Dear Friends

Some of you will know that I find Good Friday the most powerful day in the Christian Calendar. I hope that does not make me seem a masochist, it is not the notion of Jesus being crucified that fascinates me but rather the extraordinary generosity that is shown in every word he spoke at that time, and how that transforms us and our way of seeing the world.

Take for example the words 'Father, forgive them for they do not know what they are doing' (*Luke 23.34*). Forgiveness is not particularly high on many people's agenda these days; they would rather have their 'pound of flesh'. Litigation keeps many lawyers in business and accountability and retribution are often what people demand. Forgiveness may seem, by contrast, to be rather a weak option and Jesus' words can make us feel uncomfortable. How can he find it in his heart to have such compassion on those who were nailing him to a cross?

When we read of a young person like Jo Yeats being callously murdered or a baby dying at the hands of his mother's boyfriend or an elderly person savagely assaulted in their own home forgiveness is the last thing on our minds. Perhaps we even find ourselves toying with the notion of bringing back the death penalty for those who deliberately and callously take the life of an innocent and vulnerable victim.

At least, we feel that they ought to earn their forgiveness by suffering remorse, guilt and punishment; forgiveness ought not to be cheap. That is for most of us, the fairly normal reaction when we are faced with the kind of atrocity that Jesus faced on that first Good Friday.

The trouble with being unable or unwilling to forgive is that it does not often hurt the one we would like to punish. The only person who really gets hurt is the one who withholds forgiveness, the one who becomes vengeful and bitter. For the bitter feelings we cling to eat into our soul, and take over our lives.

A prayer was found by the body of a dead child in Ravensbruck concentration camp, which shows how forgiveness can triumph over suffering. The unknown author wrote:

'O Lord, remember not only the men and women of good will, but also those of ill will. But do not remember all the suffering they have inflicted on us; remember the fruits we have bought, thanks to this suffering -- our comradeship, our loyalty, our humility, our courage, our generosity, the greatness of heart which has grown out of all this, and when they come to judgement let all the fruits which we have borne be their forgiveness'.

At the heart of every hotbed of violence in the world lies the unwillingness to forgive and the desire to avenge old wounds. It is those who simply will not forgive and cannot forget who become bitter and twisted.

But Christ was above such bitterness. It seems that what he says cannot be true. How could they not know what they were doing, those who carried out such a determined, malicious and cruel assault upon an innocent man - of course they must have known that they were killing a man they could not justly condemn, but Jesus gives them the benefit of the doubt, accepting perhaps that they did not recognise him as the Christ, the Son of God.

Why did he do this extraordinary act of mercy? Certainly he demonstrated beyond all doubt that no-one is beyond the reach of the forgiving and redeeming love of God, and that must bring comfort and hope to us all, for there is not one of us who, at some time in our lives, has not needed to feel the consolation of his love and forgiveness. So even in the midst of horror, suffering and tragedy, even where people have carried out terrible, sickening acts, Christ says the words that we find so hard to say, 'Father, forgive them, they know not what they do', offering the opportunity for repentance, the chance to turn away from evil towards a new life, and the hope of salvation.



Wherwell Parish Council

Ten members of the public and County Cllr. Andrew Gibson and District Cllr. Jim Neal attended the recent PC meeting.

Residents of Mill Court informed the PC of their concerns regarding the increase of their rents by 11%. Cllr Neal is to take this up with Testway Housing and he will bring this to the attention of local MP Caroline Nokes.

Mrs Nokes has been contacted regarding the huge recent increases in the cost of fuel and the effect it has on village residents who have to rely on cars for transport.

Serious concerns were expressed to the council, by a local resident, regarding cars speeding through the village. Whilst walking with a small child he had been forced to dive into the hedge to avoid them both being run over. It is frustrating that the PC has repeatedly approached HCC and the police about restricting the speed of vehicles. We are told that there is nothing they can do about this nor about the size of the lorries that come through the village. In future if any pedestrian experiences a similar situation please contact Richard Rowles Tel: 861101, the neighbourhood watch co-ordinator, for an incident report form that will be passed on to the police or ring the police on either **101 or 0845 045 45445**. The PC will continue to lobby for a speed limit of 20mph through the centre of villages

On a more positive note Cllr Neal confirmed that, following a spate of accidents, a speed limit of 40 mph is to be instigated along part of Longparish Road.

The PC had no objections to the planning applications for alterations to Rosemary Cottage Church Street, the demolition of an extension at 6 Chant close, internal and external alterations to Flat 2, Fullerton Manor, the change of use of farm buildings at Cottonworth Farm and the tree works at Ivy Cottage, High Street.

A grant of £500 to the PC from Cllr Gibson's devolved funds has been given to the church restoration fund.

Concerns are to be passed on to the PCC regarding the condition of the old flint wall at the bottom of Church, as it thought that the damage is being caused by the proximity of trees on church ground.

A grit bin to be positioned in the vicinity of the church car park cannot be provided by HCC as it would be on church land.

Work is continuing on the local walks leaflet and the information to be included on three mapboards to be sited in the village centre, by the Longbridge and at Fullerton. TVBC has produced a new leaflet entitled the Sprat and Winkle Line – which was the name of the old railway line that ran through the Test Valley from Redbridge, Southampton to Andover junction.

Copies of this fascinating leaflet are available in the White Lion or from TVBC.

It is frustrating that due to some legal complications the commencement of work, for the footpath down from Chant Close, has been delayed. We are very pleased however that Testway Housing has agreed to contribute $\pounds 4K$ to the cost.

