Letter from Jax

Dear Friends,

*For God alone my soul waits in silence,
He is my refuge and my salvation.* (Psalm 62)

Across each year, I determine to read closely the works of a particular theologian. Reading the texts in small chunks each day of the year, I find this discipline gives me support for my own prayer life, offering me an opportunity to reflect on a particular aspect of scripture which helps to deepen my understanding of what it means to be a spiritually alive and responsive Christian. Oftentimes, these seemingly arbitrary texts provide me with uncannily apposite and prophetic wisdom into aspects of my daily life.

During Advent 2017, I read a wonderful anthology of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, the German priest and theologian, whose opposition to National Socialism and his role in the conspiracy to overthrow Hitler and the Nazi regime led to his execution in 1945. Bonhoeffer talks of the need for each human being to connect, even for just five minutes in each of their hectic days, with the spiritual life of their soul. He urges us to be still long enough to listen to the eternal echoes of the divine breath of God, who delights in us and longs for us to cling to *Him* rather than to our own weaknesses and shortcomings.

Hey you! Human being! You have a soul!
See that you don't lose it,
that you don't wake up from the frenzy of life –
and see that you have become hollow inside,
a plaything of events, a leaf driven back and forth
and blown away by the wind, that you are without a soul.

As we journey to the cross with Christ this Lent, I pray that we each listen to Bonhoeffer's personal realisation: finding space from the trials and tribulations of each day to reconnect through prayer before God to life in all its fullness. As we allow this practice to become a natural and necessary part of our lives, we will come to find that, though prayer requires us to be honest with ourselves as being broken human beings, we will not become weighed down by our shame, guilt and despair.

Instead, we discover the freedom and lightness of spirit which comes from recognising our vulnerability and rooting our hearts in Christ, who longs to lead us from the cradle, as theologian, Henri Nouwen explains, 'to the throne of grace, to receive mercy and to find divine life.'

In this moment of our own personal realisation, we find the true message of Christmas in the story of Jesus' Easter resurrection.

Here, trusting fully in Christ's salvation, our egos are set free from delusions of worldly control, popularity and power, and our souls find relief in the secure spiritual refuge for which we were made, fed by the deep peace and acceptance, which only God's love can give.

Wickes in Winchester kindly donated two base units for us so we now have plenty of space for all our bottles of paint and messy tray resources.





Project Blackcap – part 2

As you may have read in the last magazine, I'm helping with a study of a small bird, the Blackcap. Some Blackcaps spend the winter in our gardens. We know that most of our own breeding Blackcaps leave us and spend the winter in Iberia or Africa. So we think our wintering birds come from central Europe. But to find out more, scientists are fitting some birds with tiny devices that continuously record ambient light levels. If these “geo-locators” can be retrieved later, it's possible to work out where the birds have been.

It sounds easy, but it all depends on a bird surviving the breeding season, returning to the same wintering area, and then being recaptured so that the device can be retrieved. Scientists anticipated they'd only be able to retrieve about 10% of the locators in the following winter. So there was no great expectation of getting one back from the five that were fitted in my garden. The project manager was therefore very excited when on 20th November, quite amazingly, the very first Blackcap to arrive in my garden this winter was actually one with a geo-locator! And six days later, I managed to capture the bird and retrieve the device. The computer chip was sent off to Cambridge, and when analysed, the scientists were fairly amazed. The bird had apparently spent the summer in an area over 500 km south-east of us, in eastern France, probably near Dijon. This was most unexpected.

Another interesting detail from the data trace, was that the bird had apparently made the 500 km journey in one flight. On 28th March it was in my garden (I'd seen it – identified by colour rings), and the next day it was near Dijon. But that was not the end of the story. On 3rd December, I saw another bird that I knew, from the colour rings, should be carrying one of the tiny backpack geo-locators. Sure enough, after a couple of weeks of effort, I managed to retrieve the device. Incredibly we now had two geo-locators from five – a 40% return, and these were the first ones to have ever been retrieved on Blackcaps. The summer home for this bird turned out to have been south of Munich, in Germany (or maybe near Innsbruck, in Austria) – just over 1,000 km to the east of Chilbolton. This wasn't entirely unexpected, because German scientists had already identified this general area as being a probable source for some English-wintering Blackcaps.

