Dear Friends,

‘I, your Lord and Teacher have washed your feet, so you will be blessed if you do likewise.’

This Petertide, on Sunday, 30th June, and with the Winchester Hat Fair in full swing, I spent a joyful morning in Winchester Cathedral for the Ordination to Deacon of Tom Etherton, one of the ordinands I have been supporting in my role as a Diocesan Vocations Adviser. Some of you will have encountered Tom at St Mary’s in Andover, where he was their accomplished organist, or here in The Downs Benefice where he undertook part of his training. Along with nine other candidates from across Winchester Diocese, Tom has completed three years of theological training and this powerful service marks a new stage in his journey to Priesthood. God willing, this will take place *next* Petertide – a special time in the Church calendar, when Christians across the world are reminded of the martyrdom of two great Apostles, Peter and Paul, in their ultimate witness to Jesus. It is fitting that Ordinations take place at this time. The mission of the whole people of God is to live for Him, to proclaim His grace and goodness, and to share His love with the world by serving others as a sign of God’s earthly kingdom.

The primary role of a Deacon is to serve. Tom will now begin his parish training, serving the people of Pastrow Benefice in Andover Deanery as Assistant Curate to the vicar, Alex Randle-Bissell. To serve is the fundamental responsibility of *all* Christian people, and deacons are ordained so that they can help us all to make the Gospel message of Jesus known. They will do this by walking alongside the parishes to which they have been set, bringing to the Church the needs and hopes of all the people. As the Ordination liturgy states: *‘Deacons are to work with their fellow members in searching out the poor and weak, the sick and lonely, and those who are oppressed and powerless, reaching into the forgotten corners of the world, that the love of God may be made visible.’*

Ordained deacons enter into a life of self-giving, and this precious year will help them adjust to this life-changing work as they allow Jesus to become the pattern of their calling. They will share in the pastoral ministry of the Church and in leading God's people in worship. They will preach the Word and bring the needs of the world to the people through prayer. Most deacons go on to become Priests, ordained to serve by also ministering sacramental blessings such as Holy Communion to God's people. However some choose to remain as Deacons, faithfully continuing to serve their communities, teaching and modelling the ministry of Christ himself, who for our sake took the form of a servant, washing the disciples' feet as an example of the loving service to which we are all called.

We are blessed by those who offer their lives in service to God and the Church as Deacons. Just like us, they are not perfect, but have been called by Jesus to draw near to Him, to let his love shape and form them through the Holy Spirit. Please pray for them and their families, as they embark upon this great adventure of ministry with Jesus and His church, and especially for Tom, his wife and their two little daughters, as they show us by their faithful example what it means to serve each other in the grace of our Lord and Teacher, Jesus Christ.

CHILBOLTON PARISH COUNCIL

The Council held its monthly meeting on Monday 1st July 2019 at 7:00pm at Chilbolton Village Hall. One member of the public was present (thank you Davina Bruce) plus David Drew our new TVBC councillor.

We were delighted to welcome Mrs Collins, the recently appointed head teacher of Wherwell Primary School. Briefly, she told us that the numbers of pupils will increase to 141 new term with a waiting list of nine. The school had very recently won the Area Athletics to the huge delight and pride of the pupils. Well done to all those who took apart! The PTA is very successful and raised £6000 at the school fete. I was surprised to learn that relatively few of the pupils come from Chilbolton and Wherwell. Most come from Picket 20 in Andover. As a parish council we will do what we can to support the school which is an important community asset. I mentioned to Mrs Collins that we run educational visits to The Common and West Down.

We have now produced a map with the numbers and names of all the footpaths/bridleways in the parish. [This can be found on the parish council web site.](#) By the autumn I will have produced a leaflet with a number of suggested walks. At our request HCC have supplied and erected fingerposts indicating that the Mark Way and the Little Drove path are permissive bridleways. The footpaths and bridleways are mostly clear with the exception of the Mark Way. HCC, whose responsibility it is to clear the Mark Way, say it is scheduled for cutting in September. This is far too late. It needs cutting now and probably again in September. I will try and persuade HCC to cut it sooner. If I fail I will try to do it myself. I have recently cleared the Frog Lane path, the Grindstone Green Path, the Joys Lane path and the Station Road path with the Beast. I have asked Ian Daubney to clear the Old School path. You may see and hear Ian cutting creeping thistles on the Common. I have been asked to remind all those who own land over which paths cross that it is their responsibility to keep rights of way clear by cutting back their hedges. We have some fairly clear ideas as to how we can make the point where the Test Way crosses Coley Lane safer. We will be working with HCC to implement these. The hedge by the Coronation Tree has been trimmed to improve visibility.

