Pause for Thought

The Rectory Littleton

Dear Friends,

By the time you read this we shall be in the season of Easter, and hopefully spring will be with us after a long and cold winter.

The language of Easter is a mystery to many people, and even Christians can find the idea of 'resurrection' a difficult concept. We are aware of the resurrection of Christ after his crucifixion 2000 years ago, and we should all remember that if he was not raised from the dead, not only was he no use to us, but he was at best deluded, and at worst an arrogant fraud. We cannot simply say that he was a good man who could work miracles, because he saw himself as the fulfillment of Old Testament prophecy, as the Messiah who was to come. So if we accept that Jesus was resurrected in the past, then we might also accept his promise of resurrection in the future for us, the idea of a life to come.

Speculation about the nature of such a life stretches our imagination to its limits, if you imagine trying to explain to an unborn child what life will be like outside the womb you can quickly see that you might get no further than saying 'your umbilical cord will be cut', before the baby would say 'in that case I'd rather stay here thank you!' We cannot imagine the life to come any more than the baby could imagine life outside the womb, but the fact that we cannot imagine it does not mean that it cannot be.

But resurrection is not confined to the past and the future, it is a present opportunity as well. Often, almost without thinking, we can become trapped in an existence which diminishes us, deadening our minds and bodies with a punishing work regime, poisoning our bodies with toxic substances, scarcely

noticing the world around us so that its beauty passes us by, and forgetting to value the people who are closest to us. It has nothing to do with our circumstances, I have met elderly, frail people who radiate a zest for life, and I have known fit young men who are tired of life. To experience the resurrection in this life we need to live fully in the present, not hankering to be somewhere else, or someone else, not killing time until something better comes along, not just living for the next holiday. If we think about it, we all have moments of resurrection experience – they are the times of deepest joy which we wish could last forever.

The Rev'd Francis Kilvert, a priest in the latter half of the 19th century, wrote of such a moment:

I rose early and went out into the fresh, brilliant morning, between six and seven o'clock. The sun had already risen some time, but the grass was still white with the hoar frost. I walked across the common in the bright sunny quiet empty morning, listening to the rising of the lark as he went up in an ecstasy of song into the blue unclouded sky and gave in his Easter morning hymn at Heaven's Gate. Then came the echo and answer of earth as the Easter bells rang out their joy peals from the church towers all round. It was very sweet and lovely, the bright silent sunny morning, and the lark rising and singing alone in the blue and then suddenly the morning air all alive with music of sweet bells ringing for the joy of the resurrection. 'The Lord is risen' smiled the sun, 'The Lord is risen' sang the lark. And the church bells in their joyous pealing answered from tower to tower, 'He is risen indeed'.

It is moments like these that bring resurrection into our own lives, and surely give us a glimpse of the kingdom of heaven.

Wafers for all

A bright, crisp, sunny morning saw people flocking to pack the church on Mothering Sunday. Families arrived with small children, ready to renew their baptismal vows. Regular worshippers, and others who are not regulars but were intrigued by Ros Rason's article in the magazine last month, filled the pews. The spiced scent of wafers drifted in the air. Then ten members of the Baverstock family, representing their extended family, made their entrance, bearing the famous wafering-tongs.

Those who had been baptised in the church came forward to renew their vows by re-lighting baptismal candles. The youngest was only a few months old, the eldest was Evelyn, a Baverstock baptised here over eighty years ago. The address, given by Stuart, involved the children and explained the symbolism of baptism.

Then the Baverstocks presented the Church with the wafering-tongs which had been in their family for hundreds of years, and were thanked on behalf of the PCC and congregation by Churchwarden, Mrs Jane Spence.

Everyone was invited up to receive their fragile, spiced wafer. These had been made over a number of weeks by Ros Rason and Sue Batchelor. Some ate them immediately, others carried them carefully away.

After coffee and cakes, some went home, but many stayed on, and were fascinated to hear from Will, Evelyn and Phyllis, all members of the Baverstock family, of life in Chilbolton during the war years, and of what they could remember of their grandmother's wafering. Like us, she had used her frontroom fire, on which she burned logs. She always insisted on being alone to make them, so she could concentrate on their 'singing', which was all-important in knowing whether they were cooked or not. Her rate of turning them out at one-aminute stunned us. We took two hours to make seventeen!

