*‘Even when you are old, I will be the same.

(Isaiah 46: 4)

Chatting to a friend recently, we were reminiscing about the beginning of our careers and I was reminded of my first day at The Bank of England in the heart of London’s Square Mile. Bright-eyed and bushy-tailed, I recall, among a plethora of other formal paperwork, being given a document advising me of my retirement date – 1<sup>st</sup> July 2023. I have a clear memory of feeling quite shocked and bemused by this date. It seemed such a long way off, and in the next century to boot. Somehow the years have all too quickly flown by and that distant event, once shrouded in the mists of time, suddenly feels a little too close for comfort! Yet help is at hand in and through the enduring love of God.

Growing old can be fraught with treacherous pitfalls – we are wise to be prepared. After all, we are aware that getting older is, hopefully, something of an inevitability. We know it is coming - it’s not as if we haven’t seen others reaching this stage of their lives before us. Isaiah’s prophesy speaks into this inexorable state of being. He points us back to the precious ‘spiritual insurance’ of our baptism and reminds us of God’s commitment to us as we began our life of faith through the steadfast wisdom of our loving earthly parents, or perhaps, through the faithfulness of others who cared for us by pointing us to Christ. Psalm 139 reassures us that we are wonderfully and fearfully made by our loving Father who knew every hair on our head before they were formed in our mothers’ wombs. He watches over our every movement and remains with us, even when we wander far away from Him.

Isaiah encourages us to remember, even from a young age, where we are headed: to recognise how our last chapters might also be our best - as our faith brings us to a place of peace and reconciliation with the Lord who has stayed with us through our rebellious and wayward years, and who yet longs for us to dwell in the rich bounty of His grace.

God cares for us from the womb to the tomb; from birth to death and through every season in-between. Our heavenly Father is not simply focussing on us as we traverse our first flush of youth, nor even as we

are storming our way through the prime of our lives. He is just as deeply invested in us as we advance into the frailty of old age, and on into the perfect bliss of eternity.

## **Wherwell Parish Council report from meeting held on 13<sup>th</sup> July 2021**

The Parish Council held its first meeting back in the Colonel Jenkins Memorial Hall and was joined by County & District Councillor Drew.

The minutes of the April meeting & planning meeting held in May were agreed & signed, there were no matters arising.

No financial report was given as there had been little change in the financial position since the last meeting. The PC agreed to register for online banking going forward.

Progress on the three special projects within the parish was discussed.

Cllr Bryant reported the frustratingly slow progress with the stone mason getting a price for the replacement stone needed for the War Memorial. It was agreed that a skip should be hired to put the remaining rubbish in from land at the junction of Beech Grove with the Old Hill. The fence posts have been put in place on the railway cutting side of the plot, but the wire netting has yet to be attached. A source of topsoil has been identified which will be used to level & improve the site. The project steering group are holding a meeting soon to establish how the project is going to be achieved & maintained going forward. No further progress on the permissive footpath running alongside the B3240, Winchester Rd., although the route is in use by residents.

Cllr Hasselmann gave an update on the greener villages group, which was a finalist in the best group category at the Hampshire & Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust annual awards. She & Cllr Newell had attended an interesting meeting hosted by Test Valley Association of Town & Parish Councils where presentations were given by the HIOW Wildlife Trust & the greener villages group. It was noted that the Trust have money available to groups to maintain & educate people about chalk streams.

Cllr Hutton reported that in September the pupil numbers are high at Wherwell School; it will be opening a 6<sup>th</sup> classroom for one year, and that the “bubble “system” will be relaxed. It was noted with some sadness that the Chilbolton Pre-School will be closing its doors after many years. The leadership team were thanked for all their care & dedication to the children & the support to the community & school. Sprat & Winkle nursery will be opening in September at the site so there will continue to be early years provision in the community.

### **HCC & TVBC Councillor Drew gave a report on matters at HCC:**

Carolyn Williamson has been selected to serve as the new Chief Executive for the Council. He added that HCC continues to face a total budget shortfall

of at least £80 million over the next two years.

