### **Chilbolton Parish Council**

The Flood Advisory Group met to check preparations for winter. They heard that the promised extra grit boxes should arrive this month. They noted Hampshire County Council plans to add some community roads to the priority one and two roads which are to be treated in severe weather. Leaf sweeping is planned for November as is the cleaning of culverts and drains. Riparian owners are urged to complete their preparations as well but all villagers are asked to note any drains which are blocked by debris and clear them if able.

Following the enthusiastic response by both Wherwell and Chilbolton to the proposals for the Common at the 14 September meeting, we are now planning to start the work, mindful of the need to cater for those of limited mobility as well as the fully fit. By the end of January, visitors to the Common will see:

- The existing parking area protected by dragon's teeth allowing it to recover
- A gate restricting access beyond the sleeper bridge over the stream thus limiting to 14 the number of cars on the common at any one time
- A traffic calming hump on the track at the edge of the cattle grid
- New signs changing the current "dog free area" sign to read "people and dog free area"
- New signs prohibiting the use of barbecue stoves on the Common

The reaction to the meeting on 14 September and contacts afterwards seemed to indicate a mood for a closer relationship between Wherwell and Chilbolton and perhaps, in the New Year, we might organise another one to inform the community of other amenities each Parish has. In the meantime, do note the 30<sup>th</sup> November, when Glynne Evans will give an illustrated talk on the flowers, birds and insects to be found on the Common. It will be in Chilbolton Village Hall, starting at 7.30pm.

The Parish Council will next meet at 8pm on Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup>
November in the Durnford Room of Chilbolton Village Hall.


Thank you to everyone that has already sponsored me; with your help I have already raised £6,500+, but I have set myself a new target and want to reach £10,000.

### Wherwell Church (St Peter & Holy Cross) Fundraising for the Restoration Project

You may have heard or read about a *major restoration project concerning our local village Church*. In summary, the project, which is now underway, includes plans to:

- repair the Nave roof, tower and spire
- strengthen the bell frames and rehang the bells, so the bells are "ring-able"
- replace the heating system
- and redecorate the church interior

The project aims to save the church for the future of our community, by ensuring that it is watertight, structurally sound and more comfortable to visit. We currently envisage the overall cost being around £400,000. The Church has already secured a significant funding commitment from English Heritage (c£150,000). Furthermore, the Church has raised additional monies through various fundraising activities, donations and reserves. We now need to start raising the balance, with £25,000 urgently required before mid December of this year. Some monies will be raised from grant-making trusts. The remainder will be raised over the next few years from donors, both individual and other organisations.

Our volunteer project group, which includes both churchgoers and nonchurchgoers, is starting to arrange *fundraising events around the village*. We anticipate inviting villagers to a number of informal information events during late October and early/mid November. *Watch your post or email or await a phone call for your personal invitation!* 

We see the church being a focal point of our village, not only for worship, but for marking important rites of passage (christenings, marriages and funerals). In our minds, the church is also a social meeting place, a venue for cultural events and a community re-enforcer through activities such as the Summer Fete and Christmas Fayre.

Please support our efforts in saving our village church – we urgently need to raise £25,000 before mid-December of this year!

### **Rattle Rattle THUDUMP!**

Do you recognise that sound? It's the sound of this magazine arriving on your doormat every month packed with articles advertisements and notices about your villages relevant to you. It is produced and distributed by your friends and neighbours, all as volunteers. So we would like to bring you the story of Maggie – your village magazine and how she gets to your door.

Maggie arrives at your door courtesy of over 40 volunteers who collect or receive multiple copies of the magazine from the key distribution contacts in each village. A few days before it arrives it is actually a pile of about 7,000 blank A4 pages, 6,000 A4 pages of adverts and 750 high gloss covers.

Advertisers will pay a fee to be included in the Magazine for a whole year from the October Magazine to September the next year. The funds received from advertisers pay for the paper and printing of the magazine each month. One of our volunteers spends the months of July and August seeking companies who want to advertise, collecting the artwork and agreeing layouts with our printers. We are fortunate to be able to store our advertising print courtesy of another of our volunteers.