Young Charlotte Hall listened with rapt concentration to all that was said. When they got home, she was asked by her mother when she was going to eat her wafer. Charlotte replied that she was not going to eat it; she was going to keep it to show her grandchildren that she had been there when the tradition had started again.

Chilbolton Parish Council News

Road safety is the first topic this month. Your Council has acquired notices which will be affixed to wheelie bins as a reminder of the need for speed restraint through the village. Please do whatever you can to see these enforced before we have a nasty accident.

In last month's article, there was reference to grit boxes to supplement the work which the County Council do in keeping roads open in harsh winter conditions. We have heard encouraging remarks from Highways which should result in us having them available in time for next year. Complementing this, arrangements are in hand for the clearance of ditches, streams and culverts, possibly using our own lengthsman, as that scheme is due to start in April as a trial.

Developers pay a sum for improvements to leisure facilities, known as Sect 106 funds. We have found the qualifications too exact for us to get these funds released. This must be the case across the Borough, for our MP Sandra Gidley has written to many parishes seeking their experience. We now await whatever emerges as a result of her interest.

A draft of a new Vision Document has been produced by Cllr Gossling, which declares our aspirations for future projects. He is seeking comments and reaction from the village at large, so if you have an interest in such matters, please contact him.

The Play Area project continues and is discussed in an article by Cllr Picco elsewhere in this magazine. Quite separately, an adventure play feature and herb garden is planned for the pre-school community near the Hall.

The fences on Cow Common have been replaced under the guidance of Cllr Rowles, and an otter holt has been installed. We will shortly be putting out the signs calling for restraint in exercising dogs on the Common, which now becomes even more necessary. Please do your part in enforcing them.

Finally, the directional signs to Stonefield Park are now in place. Hopefully they will help to keep heavy vehicles away from the village.

Your Council next meets on Tue 6 April at 8 pm in the Durnford Room of the Village Hall.

Chilbolton Play Space Project Update

Since the questionnaire towards the end of last year, on whether the village wanted a play space for children, we have been busy doing the necessary research into what is required. As you can imagine there are government rules and regulations for these things which we needed to consider.

Our biggest hurdle has been to find a suitable site on which to put the play space as the Parish does not own one that meets the government set criteria. We evaluated all the questionnaire locations and many more, following the government pre-defined criteria. While doing this we were approached by the new landlord of the Abbotts Mitre (Sam) as he had heard about our land problem. He suggested that the owners of the pub (Enterprise Inns) might be sympathetic to our needs so with his assistance we approached them. They proved very positive and supportive, and on evaluation, the proposed site hit a lot of the required boxes. It also provided a much larger site with more scope for equipment covering a wider age range than the other preferred location at the village hall.

At the Parish Council meeting in March it was agreed to open formal negotiations with Enterprise Inns in order to lease a piece of land from them for a play space. At the same time other members of the council are heading up areas looking at equipment, play surfaces, funding and insurance. We are also looking at ongoing maintenance costs to make sure that we can support the equipment once it is installed. We will be looking to get the opinions of children on the types of equipment they like, to ensure we put something in that our children want to play on.

To support us on the Parish Council we have pulled in the help of a number of people within the village who expressed an interest during the questionnaire, in helping with the project. This is proving invaluable and if anyone feels they have experience to offer then do please get in touch with me, we see this very much as a community project.

Over the coming months I will write further articles for the magazine to keep you up to date on where we are with the project.

WHERWELL PARISH COUNCIL

You may wonder why there is sometimes no report from Wherwell PC in the magazine. With a population of approximately 426 Wherwell is considered a small parish and therefore only meets every two months. There is often little of significance to report in the months when we have not had a meeting. At our last meeting however we certainly had plenty to discuss and to report back on.

We share concerns with local residents that there will, eventually no doubt, be a serious accident caused by cars parked too close to the blind bend on the approach from the High Street to the Mill Lane/ Fullerton Road junction. We know how difficult it is to park in the area but how will you live with your conscience if it is your parked vehicle that causes that accident?

We are very pleased that the work on the new playground at the Playing Fields is progressing so well and nearing completion.

