Pause For Thought

Who could miss Easter? With two bank holidays making a long weekend, a holiday from school or work, maybe a trip away, time with the family, plenty of chocolate, eggs and chicks, it would be hard to overlook it.

But hidden away in the middle of the week after next and, largely unobserved and unnoticed in 21st century Britain, is an anniversary that is no less significant than Easter or Christmas to the Christian religion. Thursday 13 May will be Ascension Day. In many countries it is a public holiday. Ascension Day is celebrated 40 days after Easter Sunday. It is an ecumenical feast that is recognised by all branches of Christianity. Whilst it always falls on a Thursday, with the permission of the Pope in some countries it may be celebrated by the Roman Catholic Church on the Sunday immediately following (16 May), 6 weeks after Easter Sunday. Ascension Day proper is followed 10 days later by Whitsunday or Pentecost (23 May) and then a week later it is Trinity Sunday (30 May).

By now, you may be a little confused. Let me try to explain... Ascension Day marks the day when, according to accounts in the New Testament, in the sight of his disciples, Jesus ascended into Heaven. The clearest account is in The Acts of the Apostles, chapter 1, verses 9-12. "...While they beheld, he was taken up; and a cloud received him out of their sight..."

The nature of Jesus' presence on earth between the Resurrection on Easter Sunday and his ascent into Heaven on Ascension Day has been and will remain a matter for theological debate. I will say no more about that. But after Ascension Day, it is generally believed that he was no longer *visible* here on earth.

At Pentecost, the disciples received the gift of the Holy Spirit, as promised to them by Jesus just before his ascension – for them, an exchange of the visible for the invisible?

The Trinity of God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Ghost (or Spirit) was completed and that is celebrated on Trinity Sunday. My thought is this: it is not easy for us to understand some of the mysteries of the Christian faith, based as they are on accounts handed down through so many generations and translations, embellished and elaborated in the retelling and with apparent inconsistencies and arguably different meanings.

Contrast the clear and simple message that Jesus has passed on to us, and not just for special occasions: Love God, and your neighbour as yourself.


to thank everyone who donated to Breast Cancer Care at our Christmas Concert, raising £194 for this important charity.





The Wherwell History Group

The **Broadlands Archives** are one of the foremost collections of manuscripts in the country. The 4,500 boxes of documents date from the 16th Century to the present. They are an exceptional collection, shedding light on the unique history of the UK and its relations with its colonies and foreign powers. The archives have been housed in the University of Southampton Library's Special Collections for the past 20 years and have been widely used by scholars in the UK and internationally.



The Trustees of the Broadlands Archives have determined to sell the collection. The price is a substantial £2.85 million. A major fund-raising campaign has been running since late 2009. If time runs out or negotiations fail, the expectation is the collection will be sold at auction, and probably broken up and dispersed. Many parts may lost to public access.

Papers of a Foreign Secretary and Prime Minister

Broadlands was home to Henry John Temple, third Viscount Palmerston (1784-1865), who held high office in Whig-Liberal governments – he was Foreign Secretary on three occasions, Home Secretary 1852-5 and Prime Minister twice between 1855 and 1865. His archive contains cabinet papers and ministerial opinions, literary papers, speeches and journals, correspondence filled with detail of life at foreign courts and 1,200 letters from Queen Victoria which lay bare his difficult relationship with the Crown.

The Mountbatten Papers

The papers of Earl Mountbatten of Burma (1900-79) are essential to comprehending empire and the end of colonialism in the 20th Century. Mountbatten was appointed to South East Asia Command in August 1943, when Japan had occupied Burma and the Allied Forces were in serious difficulty. His papers are a prime source for understanding inter-allied operations, the priorities of the different powers and the uneasy relationship between them. After WWII, the papers give insight on whether a post-independence India should be partitioned. (Continued on page 14)

Philanthropy and Social Reform

The diaries of Lord Palmerston's son-in-law, Anthony Ashley-Cooper, seventh Earl of Shaftesbury (1801-85), run to more than 1 million words and provide an essential commentary on the great social reforms of Victorian Britain. Shaftesbury was the architect of measures addressing the evils of employment in factories and mines, the use of child labour and the treatment of lunatics.