What next? Firstly, the team are now planning to fit some more birds with geo-locators. Last winter's birds were the first Blackcaps ever to be

fitted with the devices, and strict licence conditions meant it couldn't be done again this winter till there was evidence of birds returning in good health - and the two Chilbolton birds provided this evidence; both birds are still visiting my garden on most days in January as I write.

Secondly, where you can help is by looking out for Blackcaps with colour rings. There are now twenty five colour-ringed birds in Chilbolton (five from last winter, and twenty new ones), but I'm only regularly seeing about half of them in my garden. So where are the others? One theory is that they will have moved on further west. The other theory is that they're in your garden - within a mile or so of where they arrived. The scientists would like to know how far they wander, so do let me know if you see one. Their preference is for fatballs or apple pieces, but they'll also feed on cake or pastry on bird-tables, and will resort to sunflower hearts in cold weather.

Finally, something slightly bizarre! I've been approached by a French film director who is making a German documentary film series about bird migration. He wants to film colour-ringed Blackcaps in my English garden!

Wherwell Parish Council Meeting report for 9th January 2018

The Parish Council was joined by District Cllr Drew and three members of the public, who kindly provided refreshments.

In the open session concerns were again raised regarding the land at the junction of the B3420 with the A3057. District Councillor Drew reported that the HCC legal team is pursuing the matter, adding that it can be a lengthy process. It was noted that there had been some fly tipping in the car park. The public should continue to log any activities they notice at the site with TVBC/HCC.

Cllr Drew was pleased to report that the MP for our area, Caroline Nokes, has been appointed Minister for Immigration, following the recent government cabinet reshuffle.

The bimonthly accounts were tabled. The draft budget for 2018/19, and applications by local organisations for grants from the PC were considered. A small increase in the annual precept was agreed.

The PC considered three new planning applications in the parish, and decisions from TVBC on earlier applications were noted.

Updates from Councillors were received:

- The dead trees at the “clump” have now been removed, the cost of replacement trees is to be investigated, and residents will be asked if they would like to sponsor a tree. Further information on this to follow.
- One quote to carry out repairs to the war memorial has been received, other quotes are being sought.
- Virgin Media plan to start installing superfast broadband in February, with completion expected in May. BT Openreach are also planning to install FTTP to approximately 48 properties. The PC would like to thank Nick Taylor for pushing the BT initiative forward.
- Work on the Parish Plan is moving forward. Residents are encouraged to complete and return the questionnaire, available in the February community magazine.
- Cllr Broadbent attended Test Valley School presentation evening in November and presented a prize for Art, on behalf of the PC.

- Wherwell School has been rated as “good” following its recent OFSTED inspection.
- A letter to HCC Highways, regarding the ongoing concerns of speeding traffic & HGV use of the Longparish Road, has been drafted and was discussed.
- Investigations into the cost of possibly installing vehicle activated speed signs have been initiated.

Those of you who remember 'Bob', the black pony who for nearly 20 years did pony rides at the village fete, may be sad to hear he has passed away. A couple of parents, who brought their own children to have a ride at his final fete, said they could remember riding him when they were small! Apparently he was also responsible for several families having to buy ponies after their children caught 'ponymania'.

Despite being a Dales/Fell combo – sometimes noted for their feisty behaviour – Bob was the very opposite. He was the ultimate bomb proof pony. At the fete, Bob was never fazed by flashes, bangs, coconut stalls, bouncy castles or children waving glow sticks – and occasionally accidentally poking them up his nose. Even the roar of Reverend Errol's famous hot air balloon, just a few yards away, only raised a quizzical ear twitch! The nearest to an accident we had with him was when a little girl we were leading chirpily remarked that she could see through Bob's leg! What? Turning round, we found her still firmly attached but hanging almost upside down on a saddle that had slipped 90 degrees! Bob, in his usual style, plodded onwards as if nothing had happened.

