## **Benefice Newsletter**

As I write this on April 30<sup>th</sup> it is a day notable for two things. First, that our Rector Jax has just landed in Portugal for a very well-deserved holiday in the sun with Rod – let there be many more – which is why I am the author on her behalf of this month’s reflection. Second, that today is the anniversary of the inauguration of George Washington as the first President of the United States of America.

The USA’s Declaration of Independence from Britain opened with these words: “We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights, among which are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.”

In the USA and here in the UK Presidents and Governments come and go, with varying degrees of effectiveness and care for their people - but in general terms both governments hold to the basic principles of the human rights enshrined in the US Declaration of Independence, and they are held to account for them. However badly we think that some of them perform; however honest or not we think they are; and regardless of whether we like them as individuals; it remains the fact that a majority of ordinary citizens can remove them if they choose.

This is a right to be cherished, and carefully protected. It is far from the case in many countries – Syria is an obvious current example; but so are Russia and China, where their Presidents have constructed systems which give them personal power beyond the control of the ordinary citizen. With that power comes the ability to limit life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness - and then the principle of equality is lost and intolerance of the rights of others is encouraged and gathers strength. Could it happen here ?

A few weeks ago Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks said that he is more despondent today about religious, cultural and ethnic hatred across Europe than at any time since the War. He was prompted by the current concerns about antisemitism, but saw the problem as much wider. He said “the worst thing that good people can do is to turn away and do nothing” – because if intolerance is left unchecked it turns to hatred, and hatred feeds on itself and grows.

In our villages I see a lot of busy, happy people who are very concerned about those around them, and about our world in general,

and who do much to care and support others. If we look at ourselves closely I suspect many of us would own-up to some degree of intolerance, but I don't believe it is a serious problem in our Communities. We are very fortunate - but it is important that we remember what Rabbi Sacks said. Don't turn away when injustice is being done to others, wherever it is; and don't be satisfied with our own comfortable lives if others are losing their life or liberty. We have a responsibility to stand up, speak out, and oppose intolerance and inequality wherever we see it.

I leave you with a prayer from a man who did just that, at the cost of his own life – Martin Luther King:

Help us to realise that humanity was created to shine like the stars. Keep us we pray in perfect peace. Help us to walk together, pray together, and live together until that day when all God's children – Black, White, Red, Brown and Yellow will rejoice in one common band of humanity in the reign of our Lord and God. **Amen.**

## **CHILBOLTON PARISH COUNCIL (CPC)**

I have a number of meetings to report on so I will be brief.

The Annual Parish Assembly was held on 17th April 2018. It was devoted to a public meeting to discuss the proposed bus shelter in Branksome Avenue. Five parish councillors attended and fourteen members of the public. I would like to thank Jane O'Boyle for taking the minutes. These are available on the village website. A mock up of the latest design was placed outside the village hall. Prior to the meeting, John Rowles and myself erected it at the bus stop to ensure it would fit in to the available space. It did. A scale drawing of the revised design was circulated. After a fairly lengthy discussion took place a vote was taken. Ten members of the public voted in favour of having a bus shelter situated where the bus stop is. Those ten were also in favour of the revised design: a decisive majority of those present. Furthermore, I attended a coffee morning in the village hall with the drawing referred to above and a picture of an all perspex shelter. I found that, almost without exception, those present wanted a bus shelter and liked the wooden design. They felt it was more in keeping with a village setting.

The Annual Parish Meeting was held on the 8th May 2018. I was re-elected as chairman and George Marits as vice-chairman. The meticulous work of our clerk, Mandy Denyer, was highly praised by our auditor. We are very fortunate to have her as our clerk. The usual annual reports were made. They can be found on the village website. The meeting was followed by the monthly PC meeting. The question of dogs on the War Memorial Playing Field was discussed. It was agreed to defer any decision until I had had a chance to meet and discuss the matter with the TVBC Dog Warden. I will return to this later. The proposed bus shelter was mentioned briefly. During questions from the public one person used the opportunity to attack the PC's handling of this matter. I do not accept any of the criticisms as valid. The criticism I would make of myself is that it has taken us so long to deal with this matter. This is in part because we have consulted, listened to suggestions and criticisms of the original design and gone back to the drawing board to come up with a better design.