The Great War and its aftermath

Lord Mountbatten's father, Prince Louis of Battenberg (1854-1921) married a grand-daughter of Queen Victoria, becoming First Sea Lord, 1912-14. His papers include important military and naval material.

Chilbolton Parish Council News

The Parish Council met on 6 April and heard that one of the two claims, arising out of motor accidents on the bad bend where Martins Lane meets Winchester Street, had been settled. The Road Safety Team of Hampshire County Council have started to compile data about traffic speeds in Martins Lane with a view to making the junction safer.

The Commons Committee was able to report that the track has been repaired and will be closed for a while to allow the repairs to settle. Meanwhile, 200 metres of fencing on the south-west boundary has been replaced, to be followed by 90 metres on the east side. For their help in these projects as well as scrub clearance, we thank the Community Payback Team for their support. The Dog Free signs to protect ground nesting birds have also been put out.

All plots on the allotments have now been let and are being worked with vigour. Fruit trees are to be planted to the left of the wire fence, where the ground is unsuitable for traditional crops.

The Planning Committee reported that the application by Test Valley Housing to build on the land at the top of Branksome Close had finally been approved by TVBC Planning Control after a long struggle by the Council.

Cllr Andrew Gibson, representing Hampshire County Council, reported that he was auditing the work carried out on the roads through Highways contracts. As well as this he had called for a report on transport in local villages to see if further support might be made available to voluntary care groups. He said that the Lengthsman Scheme had started which allowed 40 hours of work for this Parish.

The May meeting of the Council is its AGM, which will be followed by the Parish Assembly when the activities of the past year will be reviewed. It will take place on Tuesday 4 May in the Durnford Room of the Village Hall at 8 pm.

ADVOCACY? WOZAAAT?

So many people say this to me that I thought it was time to write a short article about it.

Who needs advocacy? Well, the typical advocacy client is vulnerable for a whole range of reasons, including old age, disability, ill health, stigmatisation or any other reason. Their problems are extremely varied and no two cases are the same. Their problems might be that they cannot exercise their rights; are unable to secure appropriate benefits because of the complexity of the system; they cannot access justice, social care, secure suitable housing, or they have a nagging problem that they cannot resolve, which is affecting their health and wellbeing.

So what is advocacy? Independent advocates <u>are</u> independent (!); they respect confidentiality; they empower their client and the advocacy assignment is client led. On a typical assignment, an advocate would visit their client and get to know them. This is important because there needs to be a relationship of trust for advocacy to work well. Several visits may be necessary for very disabled people. The advocate will then explain what he or she can and cannot do and then attempt to understand the problem or aspirations of client. The advocate will then support the person to understand the scope of the issue, establish what their goals are, and what information the person may need in order to decide a way forward. The client is supported to get the information and work out what options he has open to him. The advocate will then support the client to understand what the pros and cons of each option are and on the basis of this, the client will decide what they want to do. The advocate will enable the person to complete the process until a satisfactory outcome is achieved, if this is possible.

And the Benefits...? The benefits that accrue from good quality independent advocacy are almost limitless and peculiar to each case; however, most assignments enable the resolution of all manner of problems; achieve aspirations; give peace of mind, improve the sense of wellbeing and instil confidence. The whole process has been confidential and no-one else need know about it.

How can I access independent advocacy? Andover Advocacy Alliance is a local charity that provides independent advocacy across Test Valley. You can call it on 01264 336380 or e-mail to mailbox@advocacy-alliance.org. The service is free to clients.



WHERWELL PARISH COUNCIL

There was an additional PC meeting in April to finalise business at the end of the financial year prior to the AGM on Tuesday 11th May.