Meanwhile, all drivers could help by reducing their speed to 20 mph as they reach the speed limit sign as you enter the village from the May Fly direction. Our plans to prevent further erosion of the river bank by the Purleygigg Bridge are pretty much finalised. We are grateful to Stuart Robertson of Sparsholt College for his advice. The work will be done in the autumn. We have provided villagers who live near the entrance to Joys Lane with cones to try and prevent anti-social parking when the Common is busy.

We have been let down by those who we have engaged to repair the swings at the playing field. They say their supplier forgot to provide the wood! However, they have promised the swings will be working by the school holidays. We will see!

An important development is the establishment of a special working group of the Open Spaces Committee (COSC) to focus on developing the War Memorial Playing Field. The idea is to provide more amenities for all age groups. This is a follow up to the Village Assembly which focussed on ideas for the playing field. The group will be led by Nick Horne who will be supported by Trish Heaton and Jo McMenemy. It will report to COSC.

I have just come back from our annual ragwort pull on West Down. About a dozen residents turned up plus about ten Hampshire Conservation Volunteers. There wasn't much so we had cleared it all by lunchtime. Many thanks to Moya Grove for organising it; to the residents who turned out on a hot day to help and to Edward Painter for supplying the trailer (in the event this was not really necessary). As a bonus we were treated to a great display of marbled white butterflies. As you may know this is the symbol we chose for our notice boards. All but four of the Red Devons have gone. There was too little for the others to eat. We will need to repair the fence along the eastern boundary of the enclosed area which is an annoying expense coming as it does on top of the cost of taking down the dead or dying ash trees. This will be done in the autumn. Well that's it for another month. The holiday season is nearly on us.

Have an enjoyable time and keep safe.

Terrapin spotted by Long Bridge!

A terrapin was spotted by Sharon Turner of Wherwell on June 27th by the Long Bridge. Hard to see it in this photo, but if you look at the version of the mag at <http://www.chilboltonandwherwell.info/> you will see it in all its glory.

Did this one escape it's owner, or did its owner set it free? Either way, there is apparently a sizeable population in the rivers of the South and Midlands. They are known to eat insect larvae and birds' eggs, so are seen by some as unwelcome. However, it is unlikely that they can breed in rivers, as terrapin eggs need to be incubated at 25 degrees Celsius for around 60 days in order to hatch (not a lot of people know that). Anyone familiar with the British summer knows exactly how unlikely that is.

Southern Water

Jill Patricia Rowles (1939 – 2019)

This article is a shortened version of a full article published in the 2019 edition of the Wherwell Anthology.

Early Life

Jill was born in 1939 in Shirley, Southampton to Robert and Mona Blanche Cooper. Jill was the youngest of two children, the other being her brother, John. As a small child, Jill and the family were evacuated from the area to Binley near Hurstbourne Tarrant. Later the family moved to Chilbolton.



Jill attended Andover Girls' School. While in school, Jill met Alan and he used to follow the school bus on his bike to meet with her. Alan worked on the railway operating the signal box at Fullerton and she would often help with the work on the railway.

In a time where further education was not an option for the majority, she left school at the age of 15 to start work, getting a job at Millward's shoe shop in Andover.

Married Life

Jill and Alan were married in 1959 and they moved into a mobile home near Chilbolton. They later moved to 6 Chant Close in Wherwell, which was a very apt home for them given Alan's work had been on the same railway line.

1964 came and brought the birth of Angela, who would be followed by Andrew in 1967 and finally, Richard in 1975. Alan played cricket and football and weekend trips for the family were often enjoyed supporting him along with Brian and Doreen (Alan's sister). Most of the Rowles family have, at some time, played cricket for Wherwell over the years including Alan's brothers, Sid, Dennis and David.

When the family sadly lost Uncle Sid, a cricket match was arranged to commemorate his life and the contributions he had made to the playing field and the cricket club "The Sid Match" was a wonderful family occasion drawing almost the entire family together annually. Jill would help make tea for the players and spectators as well as helping Doreen with the raffle.

Village Life

Jill was involved in a lot of village life, helping her friend Margaret make cricket teas for home games whilst Alan was playing. Wherwell became renowned for their teas more than anything else, including the delectable strawberry jam and cream scones, teams always looked forward to playing at Wherwell for that very reason!

Alongside being tea lady and avid supporter, Jill was the Secretary and later the Chair of Wherwell Playing Fields for several years. She always helped with the teas for the village fete as well as on August Bank Holidays.