The Chilbolton Open Spaces Committee met on the 10th May 2018. The meeting was lively at times, particularly when we discussed the bus shelter and dogs on the playing field. No final recommendation was agreed with regard to the bus shelter. The decision will be made by CPC in due course. With regard to dogs: I met the dog warden this morning (11/05/18). Jane O'Boyle was present as well. I shall be reporting on this meeting to COSC and CPC shortly. The warden came up with some helpful suggestions which may help us not just with dogs fouling the playing field but fouling generally. Talking of fouling, I was dismayed as I walked my dog along Frog Lane this morning to find three large amounts of dog poo. All three were in the middle of the path and one had already been stepped on. If someone reading this is exercising a dog along Frog Lane and failing to pick up, please do so in future. As I walked along the permissive path parallel with Little Drove Road this afternoon I picked up three lots of dog poo in the middle the path. This path seems to be a problem area. Having said this, when we walked over some of the playing field this morning we found no dog poo. The contents of the bins provides evidence that most people do pick up. Unfortunately, a few do not. We must do what we can to shame these people into doing so. Keep your eyes open for professional dog walkers. John Rowles spotted one such with four dogs who spoke on her mobile phone while the dogs did their business.

Turning to happier matters: we await the arrival of cattle on The Common. Adam Coutts is going to continue to graze cattle this year. As you would expect The Common was extremely busy over the Bank Holiday weekend. I only had one report of bad behaviour. I was told that on the Saturday evening a group of rowdy youth were having a BBQ and playing football in the area we ask people to avoid. On the two ensuing evenings I went down to check and found all was quiet. Mike Thompson has already placed seven young Red Devons on West Down. They look very charming and they are doing a good job for us. We will be repairing the surface of the Mark Way as it joins West Down. There is a small area that gets very muddy and slippery.

HCC have agreed to provide scalping. We will carry out this work in November. We are trying to persuade HCC to agree to the removal of redundant “horse stiles” on The Mark Way. They are a nuisance and serve no useful purpose. We are now approaching the time of year when growth really takes off. I will try and get round the footpaths to check they are not overgrown but you can help by reporting any concerns to me or Mandy. We expect work to begin on installing the hard surface basketball area on the playing field in June. We are hopeful that we will find a team to use the football pitch next season. Nick Horne is “in discussions” at the moment.

We are looking for somewhere secure to store our valuable equipment. We have discussed buying a container. It occurred to me that someone in the parish might have somewhere suitable. If you have, or know someone who might have, would you let me or Mandy know? Well, that’s it for another month. Let’s hope we have a good summer. If you can help us with pulling ragwort on West Down it would be much appreciated. The dates are printed in this magazine.



## Kicking the Plastic Habit

Perhaps prompted by the news that China has decided to stop recycling our plastic rubbish, kicking the plastic habit is being given increased media coverage – especially from the viewpoint of cutting down demand rather than should we ‘burn or bury’.

Retailers are competing for the latest headline. Frozen food giant Iceland has stolen a march on rivals by becoming the first retailer in the world to axe plastic packaging from own label products. J D Wetherspoon was the first Pub company to scrap plastic straws for biodegradable paper straws in all its restaurants – a change which it is claimed will prevent 70 million plastic straws entering landfill or making their way into the world's oceans each year. The National Trust has said it is phasing out single-use plastics from its shops and cafes within three years and by the end of this year, plastic bottles will have been swapped for glass containers in all of its sit-down cafes. The Trust also announced that it is investigating alternatives to single use plastics in its plant nurseries, as part of a scheme to get rid of most plastic products by 2022.

Some 480 billion plastic bottles were sold globally in 2016. In the UK, 38.5 million plastic bottles are used daily, with roughly 50% being recycled.

Media headlines such as “*Sperm Whale killed by 64lb of plastic waste in its gut*” make it easy to focus on discarded waste, and ignore the invisible waste that gets flushed down our drains and into the sea. We have had campaigns focussing on micro-beads in cosmetics. Coming soon will be car tyres and microfibers. Every time you drive your car, micro deposits of rubber are scraped off your tyres. The first time you wash a fleece jacket, about one-third of loose fibre is flushed out by your washing machine.

Prompted by the YouTube video below, showing Earthwatch volunteers extracting a plastic fork wedged into the nostril of a leatherback turtle, the Marine Conservation Society is running a ‘Make It the Final Straw’ campaign – visit <https://www.mcsuk.org/> to add your support. If you are planning a party, you can easily shop online for biodegradeable products. ## Common and West Down Conservation Ragwort Pull

We need you once more to help restore WEST DOWN's Chalk downland. A very enjoyable time was had by all last year!