In his younger days, Bob was an excellent jumper and won many rosettes at local gymkhanas. His age was slightly indeterminate. The vet used to say, you can estimate the age of a mature horse, old horses are trickier but for the Bobs of this world there is only carbon dating.

CHILBOLTON PARISH COUNCIL (CPC)

CPC met on Monday 4th December 2017 and 8th January 2018 at the village hall. One member of the public was present on 4th December: Simon Roberts. Thank you Simon for your support during 2017. Please carry on attending in 2018. I promise there will be mince pies at our meeting next December! We would love to see more of you attending so it was nice to see three members of the public on 8th January.

The hot topic of the moment is the proposed bus shelter in Branksome Avenue. We have a costed design; we have the finance and we have established that we do not need planning permission. I distributed copies of the plans to houses beside the bus stop. Since then I have had lengthy emails and I attended 1 Garston Mede where I spoke to the occupant at his request. I must say I have been surprised at the strength of opposition to our proposal that seemed to CPC to be in the public interest. I have mentioned CPC's intention to erect a bus shelter in Branksome Avenue several times in my articles in this magazine. Until now no one has contacted me, or as far as I am aware, any other parish councillor to express opposition. I make it clear, some of the opposition is not just to the proposed design but to any bus shelter at all. I should say that the idea of a bus shelter is not a whim of CPC but is the result of requests from those who use this bus stop.

I cannot do full justice to the points made by the opponents of the proposal in this article but they include: it is unnecessary and therefore a waste of money as too few people use the buses; alternatively, it would not be big enough at peak times and so not useful enough to justify the cost; it will impede the view of the road from the entrances to the properties on either side and thereby compromise public safety; it will encourage loitering by youngsters, graffiti and litter and may reduce property values; the bus stop, and any shelter, should be relocated to a more appropriate site in Branksome Avenue.

I encourage all those who do want a bus shelter to make their views known as well as those who do not. Suffice it to say, COSC and CPC will take into account of all these views and any other views that residents choose to express. I will certainly advise the Open Spaces Committee to consider all options including a redesign of the proposed shelter (or no bus shelter) before making a recommendation to CPC. Well, that's enough of that!

We have a problem with football at the War Memorial Playing Field. Whilst the soccer pitch itself is standing up well, the areas where cars are driven is not. The surface had become so badly chewed up that we have had to tell the teams that use the pitch that they must not park on the field until it recovers. Their response was to give a month's notice of their intention to end their agreement with us. I know that both CPC and COSC are

disappointed with their decision. CPC are keen to have the playing field used for the purpose for which our predecessors gave the land and to encourage the playing of team sports by the young. We have put quite a lot of money and effort into improving the pitch and the pavilion.

The problem has been caused by a number of factors including the weather; the playing of two games on the same weekend (without our prior agreement) and the tendency of parents to drop off their child and then come back to collect him. This increases the number of car journeys. The turning involved in dropping off and picking up also aggravates the damage to the surface.

I have sent an email to one of the managers, Mark Foakes, saying we are keen for them to continue to use the field and suggesting ways of minimising future damage. I have not had a response. I am assuming they do not wish to continue to use our pitch. If the teams do leave it will mean a loss of income. The second payment would have been paid now (about £600). However, there are cost savings: we will need to mow less often; the track will suffer less wear and tear and the electricity bill for the pavilion will be less. We will have to wait and see. I will be surprised if we do not find another taker for the pitch in due course.

While on the subject of the WMPF I should tell you that a few weeks ago I entered the WMPF to find five dogs being exercised thereon off the lead. I spoke politely to the owner of two of the dogs who was apologetic and claimed to be unaware that his should have had his dog on a lead despite notices to this effect. He promptly put his dogs on leads. I also spoke to the other man. He insulted me using the filthiest language and walked off making no attempt to put his dogs on leads. Does anyone know who this person might be? Medium height, medium build, very short, possibly shaven head, wearing military camouflage type trousers. He had three dogs one of which I think was a lurcher. Please let me know if you can help. I would like to speak to him about his attitude and behaviour.