As the cover also contains major advertising it is agreed annually for advertising content and then overprinted each month with the appropriate date. This is collected monthly from the printers. So Maggie has everything she needs apart from the input content and information from the villagers and supporters which will fill those 7,000 blank pages.

So let's start at the beginning of the month. The articles and notes and information are submitted to a generic email box up to the 15<sup>th</sup> of the month. We are not able to accept articles after the 15<sup>th</sup> of the month as there is so much done by volunteers after this date to make sure it arrives with you as early as possible the following month. From the 8<sup>th</sup> to the 15<sup>th</sup> of the month one of our team of Content Managers will read and review all articles submitted. These articles are extracted from the emails and transferred to the magazine website ready for processing. Ideally we like to receive articles in MS Word format, A5, narrow margins, Times New Roman and font size 11. This makes the next stage of our process so much easier and less time consuming for our volunteers. If there are any queries arising we will go back to the originator at any stage. Just in case you were wondering, we have between 25 and 40 contributions a month to deal with.

From the 16<sup>th</sup> of the month for approximately 5 days the process moves into first edit ing where another of our volunteers prepares the articles ready to input to the magazine. All the original files are saved before editing so we always have the initial version to refer back to. This ensures any errors are kept to a minimum and we know at any stage which files have been processed and which have not. During this process, dates are collected from the articles for the diary page and a new diary for the current month is produced. Please remember when you tell us something is happening that we need to know the time and location as well as what date it's going to happen. (Continued on page 19)

At this stage we may decide that we need to exclude photographs from the text. Due to the printing methodology we use, photographs do not print clearly, so unless there is real good definition in your submission we may need to exclude it from the finished article.

The next role our volunteers fill is that of Setting Editor. This pulls together all of the articles into one document, ensuring they fit well on the page. Our format means that we have to ensure the articles will fit into 36 pages of text or less in multiples of 4 pages. There may be times you submit a full page or large advert that can only be included if its size is reduced. This is to ensure we can fit as much into the magazine as possible for you, our readers. Where relevant we may add or remove some graphics to enhance the appearance of the finished document.

A final copy is then printed in booklet format and delivered to the volunteer printer. We have an agreement and pay a fee to use the Kings Somborne PCC printer. This takes about half a day as there are 750 copies of each page to print. A master is generated from which the copies are printed. The prints are then delivered to the Collation Manager. On a set day each month up to 20 people meet at Chilbolton Village Hall to collate the content pages with the covers and advertising pages. Once the pages are collated, they are manually folded, stapled and bundled, ready to go to the village distributors and deliverers.

Then as soon as possible after this you get the rattle, rattle, thudump and so it begins again.

### So how can you help us?

- Our teams are always looking for new volunteers. The process is all broken
  down, so each individual fills an editorial or printing role once every three
  or four months. If you are willing to help please contact one of the
  magazine team from the first page of this magazine. Dependent on your
  skills and time we can work to find the best role for you.
- When you send in articles please use our guidelines (A5, narrow margins, Times New Roman and font size 11) as it saves us time in editing and we prefer to use word 97-2003.
- Send us your ideas and your articles as even if you don't want to write the article yourself. One of our team may be able to write it for you.
- Tell us what you would like to see in the magazine.
- Please don't send in photographs for the reasons mentioned above and then we won't disappoint you if we can't include it.

### The Chilbolton Snake

Sometimes it swoops down to envelope the cows, mingles with them a while and then lifts away ignoring them as it has been ignored.

If you are lucky then you can see one of the two barn owls who hunt the Common swoop in and around the snake as they seek large moths or just play hide-and seek. The slow beat of their wings can be heard against the still air and you often hear them before you see them as they keep low over the footpaths seeking prey silly enough to break cover from the long grass. The cows weigh a ton and yet move silently whereas the owls, although they are large, weigh a few ounces and yet you can hear them clearly.

And all the while the snake hovers and lingers until the magical moment when the air temperature over the river changes and the snake of warm air vanishes and you can see the stars again.