Join us pulling up ragwort for an hour or so **10-12 am Saturday and Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> and 8th July 2017 and Sunday 15th July if necessary. Meet in the car park at the Station Road end of the Down – (not the recycling bins one !)**

Bring gardening gloves, (ragwort has acid juice), a garden fork and, if you can, a wheel-barrow too (best is one with an inflatable wheel). More equipment will be supplied. (More info – Moya 01264 860411)

This year we may need your help on the Common too; more details will be on the notices and in the July Magazine.



Chalk downland habitats are very biodiverse and under threat. The chalk slopes of West Down have to be grazed. In this way the grass is short enough for the chalk downland plants to flourish. BUT Ragwort is poisonous to livestock, so, we have to get it off. It pulls up most easily when in flower – hence the timing. The Parish Council, as the manager of West Down, is responsible for seeing that this is done, so we need your help. Just an hour or two of your time on Saturday or Sunday would be an enormous help.



**Wherwell Parish Assembly  
& Annual Meeting of the Parish Council,  
8<sup>th</sup> May, 2018**

**Parish Assembly:**

The Parish Councillors & District Cllr Drew were joined by 10 residents.

After welcoming everyone to the Meeting, Edward Wicks & Chris Whitehouse from Virgin media were introduced & invited to give a brief update on the planned superfast broadband “build” in Wherwell. This is likely to take 6-8 weeks starting early June until early August, and will inevitably involve some road closures & diversions. Further information will be available at the Village Hall on Wed 16<sup>th</sup> May, 6 - 8 pm & at the Church Fete on June 9<sup>th</sup>.

During the open session one resident asked if there was any possibility of introducing a cycle way from the village to Andover through Harewood Forest. It was thought that this was unlikely as the cycle way would be crossing a gaming estate, however the idea was well received and the possibility of alternative routes will be pursued.

In his observations District Cllr Drew outlined the main areas for TVBC: housing, planning & enforcement, leisure & waste collection. One of the greatest challenges, in the Wherwell area has been “Nelsons Corner” & one of the successes was providing a grant towards the cost of installing the link footpath at Fullerton. In response to a question on the state of the roads, he was able to confirm that all HCC maintenance crews have been moved over to potholes. He reminded everyone that there are grants available for community projects & organisations. Cllr Drew added that he has been asked to stand as a conservative candidate in the TVBC elections next year.

Reports on their annual activities were received from representatives of the History group, Home Guard Club, PCC, Pre-School, Village Hall, Wherwell Playing Fields & Wherwell Primary School

## **Bee Diary June 2018**

Back in August/September 2017, we fed the bees with concentrated sugar syrup to supplement and to maximise the stores in the hive. The aim was for the bees to be self-sufficient thereafter until April the next year when nectar starts flowing in volume again. In most winters there are warm days in February and March when the bees can get out and gather pollen and nectar from snowdrops, crocus, hazel and willow, but the winter of 2017-18 was very chilly and we had few days when the bees could forage. When we finally did get to inspect the colonies in that warm spell in mid-April, it was good to see that most colonies had come through the cold winter and were expanding rapidly, albeit having eaten most of their stores. The September feeding has paid dividends this year. By mid-April it was time to give the bees more space in the hives which we do by adding supers, extra boxes for them to expand into and to store honey. This year we added supers below the brood box, as well as above, to simulate a wild bees' nest. Bees in the wild will build comb in a hollow tree or wall cavity and in spring they will expand the nest by extending the combs downwards. Our aim is to discourage the colony from thinking it has run out of space, as overcrowding leads very quickly to swarming. If the bees are busy building new comb, they are less likely to swarm. At least that's what the beekeeping text books tell us, but the bees don't always read them.

2017 was a year when there was very little oil seed rape grown within range of our bees. We actually moved some hives to Cowdown onto the rape there. The result was that we had less rape honey to harvest than usual. Rape honey sets quickly in a very fine crystal, and it is therefore very useful for blending with other spring and summer honeys which generally have a stronger flavour but also tend to set in coarse crystals. Our aim in blending is to combine the fine crystal rape honey with the stronger flavoured summer honey, to produce an easily spreadable soft set honey. By the time spring 2018 had arrived we had run out of rape honey for the blending and the resultant blended honey, although pleasant in taste was somewhat gritty and not what people were used to. Fortunately we are surrounded by fields of rape this year, on both sides of the valley, so our blending difficulties should ease when we come to do the next batch of jarring.