The PC has no objections to the planning application to convert the detached garage at Riverside House, Fullerton Road into a garden room/studio or to the proposed internal alterations to Windwhistle Cottage, Winchester Road and for the application to carry out tree works at The Mowle House, High Street.

Residents of both Chant Close and Beech Grove have concerns regarding potholes. However, as both these roads are unadopted, Testway Housing is responsible for them and in the first instance the residents should inform them of their concerns.

Regarding the allocation of social housing in the village anyone interested in applying for a property in the future must first be registered with TVBC who process all applications on a points system.

District Councillor Jim Neal has been asked to request that the litter on the A3057 be cleared up. In response to our concern about the ongoing problem with mud on the A3057 Cllr Neal has reported back to us that infilling on the site adjacent to the Hampshire Golf Club is to cease as the agreed infill quota has been fulfilled.

It has been agreed that, subject to cost, a model of the cockatrice will be mounted on the Colonel Jenkins' Hall roof.

We have, once again, very kindly been given a quantity of snowdrops to be planted on various sites in and around the village.

County Cllr Andrew Gibson has informed us that an audit of local transport is being undertaken to see if the transport available can be better utilised. He is also looking into the contract specifications and quality of

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highways' work that is carried out on behalf of HCC.

The lack of progress regarding the provision of a footpath from Chant Close around the front of the White Lion is frustrating but we are hopeful that this much needed path will eventually be built.

A grant application has been made to HCC to fund the production of map leaflets which will contain information on several local walks and also for three map boards to be sited in the village, by the Longbridge and in Fullerton.

We are also applying for funding to clear the undergrowth which is obstructing part of the old railway/river bridge on the Testway between Fullerton and Testcombe. We hope then to site a rustic bench on the bridge looking down the river and one on the nearby riverbank overlooking the water meadows. Work has recently been carried out in this area to improve the surface of the Testway. In the future some scalpings are to be provided to improve the level of the track and to facilitate drainage.

We are pleased that James Liddell of Fullerton Farms has kindly agreed that, subject to safety checks, the path from Fullerton Station Yard to Coreys Lane, which goes under the A3057 and over the old railway bridge across the River Anton, will soon be designated as a Permissive Right of Way.

It is irritating to report so far, in spite of a continuing dialogue with call centres overseas, little progress has been made to improve the O2 and Vodaphone mobile phone reception in the village.

Richard Rowles who runs the Wherwell website <u>www.wherwell.net</u> has agreed to make the PC information easier to locate on the site.

As in the past an additional PC meeting will be held on Tuesday 13th April to finalise business at the end of our financial year prior to our AGM on Tuesday 11th May. Both meetings commence at 7.00pm in the Colonel Jenkins' Hall.

Keen-eyed Hall users will have noticed that the shrubs and flower beds are being cut back and tidied up – Thank you, Peter. Shortly, the Horticultural Club will contribute their expertise with an extensive planting scheme. If any villagers wish to donate plants perhaps they might contact Debbie Richardson (861082). The other exciting news is that we are establishing an herb garden for the Pre-School children together with a vegetable patch. It is felt the children should have a good understanding of the way in which the food they eat is grown together with flavours and smells of herbs.

A reminder - the Sunday morning walks will be resuming on the 11th April, commencing at 10.30am from the Village Hall. This year's first stroll will last for about two hours and will head for Chilbolton Common, Redhill and the Fullerton Loop – Dogs Welcome.

Her wise counsel will be missed at meetings but she promises to keep in touch with our activities. Thank you Maria for everything you have done for us and the Village.

Easter is not only a major Christian festival, but also one for chocoholics with an explosion of chocolate in all forms.

The following individual desert cakes have produced a few wows when I served them to friends and family. I discovered the recipe in an article entitled, 'Heavenly Chocolate' in a magazine produced in New Zealand!

Chocolate Cakes with Amaretti Cream and Chocolate Sauce

Cakes

120gm good dark chocolate, melted

4oz butter 31/2oz sugar

3 large eggs

3oz ground almonds

2oz amaretti biscuits – crushed.

Line 6 large muffin tins with papers or circles of greaseproof. Cream the butter and sugar, add the eggs stirring well and fold in the almonds and crushed amaretti biscuits. Fold in the melted chocolate. Spoon into tins and bake for 25 - 30 mins. in a hot oven 180C - cool.

