After the service, everyone moved outside and enjoyed a delicious reception. Jax received the gift of a beautiful glass dish created by glass artist Anne Keyte, and was then invited to cut a celebration cake. She takes up her duties across the Benefice immediately, leading her first services on Sunday 13th July.

Jax, her husband Rod, and their children William, Alexander, and Eleanor-Kate, will be moving to the Rectory in Littleton towards the end of July.

CHILBOLTON PARISH COUNCIL (CPC)

CPC met at 7 pm on 7th July. It was good to see several villagers present. The proposal to allow two teams to use the War Memorial Playing Field generated some interest in the village. Alan Crisp attended to voice opposition to this proposal. Claire Piggott, who chairs the WMPF Action Group, attended to argue the case for allowing the proposal. After listening to both sides, the PC discussed the proposal. The result was a vote to approve the proposal provided measures are put in place to ensure, so far as possible, the safety of other users of the WMPF and to limit the number of occasions that two games are played on the same day. Bearing in mind the proximity of the play area, the PC will try and ensure that swearing by players is minimised. The proposal will raise extra money to contribute to the cost of maintaining the WMPF (mainly grass mowing). Last season The Arms paid £400. Next season both teams (The Arms and Andover New Street Under 15's) will pay £500 each. The proposal will be reviewed after the end of the season. Any problems arising from it should be communicated to me, Claire or Mandy.

It is disappointing to report that our plan to graze West Down to keep the undergrowth in check had been delayed. The farmer who was going to put cows on West Down was not able to do so as his cows failed testing for TB. I am told by John Rowles that four Exmoor ponies are now grazing on West Down and that four more will arrive soon. Paths will be trimmed in the next few days. Nettles around the picnic area and benches have been cut down. A public-spirited person pulled some ragwort on West Down and misguidedly left it there. This is absolutely the wrong thing to do. If you pull up ragwort it must be taken away and not left where animals might eat it. It has been reported to me that persons have been seen riding motor cycles on West Down. Please ring me immediately if you see this happening again.

We will be strimming creeping thistles on the Common soon. Would anyone like to help? Please let me know. There does not appear to be any ragwort on the Common but please tell me if you see some. Rabbit control measures we are taking at the allotments have had the unfortunate effect of transferring the problem to my garden. The Flopsy Bunnies have enjoyed my lettuces! I must get in touch with Mr McGregor. I am sorry that the Mark Way footpath is almost impassable. We are intending to clear it as soon as possible but it is quite a big job. Any other problems with footpaths let me or Mandy know.

I have been approached by Maurice Betteridge who is the Hon. Secretary of the local branch of the Parachute Association. He would like to re-start the memorial service at Chilbolton Airfield. CPC is supporting his proposal.

The next First Aid course will take place on either 18/08 or 31/08. May I remind you that funding for defibrillators is dependent on there being shown to be a local demand? So please inundate Mandy with letters, texts, emails or phone calls supporting the proposal to acquire these potentially lifesaving devices. PARISH BRIEFING NOTE

INDIVIDUAL ELECTORAL REGISTRATION (IER)

1. To be able to vote at elections in Great Britain each person needs to be registered as an elector. The Electoral Registration and Administration Act 2013 means that the way people register is changing from 10 June 2014, with the transition to individual electoral registration (IER).

2. IER is a set of processes which involve each individual making their own application for registration, rather than using a household form. The identity of each person in the electoral register is subject to a verification check, initially against the DWP database. Once a person is registered individually under IER their registration is continuous until they move to a different address or for any reason are no longer eligible to remain registered as an elector.

3. People can make applications on a paper form or, for the first time, on-line (through the government digital service portal at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote). Test Valley will also be offering residents the ability to make applications via telephone, via email or in-person to make the registration process as easy and convenient as possible.

4. Applications should usually include the applicant's date of birth and national insurance number, and these with the elector's name are sent for verification against government records. This is to reduce the risk of fraud and inaccurate entries on the register. The outcome of the verification is notified to the registration officer, who must take account of the verification before approving any application.

5. The start of IER will involve confirming the identity of current electors on the electoral roll by comparing entries in the register against national datasets. For Test Valley residents, this confirmation process will start towards the end of June 2014, with the initial write out to electors in mid-July.