The cold night air and the lack of light pollution to the north creates a thick back drop of stars with the occasional shooting star or maybe it is a plane going to Birmingham.

I linger looking over my stable door until I am as cold as the Common itself and then retreat back to the warmth. But before I close the door I see a deer emerge from the mist and cross the river. It stops and stares at me, then eat some weed in the river and moves away back into the trees. Dusk has gone and night is here.

### **Chocolate Brownies Recipe**

#### WHERWELL PARISH COUNCIL

Our regular meetings are normally held on the second Tuesday every other month. However the September meeting had to be postponed until the 21st as our regular date clashed with the public meeting being held by Chilbolton PC regarding the Common. As the magazine copy deadline is the 15th of the month the report of the September meeting could not be put in the October magazine.

It is hoped that our beat policeman PC Jewell will attend the meeting on 9th November to provide more information regarding the proposal that Parish Councils pay £100 towards the cost of radar/handheld speed guns being used on occasions in identified locations within the parish.

Parking as ever is a problem in the village. The police are to be asked to monitor the problems caused by cars continuing to park opposite the entrance to the pub and too close to the junction of the High Street, Mill Lane and Fullerton Road. Drivers parking on the road at night are reminded to ensure that the rear of their vehicle is facing the oncoming traffic.

The PC is continuing its efforts to improve the appearance of the piece of land on the corner of Beech Grove.

The planning application for Lime Tree House was withdrawn in order for a bat survey to be done. The PC supported the application for internal alterations to the Old Rectory.

As it was decided that little benefit was gained from the membership of the Hampshire Association of Local Councils the PC membership has been terminated.

The 2009/10 Annual Return has been passed by the Audit Commission. By incorporating the insurance of the Playing Field with the PC a saving of £500 has been achieved. Test Valley School have been given a donation of £25 to sponsor a prize for school leavers.

It was very disappointing that at the last minute HCC withdrew its offer to purchase part of the tennis courts' site. Unfortunately a sizeable bill of approximately £3K has been accrued for legal costs. HCC are being asked to reimburse us for these costs.

The old pavilion at the playing fields has now been demolished and the play area has been fenced.

More daffodils are to be planted at sites within the parish.

Concerns had been raised regarding funds donated to the church. Future funding given by the PC will be specifically for maintaining the fabric of the church and churchyard. (Continued on page 24)

We would very much appreciate more members of the public attending our meetings. Feedback from parishioners is important and very much welcomed.

### THE LEGEND OF THE WHERWELL COCKATRICE

Legend has it that a duck's egg was incubated by a toad in the cellar of Wherwell Priory. It grew into a cockatrice and set about withering everything around. A reward of four acres of land was offered to anyone who could kill the beast. Several champions came forward only to be slain by the deadly glare of the beast.

Finally a Priory servant named Green lowered a polished steel mirror into the creature's cellar lair. It took its own reflection for another cockatrice and attacked it. Once it exhausted itself fighting its own reflection Green leapt down and killed it with a spear.

It is rumoured that until the 1930's older Wherwell residents refused to eat ducks' eggs. There is an area in Harewood Forest known as 'Green's Acres' where no trees grow. This is reputedly the land given to Green for killing the cockatrice.

A weather vane shaped as a cockatrice adorned the church of St. Peter and Holy Cross church in Wherwell. This weather vane somehow found its way to Chilbolton and was then donated to Andover Museum where it is still displayed. The cockatrice is included in one of the Andover High Street mosaics by Alan Potterin. There are two cockatrices in the coat of arms of Aelfred of Wherwell born in the  $10^{\rm th}$  century.

### **Bee Diary November 2010**



Travelling in China on business, (not beekeeping) I asked at the reception in Chinese owned Shanghai hotel:

- "Please could I have a non smoking room?"
- "Nosmokinroom, you want nosmokinroom?"
- "Yes please"
- "OK, you go lift 21st floor, see floor lady"

On 21<sup>st</sup> floor, floor lady greets me at the lift, having been briefed by reception: "You want nosmokinroom?"