One of Jill's hobbies was sewing and she was an active member of a village patchwork group, she liked to knit and was a keen gardener. She shared many hours alongside Alan in their famous vegetable garden. This experience was useful later in life when she began working for Brian and Lydia in the village shop and then moved on to work at the garden centre in Andover, then called Country Garden, where she put her staff discount card to good use to ensure their garden was well stocked. In later years Jill and Alan would often revisit the garden centre to enjoy a social breakfast or lunch. They eventually moved into one of the bungalows in their road, where it became her role to call in and check on residents.



Retired Life

Post-retirement Jill became involved in the resurrection of the Wherwell Home Guard Club where she became known as the “Raffle Queen” and served as the Membership Secretary for a couple of years. She loved cajoling members into buying raffle tickets, making an effort each time to outsell her previous efforts.

Always the heart and soul of the family, Jill was excited and honoured to be blessed with four grandchildren, Kerriane, Scott, Harvey and Maisey all of whom she loved dearly. Through Kerriane and Scott, Jill was excited again to be blessed with three great-grandchildren in Laylani, Flynn and Logan. She loved having visits from them, ready with big hugs and they always brought a huge smile to her face. Then there was her fifth grandchild, Richard's black Labrador, Nelson, who was always very excited to visit Granny and Grandad and would make a bee-line for the freezer where he quickly learned that his biscuits were kept.

Jill loved to get away and would often visit Weston-Super-Mare with Alan and went on Home Guard Club trips arranged by Mary Smith. Her favourite destination was the Mediterranean archipelago of Malta. They visited the island many times where she loved to relax sitting on the balcony and revelling in the dining and entertainment on offer, not forgetting a cheeky G&T at the bar.



There were a couple of events that Jill was looking forward in 2019. Firstly, it would have been her and Alan's 60th Wedding anniversary, secondly, they had planned a cruise for when she was better. Sadly, she would miss both.

We are all certain, that wherever she finds herself now, Jill will be the life and soul of the party. She was a kind loving and generous person who would never see anyone go without. Although life dealt its blows along the road and had been tough at times, Alan and Jill were steady as a rock and their partnership stood the test of time. A true testament to a couple who stuck together through thick and thin.

The Rowles family

Wherwell Parish Council report - 9th July

The Parish Council (PC) was joined by District Cllr Drew, HCC Cllr Gibson and one member of the public.

Following an event she had attended recently, a resident led a discussion on recycling awareness and climate change. Several possible initiatives were discussed. Whilst it is not strictly a matter for the Parish Council, the idea was supported. It was agreed that a sub group would meet in October to discuss ideas which would be brought back to the PC Meeting in November. It was also noted that a dead fish had been spotted in the River Test, near the Longbridge. The information will be passed on to the Estate.

The minutes of the April Meeting were agreed and signed as accurate. In matters arising, it was noted that the Dog Warden, together with the TVBC community liaison officer, had visited, following concerns over the amount of dog fouling in certain areas of the village. Signs have been placed on some of the existing bins in the village, stating that they can be used for the disposal of dog waste. The situation will be monitored and the PC will continue to liaise with the dog warden on the matter. The HCC access ranger has been to inspect footpath 9 (behind Hillside Cottages), who confirmed that it is the responsibility of the landowners on each side of the footpath to keep the hedges trimmed so that access can be maintained.

Cllr Drew reported that the 10-year Chantry Centre master plan is under way, which includes areas in the whole of Andover. New “tap and pay” meters are going to be introduced in the town centre car parks. TVBC continues to have success with prosecuting fly tippers. With the Wheelabrator proposals in mind, Cllr Drew will be accompanying a group visiting the Yardley waste incinerator plant near Bicester. Cllr Gibson reported that Roy Perry has stepped down as leader of HCC, with Keith Manns being appointed as his successor. As leader he wants to reduce the amount of waste being generated in Hampshire and will appoint a climate change member to the HCC cabinet. Highways dept. is massively underfunded and an increased number of written complaints have been received regarding potholes.

The bi-monthly accounts were tabled and expenditure was agreed. Advice had been received from the external auditors, that the PC accounts for the year 2018/19 were eligible for exemption from an external review. With approval, the Chair and Clerk completed and submitted an exemption certificate which was ratified.

Two new planning applications were considered, and decisions from TVBC on earlier applications were noted.