The first talk was in May given by Sue Filmer about saving turtles from abandoned fishing nets and the second was in September by Andrew Flanagan about animal free research into cancer, where we learnt amongst the many species used for animal experiments, cats, dogs, donkeys and millions of zebra fish are included. Inspired by how many ladies had turned up to hear these talks I asked the group if they would work together to do an event to help raise funds for both Charities and the challenge started!

Before we started to arrange things I had been visiting a lovely lady Karen Millward in Wherwell who was diagnosed with terminal cancer. Conversations were hard when I thought about what she would be missing in the future, especially grandchildren. One topic was safe, her love of the Maldives which she had visited 7 times with her husband, they even had a wedding there. It was on my bucket list but I never thought I would go! On my last visit Phil her husband wrote down where they had stayed. They had been planning to holiday there but instead Karen was taken into the hospice never to return home. This shocking news made me realise I had to get on with life so we booked the holiday to Meeru.

At the start of this year planning got underway. Choosing a title and a theme proved the hardest thing to agree on. I wanted to honour Karen’s memory. I wrote to the manager of Meeru and delivered a request on the first evening of our holiday. Every day we looked for an answer but none came. On the last day we wrote again but still no response. On returning home we wrote for the final time and immediately got a positive response with an offer of a full board VIP beach villa prize to be used in a small silent auction at the fundraising party.

The raffle prizes included a Band Night at the Buffalo Farm at Broughton and donations and gifts from Stockbridge, bottles of alcohol, chocolates, spa sets and all sorts were given by villagers and local businesses. Each kind offer lifted us to keep going. Andrew Flanagan was amazing getting financial support and prizes. Anna and Stefan Lipa volunteered to run the bar and ladies and gentlemen offered to decorate the hall and also to clear it all up afterwards. Sean Hutton helped Robert Lawrence build a deck and a kitchen at the back of the Village Hall. So many kind people helped to make this a great success. We raised £5300 which has been divided equally between the two Charities. We would like to say a huge thank you to everyone who helped with this, especially all those who bought raffle tickets, donated money and especially those who came and danced the night away! We hope you enjoyed it and that it has provided a happy memory of what a great community we are!

## In memory of Cliff Bastable (May 1935 - August 2017)



Cliff and Diana Bastable have lived in Chilbolton for over sixty years. Born in May 1935, in the hamlet of Pentridge in the heart of Cranbourne Chase, Cliff was the son of Reg and Gladys Bastable. His father was gamekeeper on the estate, and Cliff developed a love of the countryside from an early age. He first went to school in Wimborne St Giles, along with his cousin Alan. It was just two and a half miles from Pentridge across the fields, but the bus

journey through winding lanes was almost three times as long.

In due course, the family moved to East Tisted near Alton, and on leaving school, Cliff's first job involved setting up and tuning televisions for Shaws Electrical - at that time, the mid 1950s, TVs were state-of-the-art technology.

A man of many talents, Cliff was also the drummer for a band which used to play at a number of local gigs. A fine-looking young man, one evening, Diana caught his eye and after offering her a lift home in 1956, romance blossomed. After a period of courting, they were married in Wolverton Church on the Ewhurst Estate, just north east of Basingstoke.

Cliff always wanted to return to the land, and soon after marrying, he took a job on a farm in South Warnborough. Then in 1959, they moved to Chilbolton where Cliff started working for Geoffrey Painter at Manor Farm.

By this time they had a son, Colin, and four years later, Diana gave birth to Sharon. Cliff loved being a father and enjoyed teaching his children new skills. However, Diana remembers one less than successful lesson when he was demonstrating how to use a boomerang. To avoid causing damage, such as breaking a window, Cliff announced that the boomerang should always be thrown away from the house. He proceeded to follow this instruction, but having whizzed past the side of the house, the recalcitrant boomerang then doubled-back and immediately embedded itself in one of the windows!

Cliff loved life. After retiring from work on the farm, he remained very active in the village, mowing for people, and helping friends and neighbours. He and Diana also spent a lot of time with the over 60s club, and travelled round the country with the organ society. One of his favourite events was the Great Dorset Steam Fair, and this became an annual family outing.

Cliff died in August 2017, after living a full and happy life with his much loved wife and family. Diana would like to thank their many friends in and around Chilbolton and Wherwell for their support and good wishes.