- "Yes please"
- "You come this way."

Floor lady takes me to room, walks in, picks up two ash trays, walks out and says: "There you are sir - your nosmokinroom.....!

I now have some idea of what a bee feels when it is smoked. Smoke is a very important part of beekeeping and leaving your smoker behind is definitely not an option. The aim of using a smoker is to subdue the bees. The theory is that once bees detect smoke they hurry to the stores of honey and fill their honey stomach, in case the colony has to abscond to a new nest site. This trait has developed over the millennia as bees have inhabited holes in trees and have had to survive forest fires. With a full honey stomach bees are less inclined to sting, in fact some say they physically cannot sting with a full honey stomach, somewhat like us attempting to touch our toes after a big meal.

Opening a hive without smoke risks seriously upsetting the bees, an agitated colony will come boiling out of the hive and attack the person disturbing them. Used judicially a waft of smoke over the frames as one takes the lid off has the effect of driving the bees down into the hive and preventing them from flying up in ones face. We generally don't open hives in November, unless urgent varroa treatment is required.

By November the bee colony has adopted its winter mode of operation. The bees have formed a cluster in the shape of a hollow ball on a number of frames in the hive and in the centre of the ball the temperature is maintained at 35 degrees C whilst brood is being reared. Brood rearing slows considerably at this time of year. Worker bees that were born in the autumn can live up to 6 months to see the colony through the winter.

The bees will still fly out of the hive on sunny days to collect water, but there isn't much nectar to gather at this time of year. Jolyon Pope



### **Chilbolton & Wherwell Wildlife**



Thirty years ago, it was very usual to see the first frosts of the year at the beginning of October, and I recall that my office heating was always turned on for the first day of the month! This year, as in so many recent years, it has remained mild for many more weeks. Last week, there were overnight temperatures well into the teens. And as I write in mid-October - all of the trees are still green, I'm seeing butterflies on most days, and the birds are as yet, showing little interest either in my garden seed-feeders or my holly berries. It will of course all change, and as you read this in early November, we may be having a really cold snap! But my point is, that on the average, mild weather is lasting longer into autumn, and of course this in turn is impacting wildlife.

A good example of this change can be seen in the Red Admiral butterfly. Years ago, the species was an immigrant arriving in the late summer, but rarely surviving the winter. Numbers fluctuated from year to year, just as with the Painted Lady butterfly more recently. But we rarely saw a Red Admiral much after September. Nowadays, not only can we see the species on almost every sunny day in late October, but they then go on to hibernate here through the winter, and seem to survive very well. So, look out for Red Admirals in your garden during November. They need to build up their reserves for hibernation, and on sunny days they can be seen imbibing on the juices of rotten apples, or visiting ivy blossom for the nectar. You may even be lucky and see the Red Admiral on a mild sunny day in December or January; let me know if you do.

Chilbolton Common: Following on from the well-attended meeting that was held in mid-September, I've been asked to give an illustrated talk in November with much more detail specifically about the flora and other wildlife of the Common. So if you'd like to find out why the Common is designated as a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), or simply to hear about and see photos of some of Chilbolton Common's more unusual flowers, insects, and birds, then do come along. The talk will be on Tuesday 30<sup>th</sup> November, 7:30pm at Chilbolton Village Hall.

**West Down Volunteers:** Many thanks to those of you who turned out for the first of our monthly volunteer working parties on West Down. We will be continuing through the winter on the second Tuesday of each month and the next session will be on - Tuesday 9<sup>th</sup> November, 10:00am, meeting at the top car-park.

If you're free, do come along and help remove sycamore seedlings from the parts of the downland slope that are too difficult for machinery. It would be good to have many more villagers involved, and let me assure you it's not all hard labour! Last time out, we saw a pair of Kestrels at close quarters, and there were several Small Copper butterflies flitting amongst the flowers where we were working. For the November session, we expect to also have a bonfire to help clear the debris, so bring along a potato that can be baked in the fire!