Updates from Councillors were received:

- Cllr Blazdell has been gathering ideas for village gateways as a way of traffic calming, but has been having difficulty in finding the correct person to speak to at HCC in order to take it forward.
- Cllr Broadbent is liaising with the pre-school and Primary School to arrange visits. Pre-school are still looking to recruit some villagers to join their committee. Cllr Broadbent had also been in contact with TVBC to discuss adjustments to the housing needs survey, which will be fed back in due course.
- Cllr Bryant had met with the TVBC and the preferred stonemason regarding repairs to the war memorial. Grants will be sought in the hopes that the work can be completed in time for the 100th anniversary of the erection of the memorial in September 2020.
- Cllr Hasselmann reported that she will be in contact with Virgin Media to find out where they are with regard to the dig in the remaining areas of the village.
- Cllr Hutton reported that, following a plea to regular users of the Playing Fields, some new members had come forward to join the committee which is encouraging. A new play mound had been put in near the Pavilion, primarily for use by the Preschool. WPF had recently had its annual Rospa inspection and action has been taken on its recommendations. The fencing around the tennis courts will be replaced this year.
- Cllr Newell has investigated the possibility of the PC purchasing some disease resistant elm trees to be planted at the Playing Fields. The costs will not be known until September.

The new Parish Lengthsman has undertaken work in the village twice so far, which seems to be to a better standard.

In order to utilise the Section 106 monies from the Lime Tree Development, the PC will investigate the possibility of dropping the curb at the new Fullerton Cottonworth Footpath to improve access, and explore the possibility of putting in a grass link footpath along the Harewood Hamlet on the Longparish Rd. Projects at the Wherwell Playing Fields will be identified to make use of the money identified for Childrens Playspace and Informal recreation.

It is with sadness, that the PC notes the passing of Denis Harding, resident of Wherwell and former Parish Councillor.

The next PC Meeting will be held on Tuesday 10th September.

We have had another great year at Pre- School with an amazingly supportive committee. The fundraising team in particular have done an incredible job. Without them raising the extra funds, the children wouldn’t have the opportunities they have had.

Chilbolton and Wherwell Parish Councils continue to support us, and without Sean and the Playing Fields Committee we wouldn’t have our incredible setting.

The staff continue to work incredibly hard, and we are looking forward to welcoming our new Children to the setting in September.

**Recipe of the month**

**Curried squash, lentil and  
coconut soup**



**Ingredients**

1 butternut squash, peeled, deseeded and diced  
200g carrot, diced  
100g red lentil  
700ml low-sodium vegetable stock  
1 can reduced-fat coconut milk  
1 tbsp olive oil  
1 tbsp curry powder containing turmeric  
Coriander and naan bread to serve

**Method**

Heat the oil in a large saucepan, add the squash and carrots, sizzle for 1 min, then stir in the curry powder and cook for 1 min more. Tip in the lentils, vegetable stock and coconut milk and stir well. Bring to the boil, then turn the heat down and simmer for 15 – 18 mins until everything is tender.

Using a hand blender or in a food processor, blitz until as smooth as you like. Season and serve scattered with roughly chopped coriander and some naan bread alongside.

This went down well at a recent Wherwell Book Club lunch!

We had a very interesting and illuminating insight into the unbelievable work and dedication of SERV (Service by Emergency Rider Volunteers) Wessex Blood Bikes, given by Robert Smith, one of their leading volunteers.

SERV Wessex is an amazing Charity, saving the NHS considerable sums of money each year, delivering by motor bike or car urgently needed blood products, samples, documents, donated human milk and other medical essentials to their client hospitals throughout Hampshire, Dorset and Wiltshire, and further afield when necessary. SERV Wessex undertakes a continuous service to replenish the blood carried by the Hampshire & Isle of Wight Air Ambulance and share a very close working relationship.

They use a limited number (three) of liveried vehicles purchased by donations, but most of the runs are carried out by volunteers using their own motor bikes or cars at their own cost entirely.

The service operates 365 days a year, and hospitals can access a dedicated line which is monitored 24/7. One of the jobs of the Duty Controller (volunteer) is to task a rider or driver and then monitor their progress and safety from point of call to a successful handover and to a safe return home.

Our speaker, Robert, was very obviously completely dedicated to SERV and his passion and enthusiasm for the Blood Bikes was palpable. He filled us all with admiration for what this Charity does, pretty much for love.

In addition, the volunteers do all their own fund raising, which is another vital cog in the wheel. **To this end, Robert and the SERV Wessex Blood Bikes team will be at Longstock Water Garden on Sunday 8th September.**



Whistle of wind as rewinds through the reed.


For there is peace to be found where waters run,