Cllr Hutton and the playing fields' committee are to be congratulated on the completion on schedule of the landscaping and upgrading of the equipment in the play area. It was agreed by everyone at the meeting that it has really enhanced the area and that it will no doubt be a source of much enjoyment for children in the years to come. In addition to a generous grant from HCC the PC was very pleased that for this project we finally managed to access some of the monies held by TVBC that were levied from the developers of the new properties recently built in the parish. The building of the new equipment shed at the playing fields is progressing well and should also be completed soon.

The PC has supported the planning application for repointing the brickwork at 6 Chant Close. The tree warden will inspect the trees involved with regard to an application for tree works at Rosemary Cottage. TVBC has approved applications for internal alterations to Windwhistle Cottage, tree works at Mowle House and the conversion of the double garage to a sun room at Riverside House.

We are requesting a sign be placed in the vicinity of the road side chevrons on the descent into the village, indicating that oncoming traffic is likely to be in the middle of the road around the blind corner into the High Street. The river bridge at Winchester Corner has once again been damaged. It has been suggested that more big foreign registered lorries are now coming through the village. TVBC are to be informed again about the problems caused by large lorries coming into the parish and we have asked if there are any weight restrictions on the old railway bridges. The grass verges along Fullerton Road continue to be seriously eroded due to the numbers of lorries who are using this route to access the A3057. Once again deer warning signs for Fullerton Road have been requested as sadly several deer have recently been injured.

District Cllr Neal is pursuing the request that a 40mph limit is implemented along the Longparish Road. County Cllr Gibson is also raising this with HCC and is looking into whether staff changes at HCC will cause yet more delays to the proposed footpath from Chant Close down in front of the White Lion.

The PC shares the frustration of local residents that the derelict mobile home, vehicles and machinery on the parcel of land on the corner of Beech Grove have still not been removed. (Continued on page 26)

The PC believes that the current use of the land detracts from the amenity value of the area and therefore the current use breeches the terms of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 section 215. Cllr Neal is to ask TVBC Planning Department to look into this.

The original cockatrice, the emblem of the village that was once sited on the church roof, is now in the Andover Museum. After much debate and deliberation it is hoped that a replica of it will soon be mounted on the roof of the Village Hall.

It is felt that the galvanised steel handrails recently fitted to the cottages opposite the village War Memorial are not in keeping with the Conservation Area. Once it has been ascertained who installed them it is proposed that the PC offer to fund replacing them with wooden ones.

A grant for £950 has been secured from HCC to assist with the cost of printing leaflets of local walks, map boards and way markers.

Accounts for the last financial year have been approved and it is hoped that Hilary Jennison will kindly agree once more to undertake the internal audit.

The Primary Care Trust is to be asked why no provision was made in the refurbishment of the War Memorial Hospital's out patients' department for the WRVS tea bar. This facility was much appreciated by patients in the past.

Next meeting AGM on Tuesday 11th May commencing at 7.00pm in the Colonel Jenkins' Hall.

Chilbolton & Wherwell Wildlife

Quite a number of people have commented to me on the unusual number of ladybirds they've seen in their homes this spring and asked if this was because of the cold winter. The answer is no. The ladybirds that we now see in our houses, often in clusters around the corners of window-frames, are not a native species of ladybird. They are in fact the harlequin ladybird - *Harmonia axyridis*.

This is a native of eastern Asia that has been introduced in North America and parts of Europe in an attempt to control aphids. The harlequin first came to this country in 2004, and I saw my first one in Chilbolton in 2006. But like many introduced species, it seems to have few natural enemies and has increased to enormous numbers in a very short time.

Fine, you say, it feeds on aphids so that's good. Not so, in fact it's quite bad news! The harlequin is described by some, as the most invasive ladybird on Earth; the species has such an appetite, and is increasing in numbers so rapidly, that it's threatening to wipe out our native ladybirds.

And of greater concern to many people, it's becoming a real nuisance in our homes – because it likes to spend the winter indoors with our central heating. It's not too bad if there are only the 30 or 40 ladybirds that I've seen in my house, but some people in the London area have experienced tens of thousands! With their nasty habit of excreting a foul-smelling liquid when disturbed, this can make them rather unpleasant lodgers.