6. Electors will receive one of three things: a confirmation letter if they have been automatically matched, an Invitation to Register (ITR) form which will be personalised to the individual or a Household Enquiry Form (HEF) which is a generic, information gathering form to properties. If any electors complete a HEF, which is similar to the current annual canvass form, they will then be sent the personalised ITR forms to supply their date of birth and national insurance number.

7. The vast majority of electors will confirm and will be automatically transferred onto the IER register without having to do anything further. All authorities took part in a 'dry run' in 2013, and approximately 80% of Test

Valley electors matched. Those electors who are not confirmed in this way will be asked to make a new application for registration by means of an invitation to register. Unconfirmed electors who do not respond to this invitation within a reasonable period will be sent further invitations, and must also be canvassed by way of a personal visit to their property, in order to encourage their registration.

8. In 2014, Registration Officers are required to issue:

Confirmation letters to electors whose details have been matched with records held by the DWP, or otherwise verified by the Registration Officer as a result of local data matching;

An Invitation to Register (ITR) to each elector who has not been matched;

Household Enquiry Forms (HEFs) to all properties (where the February 2014 register shows that no elector is registered or where potential electors may be resident);

An ITR to each individual identified as a potential elector on returned HEFs. This means that electors may receive more than one form when they apply to register to vote, as the HEF does not collect the date of birth or national insurance number information; this is only collected on an ITR.

9. We will publish the new IER register on 1 December 2014.

West Down Nature Reserve: As I've explained before, to properly control re-growth of Sycamore and other invasive scrub, we need to have regular grazing in the fenced enclosure of West Down. Our Plan A for grazing the Down this year, was to have Highland cattle, and I know many people were looking forward to seeing them again. We'd arranged for a small herd of privately-owned animals to come, but sadly, in June and after much delay, the required pre-movement testing showed that they were suffering from bovine TB. And under the strict animal movement controls, they couldn't be moved to Chilbolton. We then looked to a Plan B with New Forest cattle (the same type as on the Common). Although that's still a longer-term possibility, the strict TB-testing regime precluded them coming immediately. So it was quickly on to Plan C and at beginning of July, four New Forest ponies arrived on the Down! Scrub grazing by these ponies may not be as effective as scrub grazing by cattle, native-breed sheep, or Exmoor ponies - but it's much better than no grazing at all. We'll see how they perform, and if we can't get any cattle, then maybe we'll add a few more ponies. Meantime, if you visit the Down



- Please do not feed or pet the ponies; it's no good for the animals' health, and they very quickly become a nuisance to everyone. They also become a danger near roads when returned to the New Forest.
- Please keep your dog well away from them – if need be, by having it on a lead whilst within the fenced area.
- Please do not pull up ragwort and leave it. The West Down ponies are from the New Forest, and will not eat live ragwort. But if ragwort is pulled up and left on the ground, then it becomes very palatable, and the ponies *will* eat it - with potentially dire consequences. If you'd like to pull up ragwort, there's no objection (indeed it would be helpful in the long-term) but please take it away with you! Please don't leave dead ragwort lying around (either on West Down or on the Common) where grazing stock might eat it and become sick.





A meeting took place in the Village Hall on 8th July 2014.

Present: Cllrs Sean Hutton (Acting Chairman), Lizzie Broadbent, Susanne Horne, George Hampson, Peter Bryant, Steve Shean, HCC Cllr Andrew Gibson, D Cllr Jim Neal, Cllr David Drew and Liz Blakemore (Clerk)

Apologies: Cllr Andrews

Planning Matters: it was confirmed that the PC had no objections to applications for the Wherwell Priory, Gavel House and removal of conifer tree at Riverside House. We had objected to a proposed development at Lime Tree but this application has now been withdrawn. The Planning Inspector undertook a site visit on 3rd July in consideration of the appeal lodged with respect to the proposed new build on land adjacent to Apple Cottage. A decision to be made in a month's time. The Revised Local Plan goes to TVBC Cabinet on 16th July and full Council on 24th July. It is then submitted to Planning Inspectorate to determine soundness of document. This is likely to involve a public hearing at which interested parties can express their views.

Fracking After discussion it was agreed that Cllr Drew would liaise with the Clerk with regard to holding a fracking information meeting with HCC in conjunction with other villages.