**Waste Less:** Applications for the Hampshire Waste Prevention Community Grant Fund are invited from now until 6 September 2021. The fund is open to community, neighbourhood, voluntary groups, parish, and town councils. Applicants should discuss their ideas with the County Council's Waste Prevention Team before applying - email [waste.prevention@hants.gov.uk](mailto:waste.prevention@hants.gov.uk) to arrange an informal discussion. Grants are available for community projects which will introduce a new waste prevention, reuse or repair service to the local area - to help build a network of waste prevention services across the county. It is no longer possible to recycle glass at the HWRC in Andover. It was noted that the recycling area in Wherwell was working well in its new location at the Playing Fields & was well supported.

**Climate Change** Hampshire County Council's Cabinet are proposing a one off **£1.2m** spend on internal climate change pilot projects with a strong educational focus. These include decarbonisation of fleet vehicles (switching to electric or vegetable oil), additional tree planting, landscape regeneration, expansion of LED and solar PV installations. Many of these will be public facing to include the **Sir Harold Hillier's Climate Change Frontier Garden, the climate positive carbon negative River Hamble Country Park, and the food waste station at Royal Victoria County Park.**

With regard to TVBC Councillor Drew reported that several schools locally have had incidents of Covid-19 with groups of pupils having to self-isolate. The vaccination centre in Andover will be re-located from the Lights to the Chantry Centre. Cllr Drew added that he had attended the recent Civic Service in Romsey Abbey which celebrated volunteers and the work of PC's was highlighted. He also reported that TVBC had succeeded in getting a prison term for a fly-tipper in the region.

Two new planning applications in the Parish were considered by the PC which were supported. And updates were received on earlier applications.

Concerns have been raised about the state of the bus shelter due to the number of items being left in the bus shelter. Some of the items will be disposed of, and a more long-term solution will be discussed at the next meeting. Following the Housing needs survey a flyer for potential sites is to be produced which will reflect the survey's findings/ recommendations.

Three items of correspondence were considered: Email communications had been received regarding recent thefts in the community and occasional antisocial behaviour at the Wherwell Playing Fields. The possible

introduction of CCTV as a deterrent was raised however village PC's do not have responsibility for crime prevention, but it was agreed that the PC would invite a Crime Prevention Officer to a future meeting. It was also confirmed that the playing field committee was set up in 1950 and from its creation has always welcomed sports people and children from the wider community; it is a registered charity whose objective is the provision of sports and recreational facilities for the public.

The PC has been notified about unacceptable dog fouling in the Church yard & on the War Memorial green. Dog owners are reminded that it is an offence not to pick up after their dog has fouled. Some signs will be erected, and it was noted that there are bins located nearby at both sites.

An email had been received from a member of Chilbolton PC regarding current & future communication channels in both Parishes, Cllr Hasselmann will act as the liaison for the PC.

The next scheduled meeting will take place in Tuesday 14<sup>th</sup> September.



## **Wherwell Allotments** **- the fashionable way to relax and unwind**

Allotments have been in existence for hundreds of years, with evidence pointing back to Anglo-Saxon times. However, the system we recognise today has its roots in the nineteenth century, when land was given over to the labouring poor for the provision of food growing. The ‘Allotments and Cottage Gardens Compensation for Crops Act 1887’ obliged local authorities to provide allotments if there was a demand for them and at their peak during the second world war the UK boasted 1.4 million individual plots. Whilst that figure has since declined to 300,000, a combination of the pandemic and the general trend to sustainability appears to be re-igniting a passion for the hobby.

Chilbolton already has allotments in Martins Lane, but Wherwell lacked such a facility. Until 2020 that is, when Robert Lawrence, a long-standing resident of the village, decided to change things. With the support of the PC, he approached local landowner Tom Liddell about leasing a suitable plot and in 2020 Wherwell Allotments was created on farmland just off Fullerton Road, opposite Freelands.

There are eleven plots in all, comprising a total of 25 rods. A rod is a traditional way of measuring allotments derived from Anglo-Saxon farming practices. It was used to control a team of oxen when working on the land and measures 5.5 yards. Originally, plots were 10 square rods in size (10 x 5.5 x 5.5) as this area was required to produce enough vegetables to feed a 4-person family for 1 year. At Wherwell Allotments the average size of a plot is just over 2 rods, meaning that allotment holders will still need to go to the supermarket occasionally.

The allotments are well provided for, with rain water tanks, plenty of storage and a swing seat, made by Robert himself, that sits at the top of the allotment and gives allotment holders the chance to relax and survey the results of their hard work. All sorts of fruit and veg are being grown, with the most ambitious and exotic being Tromba D’Albenga, a gargantuan squash plant that can grow up to 30 feet long with 4 foot long squashes – look out for it at the Harvest Festival maybe? The aim is for any surplus produce to be sold via social media to the village community.