Oh, and if that weren't enough, they've also been known to bite people when they wake up hungry!! Anyway, I think they are here to stay, and are just another example of the unintended consequences that arise from well-intentioned introductions of non-native species.

Looking forward, what might you see in early-May? Well, look out for the Holly Blue butterfly. The blue butterflies that you see in gardens are nearly always the Holly Blue, and not the Common Blue. In the spring, the Holly Blue lays its eggs on the buds of holly; hence the name. The caterpillars feed on the holly buds, and eventually, new butterflies appear in late summer. But the summer individuals lay their eggs on ivy, and sometimes other garden shrubs. With their need for holly and ivy, Holly Blues are well at home in rural gardens, and though numbers fluctuate from year to year, they are quite common in Chilbolton and Wherwell.

Jane's Kitchen



BY REQUEST – Spiced Lamb Bake (as served at the AGAPE supper)

A mildly spiced supper dish, can be made in advance and freezes well

2lb Minced Lamb

1 level tablespoon mild curry

powder

2 large eating apples

1 large onion

5 no soak apricots

3 oz whole almonds

3 eggs

3/4 pt whole milk

1/4 pt of wholemeal bread

crumbs Seasoning

Juice ½ lemon

Prepare and chop the apples, onion, apricots and whole almonds. Fry the apple and onion in a small amount of oil or margarine. Add the lamb and cook quickly. Remove any excess fat and add the curry powder. Cook for a few minutes and then add the apricots, almonds and lemon juice. Simmer gently for about 20 mins.

Meanwhile soak the breadcrumbs in ½ of the milk and beat the eggs into the remaining milk. Add to lamb, season to taste and pour into a shallow ovenproof dish. Top with a few flaked almonds and bake at 180 degrees for 45 to 60 mins until the top is golden and mince mixture piping hot. Serve warm with fresh vegetables and side salad.

Bee Diary May 2010



What did we do differently? With the long cold winter, we were very concerned that bee colonies would succumb, due to lack of numbers in late March, before the weather warmed up. This is what happened last year, a severe case of spring dwindling caused old bees to die in the spring before new young replacements could be raised. In the spring of 2009, we lost 18 out of 28 colonies, and some of the survivors were painfully weak. Imagine our surprise, therefore, when we confirmed in early April this year that all 25 of our colonies had survived this winter and were expanding very rapidly once the warm weather arrived after Easter. What did we do this year that we missed last year?

It could be true to say that a cold winter is good for the bees. In past years we have had warm periods in January and February, when the bees go out foraging, but find little to bring home. Old bees that go flying die sooner than those who stay home in a cold winter.

There is little doubt that our exercise in queen rearing 2 years ago, when we tried to breed gentle bees from foreign queens to improve the beekeeping experience, introduced a strain of bee that was less able to stand the rigours of our climate. In many cases it was those queens, or their progeny, that died out the following winter. So now we are back to the good old Hampshire mongrel, that survivor of the fittest, whose swarms last May we collected and hived and which now form the backbone of our 25 stocks. The Hampshire mongrels are not the quietest of bees; you need to dress up well when you go visiting, but they do take the weather into their stride and produce good crops of honey.

John Fry believes in cosseting the bees. For him a simple wooden roof on the hive is no good at all for winter. He set to in September and produced duvets for the hives; draft proof covers to go under the roof, filled with Alpaca fur, the very latest in bee hive loft insulation. Now Alpaca fur is full of Alpaca oil, not the sweetest smelling of substances, but none the less very warm. I could imagine the bees, legs crossed and stretched out in the warmth, holding their noses against the unnatural smell in the hive.

The duvets, now smelling sweetly of beeswax, have been removed for the summer, the honey supers are in place and we are hoping for some warm weather for the first honey flow of the year. You can always tell when a honey flow is in progress, there is that wonderful sweet smell of nectar in the air as you walk outside. It is a time when many trees flower and it drives the bees into ecstasies of hard work. Strong hives can add pounds of honey in weight every day a honey flow lasts.