HCC/District Council Matters:

- **Cllr Neal** confirmed that there is a proposal for a second distribution centre on the Andover Airfield for Accado, if approved by TVBC the same travel route restrictions would apply as with the existing distribution centre. Councillors were pleased to learn that the proposed Wind Farms at Bullington and Micheldever had both been refused permission.
- **Cllr Andrew Gibson** confirmed that he was seeking information on key Village Highway problems that he could take to bi- weekly meetings and a policy paper is currently being prepared by HCC with regard to a New Rural Strategy involving the NHS and Better Care Fund. The aim is to improve the support for the long term ill and elderly by developing initiatives to overcome rural isolation and loneliness.

Village Repairs and Maintenance:

- **Installation of Kerbing in Church Street outside Watermeadow property** – the PC robustly objected to the concrete kerbing initially placed in this location allegedly to protect the verge from erosion.

- There appeared to be no good reason for this as it further restricted the width of the carriage way and detracted from the street scene in the conservation area. In order to effect a compromise the PC provided granite kerbstones from its own store on the understanding they would be set back closer to the boundary. The PC notes the high level of workmanship but considers this was a complete waste of time and money when there are far more important road works in the village needing to be addressed. This has been communicated to HCC Highways
- **Cherry Tree** – the PC has again come to the conclusion that the tree should be removed in the autumn given that planning permission has been granted. *Cllr Hutton to organise*. It was also agreed that the PC will decide on a replacement tree and location at the next meeting: 9th September.
- **Dangerous tree on hairpin bend has been reported to HCC.**

Parish Organisations:

- **Village School** – 130 pupils on register for 2015; and there was a brilliant business initiative in Class 5 where pupils were loaned £5 and invited develop business they raised £1,000 for the school through various businesses.
- **Village Hall** – Open Gardens raised £905 and proved to be a very successful event.
- **Playing Field** – Bank holiday Fete 25th August and Last Night of the Proms 13th September (latter in aid of Age UK, PF and Pre-School)
- **Pre- School** – fully booked for September.
- **Parish Church** – June fete raised £6,000; new vicar for the Benefice to be installed in Wherwell on 9th July; Environmental Health have confirmed that clock chimes do not constitute a noise nuisance so will continue to chime on the hour through the night.
- **Home Guard** – committee has been elected for another year and the club continues to provide a range of activities for members and wider community.

Special Project: Defibrillators – Cllr Horne in conjunction with Chilbolton PC is organising the purchase of 2 machines for the village, one to be situated in the phone box in the high street and the other at the playing fields. Cllr Jim Neal reminded the PC that it can bid for matched funding up to £500 from his devolved budget and the same commitment was given by Cllr Gibson.

- They were hand-written with pen and ink and used abbreviations (eg: *Balance*)
- The name of the treasurer; G A Watson Esq.
- Standard company-wide stationary had the name of the Branch overstamped.

In **1946**, we see the introduction of a Barclays Bank logo, and in **1947/48** we see the introduction of double-sided statements (possibly due to a post war paper shortage ?) *(Continued on page 32)*

By 1961, handwriting had been replaced by crude teletype printing, transaction codes had been introduced and cheques were itemised by number

What else may be of interest? Certainly the names of Cricket Club members associated with petty cash expenditure or paying a subscription. Equally important are the names of local businesses; for example Holmes & Son (printer), Parsons & Hart (haberdashery), Wilts & Dorset Motors, Grace & Sons (builder), Andover Lawn Mower Services and Andover Rodent Control. In 1948, there were three payments totalling £133.10s.0d for ‘Sports Field Construction’.

Every year in June and December, a sum of money was paid to the *Commissioners of Inland Revenue*; 9s.6d (48p) in 1937 rising to £2.7s.6d (£2.38p) post war. In **1945**, this was the only payment made in the whole calendar year! Please can any reader tell us what the payment was for?



How many readers remember cheques being returned with statements and cheque books being charged for? In 1952, the charge was 4s.2d (21p).

The cheque illustrated above shows the Treasurer has changed to R H Cooke. The moral is, next time you have a clear out, pause occasionally to reflect ‘does this item have any local historic detail which may interest your local History Group?’
