang the church bells at many weddings over the years.