Rules and regulations? Not really. Everyone does their own thing and Robert is on hand to share his 50 years’ experience of growing

plants and vegetables, the only stipulation being that everything must be organic, as the surrounding farmland is run on this principle. Robert's practical experience is backed up by technical input from his wife Sue, who is currently studying for a RHS Diploma at Sparsholt.

What else is going on there? In addition to the allotments, there are two small specialist gardens under development – the first is a wellbeing garden with herbs and the second is a relaxation garden with wildflowers of various pastel colours. In the longer term, there is also a plan for a small nature trail on the bank previously occupied by the railway line that runs alongside the allotment. These areas will be available for all villagers to enjoy.

All in all, the creation of the allotments is an impressive achievement, completed in less than a year and providing a relaxing and therapeutic place for residents to engage in one of the most rewarding aspects of the 'new normal'.

# Monthly Report of Chilbolton Parish Council

## July 2021

The Parish Council has this month been focussing on the issue of Cow Common.

After the Meeting on 7 June, much further thought and information collection has been undertaken. The views of the Parish were taken in the Survey that was delivered to all households and both the Village Shop and Abbot Mitre have been consulted. The Survey was returned by just over 41% of households and of those over 60% favoured the option to close the gravel area where cars are permitted to park for a trial period covering the school holidays starting on Saturday 24 July.

This is by no means a perfect solution and comes with as many potential disadvantages as advantages, not least the fact that business at the shop and the pub may be severely affected. We are also conscious that the less able bodied will temporarily have less access to Cow Common. We are trying to work out a way to address this issue and it would be helpful if you could let us know if you are affected so we can see what might be put in place. Many comments were made on the Survey Responses and these will be very useful as we consider what is best in the long-term.

We are also aware that some people have not returned their forms because they think that none of the options are workable or appropriate. We still very much welcome any comments you may have as to possible solutions. This is a trial and it remains to be seen if it works. The issue is not simply one of congestion in the gravel area and Joys Lane it is also the issue of the adverse effects the volume of people is having on this sensitive wildlife area.

Any long-term solutions will need to be considered in the Autumn in the light of the trial and other views and possibilities. At the extraordinary meeting of the PC held on 5 July it was stressed that this is a trial and has to be kept under constant review. Should any major adverse effect occur then the PC may need to reopen the gravel area and permit cars to park.

During the 6 weeks please make an extra effort to support our 2 local businesses which are so important to Village life! There is likely to be an increase in parking, mostly on Village Street should the summer have good weather.

The PC has distributed No Waiting cones for affected residents to place out on "risk" days so as to ensure their access is not blocked. Care should be taken to ensure that cones are NOT left out 24hrs a day for the full 6 weeks.

Village Street has no parking restrictions and as such is an area where cars are therefore able to park, so long as they do not cause an obstruction.

We will monitor the parking situation on Village Street and elsewhere in the Village. As to the Common itself, as previously explained, it is subject to commons rights and access has to be available to the whole area at all times to pedestrians and the bridleway running across must also be available for horses and non- motorised means of transport and pedestrians.

Should anyone see any anti-social behaviour or suffer any abusive behaviour we have been informed by the Police that everyone should phone 101 immediately so that the Police are aware.

We have been assured that they will be increasing visits to Cow Common particularly in good weather. The more reports of anti-social behaviour they receive the more likely they will visit! Please also report to the PC any examples of people not respecting the area and the general volume of people on the Common. The PC will do its best to monitor but we cannot be there 24hrs a day.

We need all the Village to help gather as much information possible.

That brings me to the general point that the PC need more volunteers. We are a Councillor short at present and the Open Spaces Committee which deals with far more than just wielding the brush-cutter. For example, the admin for Cow Common and West Down, liaising with Natural England, organising contractors to undertake various works and signage etc. Cow Common, West Down and all the other smaller areas in the Village such as Stocks Green and Grindstone Green and all the footpaths can only be maintained through the joint work of volunteers.

We cannot do it without volunteers! Please consider offering your help. The same will apply to sorting out any long-term solution for Cow Common. The PC are volunteers and can only do so much.