Sauce

150gm good, dark chocolate

1 tbsp butter

½ pt double cream.

Heat the milk and butter until just coming to the boil. Remove from the heat and add the chopped chocolate. Stir until dissolved. Keep warm.

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Cream

Whip 1/4pt of whipping cream and add 2–3 tablespoons of crushed amaretti biscuits.

To serve: Slice a third off the top of the cakes, fill with the amaretti cream, dust with icing sugar and place on individual serving plates adding a 'pool' of chocolate sauce.

Bee Diary April 2010



Writing this in early March, we still have to find out how many of our colonies of bees will survive this long cold winter. At the time of writing all 25 hives are still alive, some appear quite strong in numbers of bees and activity within. On the sunny days, bees fly out to gather water and also early pollen from the hazel catkins. Soon willow will add another source of pollen which is used to create the food to feed to young larvae.

We have been checking varroa mite numbers every month by counting the natural mortality of the varroa mites. Under each hive is a mesh floor, and when the varroa mite dies of old age, it drops through the floor and collects on a plastic tray below. We count a weeks worth of dead varroa from each hive and then feed the results into the National Bee Unit's computer. This calculates the varroa population in each hive and recommends when the hive should be treated to reduce varroa numbers. Currently all our hives are showing low levels of varroa infestation, due to successful treatment with thyme oil aromatherapy last August.

The big concern in springtime is queen bee viability. Unless the queen was well mated at the time of her virgin flight in the summer, the possibility of her failing to lay eggs effectively in the spring is quite high. I believe this is one of the major reasons that colonies fail in springtime. Varroa mites are especially attracted to male drone bee larvae and when these mature, if they have been parasitized by varroa, their potency as mates for the queen is severely diminished. Hence many queens do not mate successfully and run out of sperm at the critical time, when rapid colony spring build up is required, and when it is still far too early to supersede the queen.

Be aware that the bee swarming season will soon be upon us. If you are in that hot tub in the garden in the altogether, and the sky darkens above you with a cloud of bees, listen out for a wooden spoon banging on an old kettle. This will be the beekeeper, chasing his swarm and keeping it in sight. He has a legal right to climb your fence, invade your privacy and to cross your land in full pursuit of his swarm as long as he bangs on that kettle.

This is a wonderful time of year for bees and beekeepers, in fact for anyone who can get out and enjoy the changing season. Spring is in the air, the days are lengthening and bee colonies are expanding rapidly. As the sun climbs in the sky, the trees bud up and flower, the fields of rape turn yellow, the bluebells carpet the woods.

O to be in England, now that spring is here!

Chilbolton & Wherwell Wildlife

The relatively cold weather has continued through February and March, and as I write, both garden and wild flowers are many weeks behind their average dates of first flowering. The sallow blossom, commonly known as pussy willow, is only just beginning to appear, and the bright yellow flowers of celandines are only now just opening in the hedgerows. I would normally expect to see both of these in early February.

There's been much concern nationally, that the prolonged cold weather may



have had a big impact on the populations of some of our less common birds. Birds such as Dartford Warbler and Woodlark, are near the northern limit of their breeding range in southern England, and other species like Cetti's Warbler and Little Egret have only come to this country during the last thirty years of milder winters. Locally at least, the good news is that Egrets are still being seen on the Common as frequently as before the snow, and just downriver near Leckford, there are still at least a couple of Cetti's Warblers singing. Also, today in mid-March, I found a pair of Woodlarks not far away from us on the fringe of Harewood Forest. So, although we won't know

the full impact until after this season's national surveys, it looks as if most bird species have at least survived.

At the same location in the Harewood Forest today, I saw an interesting day-flying moth – the Orange Underwing. This species flies in early spring sunshine around the tops of birch trees. But you can sometimes be lucky and see one settled on a path. They're not a particularly common moth, and are sometimes confused with early-flying butterflies such as the Comma or Small Tortoiseshell. They can be differentiated by showing less orange than the butterfly species, and by their much more erratic flight. Also, even if disturbed quite low down, they quickly return to flitting around the tops of the birch trees. The end of March and first week of April are good times to look out for Orange Underwings around the birch trees on West Down, or almost anywhere in Harewood Forest.