We are going ahead with installing a hard surface basket ball area at the WMPF. This has been delayed by TVBC taking ages to agree to giving us S 106 money towards the cost. Under the rules you have to wait until the grant is approved before starting the work. Due to the wet and soft ground conditions we think we should wait until May before starting the work to try and minimise damage by plant to the WMPF. I will be speaking to the contractor about this. The delay is disappointing but it gives us a chance to apply to Hampshire Playing Field Association for a further grant towards the cost.

I have had a positive response to the idea of replacing stocks on Stocks Green including the sending of a photograph of stocks at Longparish. CPC

has agreed to get quotes for the cost of making and installing them before making a decision. Work continues on West Down. We are busy burning the material that we removed along the bank between Coley Lane and West Down. We made good progress in widening the Mark Way in a joint effort with HCC but there is more to be done.

There is another joint effort at 10 am on 6th February. More help would be very much appreciated. Please contact me or Glynne Evans. Southern Water originally said they would finish the work on West Down by Christmas. Whilst the installation of a new water main is complete the building of the reservoir has taken longer than expected. The completion date is now February. We will see. Several of you have mentioned the mess made by Southern Water's contractor. Glynne is going to walk the affected areas and (hopefully) agree on rectification measures.

So far the contractor has been very cooperative. The footpaths are all clear but muddy. This is partly due to the weather and partly to the number of walkers (which is a good thing). I walked from the Thirt Way up Martins Lane to the A30 the other day and I was appalled by the amount of litter on the verges. CPC intend to organise a clean-up in early spring. Please support us. We had to get HCC to remove a tree that had fallen across Frog Lane. This they did with commendable speed.

I have been asked to mention the following: our Community Police Officer, Catherine Williams, would like your help in setting police priorities for our area. She asks that you complete the following survey:

Now that Christmas is over and a new year has begun, I know that some of you will be thinking about improving your fitness! I can recommend the pilates class that takes place in the village hall from 6 to 7 pm every Wednesday. It costs £10 a session. Before Christmas Sally and I attended a Christmas concert given by the Wherwell Singers in Wherwell Church. It was very enjoyable. I urge you to look out for it and give it a try next Christmas. I don't think you will be disappointed.

By the time you read this Christmas will be behind us and the New Year will have started. I hope 2018 proves a happy and fulfilling year for you all. Whilst the Parish Council cannot please everyone all the time I can promise you we will do our best.

Recipe of the month



Roast chicken with dates, olives and capers

Ingredients:

8 chicken legs, drumstick and thigh attached, skin on (2kg net)
5 garlic cloves, crushed
15g fresh oregano, torn, plus extra for garnish
3 tbsp red wine vinegar
3 tbsp olive oil
100g pitted green olives
60g capers, plus 2 tbsp of their juices
70g pitted and quartered lengthways Medjoul dates
2 bay leaves
120ml dry white wine
1 tbsp date syrup or treacle
Salt and black pepper

Method:

Place the chicken in a large, non-reactive bowl and add all of the ingredients, apart from the wine and date molasses, along with $\frac{3}{4}$ teaspoon of salt and a good grind of black pepper. Gently mix everything together, cover the bowl and leave in the fridge to marinate for 1 to 2 days, stirring the ingredients a few times during the process. Preheat the oven to 180C.

Spread out the chicken legs on a large baking tray, along with all the marinade ingredients. Whisk together the wine and molasses and pour over the meat. Place in the oven and cook for 50 minutes, basting 2 or 3 times, until the meat is golden brown on top and cooked through. Remove from the oven, transfer everything to a large platter, sprinkle over some freshly picked oregano leaves and serve.

ANDOVER RIDING FOR THE DISABLED

Andover RDA has had a long association with St Mary Bourne, Binley, Abbotts Ann, Monxton and Whitchurch. Our carriage drivers go out from Binley as well as a children's ride. Another children's ride, which accommodates 18 riders, operates in St Mary Bourne. We have a children's ride in Monxton and again in Whitchurch. Adults ride at Abbotts Ann and Sparsholt Equestrian Centre.

Most of our riding children are from the special schools in Andover, coming from Icknield, Markway, Norman Gate and Wolverdene Schools.

Andover RDA serves about 60 participants around the area and of course we are always on the lookout for volunteers.