At the time of writing the routine PC Meeting for July has not taken place as we postponed this to 12 July to concentrate on Cow Common.

Finally, may I reiterate that everyone's cooperation and understanding will be needed over the period of the trial and please make an extra effort to support both the Village Shop and the pub.

## Recipe of the month

### Romesco Sauce

*A Traditional Catalan recipe*



Inspired by a visit to Chilbolton stores, where I found a jar of continental red peppers and some big lovely ripe tomatoes. This sauce goes beautifully with baby leeks, or anything grilled or barbecued, and works as a dip or a sauce.

#### Olive oil

**1 onion**, peeled and finely sliced

**2 garlic cloves**, peeled; 1 finely sliced, 1 crushed

**1-2 red chillies**, finely chopped (to taste)

**Two large tomatoes (or a tin)**, roughly chopped

**2 large red peppers from a jar**, roughly chopped

**50g dried breadcrumbs**

**40g hazelnuts**, preferably toasted, plus more for sprinkling

**2 tsp sweet smoked paprika**

**2½ tbsp sherry vinegar**


Warm a large pan over a medium heat and add two tablespoons of oil, the onion, sliced garlic, half the chili and several pinches of salt. Cook gently for 10-15 minutes until everything is soft and sweet. Add the tomatoes, breaking them up with a wooden spoon. Taste for seasoning, adding the rest of the chili if you'd like a bit more heat, and the red peppers. Pop the nuts in a blender and blitz until very fine, then add to the sauce along with the paprika, sherry vinegar and three tablespoons of olive oil. Simmer gently for 15 minutes. Allow to cool a little then blitz until smooth,

Fry the breadcrumbs in another tablespoon of olive oil with the crushed garlic until golden, season. At this stage you can either add them to your sauce or keep them aside to sprinkle on top along with the remaining nuts.

If the sauce is very thick, thin down with a splash or two of water. It's now ready to serve but will keep in the fridge for up to a week.

## Cereal Offenders

### *Marking the 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Chilbolton's Mysterious Crop Circle*

In a 300m-wide natural sinkhole in the hills of Puerto Rico lies the Arecibo radio telescope. You'll probably know it from the film *GoldenEye*, when after a hair-raising slide down the enormous dish's surface, Pierce Brosnan's James Bond stops it being used to transmit control signals to the destructive *GoldenEye* satellite weapon – a curious reversal of reality, given that the dish was originally built for experiments on the feasibility of tracking ballistic weapons. For most of its 57 years, until failure of supporting cables brought its untimely end in 2020, the dish was used for radio astronomy. Yet its most famous use was in 1974 when, in a search for extra-terrestrial intelligence, it was used to transmit a short digital message toward the M13 star cluster.

The message, constructed by Carl Sagan and others, was of fascinating design, based upon the principle that a string of 1,679 'bits' (either 0 or 1) could only perfectly fill a rectangle if arranged as 73 rows of 23 columns, or vice-versa, and the assumption that intelligent beings would work this out and pick the less random-looking result. Within this pixelated image, the message defined binary numbers and used them to convey information about the elements of our DNA, the size of a typical human adult, the planets of the Solar System, and the Arecibo telescope itself. Since the M13 cluster is 25,000 light-years from the Earth, the signal is still on its way to its intended recipients.

Intelligent beings must have intercepted the message, however, because 20 years ago this month, a reply was received in the intriguing form of a crop circle near to Chilbolton's rather smaller telescope. Comprising a 120 ft long version of the original 73x23 grid, the reply used the same format to convey details of a silicon-based species with a large head but smaller stature, as well as its planetary home and the antenna it used to send the message.

Sceptics have suggested, though, that the reply in the Chilbolton field might not have come from outer space at all, and attribute it to mischievous terrestrial human beings. Around that time, two Hampshire gentlemen generally recognized as pioneers of the man-made crop circle, Dave Chorley and Doug Bower, were known to take advantage of the fields around Winchester for their increasingly artistic endeavours; although thought to have retired by 2001, they no doubt inspired many others to follow in their footsteps.

The ‘Arecibo reply’ was discovered on 19 August 2001 at Chilbolton telescope.



## OFFICIAL ANDOVER FOOD BANK UPDATE

During the last year we have distributed food to over 6800 people. Each lockdown caused an increase in demand as circumstances changed and income was insecure. 


### **Notice from Wherwell Parish Council**