The playing fields' committee are seeking grants to renovate the tennis courts. Offers of help from anyone interested in playing tennis in the future would be very welcome and the work might then get completed quicker! The junior section of the cricket club now has 20 members including several girls. It is hoped that funding can be found to install some badly needed new cricket nets.

Following the Village Conversation reported in last month's magazine an initial tea afternoon was recently held at the White Lion which was well attended and had visitors from Andover, Longparish and Chilbolton. Further events will be announced soon.

If anyone is interested in standing as a candidate for the Parish Council Elections to be held in 5th May please contact the clerk, Liz Blakemore Tel: 860385.

To celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee next year it has been suggested that a mass of assorted bulbs are planted throughout the parish that should then multiply over the years. This would enhance the area and benefit both residents and visitors alike. If you have any comments or other proposals please let me or the clerk know.

The Parish Council was very sad to hear that Sharon Goss had passed away. We send our deepest sympathy to David, Rachel and Adam. Next PC meeting commencing at 7.00pm in the Colonel Jenkins' Hall on Tuesday 12th April.

Chilbolton Parish Council

The Parish Council met as usual on March 1st the first Tuesday in the month. We heard that the village now own the Grade 2 listed telephone kiosk on Grindstone Green and the Amenities Officer, Cllr Gossling, is open for suggestions as to how it might be used.

The Play Area project is now at a critical stage. Funding no longer seems a major constraint and the legal aspects are being sorted out. The next phase will be to brief those most affected prior to letting a contract to install the preferred equipment.

The Council considered the routine reports, noting the repairs to the road at Gravel Hill and in Drove Road. The Flood Advisory Group had little to say, except to note that the river flow is still well below seasonal average. The promised work on the Common has been completed as has been the pollarding of the willows by the Purligig Bridge. An earth bund shielding the allotments from the dangerous corner by Martins Lane has been approved and work to build it will start shortly.

As for the Neighbourhood Watch scheme, the Council were pleased to see that Maria Watson has now had a better response and it can now be said to be up and running. Please continue to give her your support.

The most important matter facing the Parish Council now is the Council Election on Thursday 5th May. Nominations have to be at TVBC's offices at Beech Hurst by noon on the 4th April. Nomination papers are now available from Liz Blakemore, the Parish Clerk. The point to note is the need for urgency. If you are an energetic villager, committed to keeping our village as beautiful as it is and would like to join the Parish Council, then act today. The demands on your time will be modest and Council work can be made to fit your busy domestic schedule. Chilbolton needs and deserves your support, so please act now.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be at 8pm on Tuesday 5th April in the Durnford Room of the Village Hall.





Chilbolton Dance Group

In the Parish Magazine for February 2011, there was a copy of a Press Cutting about the Girls from Utopia, and an appeal for help with contacting their teacher and choreographer Marianne Frost. We had responses from three local people, and were able to contact Marianne and receive photographs and historical information. Marianne writes:

"I moved to Chilbolton in 1979, and after a couple of months I realised there was not much to do for the children and teenagers from the village. Because of my passion for dance, and being involved through my career for many years, I decided to start up the Dance Group. About the same time, I started weekly Keep Fit classes for ladies in Chilbolton and Wherwell, which were held in both village halls.. The dance group ran on Sunday nights for the over 12s and Saturday mornings for the younger children. These classes became very popular and attracted members from both villages, plus a few from Andover. I started with about 15 members and after a few months the number had grown to 50 plus (see 1985/86 photo below)"

"Within a year I had taken the most talented dancers and formed Utopia. They went on to perform in shows, night clubs, fetes, parties etc., and were soon dancing in the top London clubs, including the famous Hippodrome. They became very well known in the local area, and appeared in the local paper many times. I arranged yearly shows in both village halls, and then progressed to the Cricklade theatre. By 1982, from jumble sales, sponsored walks etc., we had raised sufficient funds to buy an old 15-seater mini bus. Ron Waite, who worked in the garage behind Chilbolton shop, sprayed the van free of charge."

"We were now on the road in our 'fab' burgundy and gold van. It was beautifully sign written on the sides "UTOPIA" with gold stars and "CHILBOLTON DANCE GROUP" on the back doors. Our van took us camping to Hayling Island and on one special occasion all the way to the south of France for 2 weeks. By now, Utopia were dancing all over the South of England. They entered many dance competitions ... and they always won !!"

Marianne (now known as Marianne Rouse) is still teaching to this day, and running a dance club with her daughter Emmeline; - "F.L. Dance" in Andover has over 200 members.


A number of parents have had close shaves with traffic on the main road in Wherwell. If you have had an incident, however

Bee Diary April 2011(and gliding memories)





I enjoyed very much reading Liz Sparrow's article (great name for a glider pilot!) last month on what she got up to at the weekend, training for the Women's World Gliding Championships in Sweden this summer. I wish you all the very best, Liz, in your Standard Cirrus. Perhaps you could start a "gliding diary" for the parish mag; I for one would be an avid reader.

Long ago, before wife, children and bees came along; I used to go gliding myself. I did a basic course at Dunkeswell in Devon in a Blanik glider, then joined Thames Valley GC at Booker near High Wycombe. I went solo and enjoyed a couple of seasons, but never progressed to cross country. It is a great sport; it was certainly very thrilling on several occasions. Glider pilots rarely tell of their "near misses"; there is an element of the "Right Stuff" about glider pilots (have you seen that great film?). From my memories every gliding club is a bit like Pancho Barnes' "Happy Bar and Riding Club", with wonderful characters who are always there. I bet if I walked into Booker or Lasham gliding clubs today, some of the same old faces would be there as they were back in the 1970s, not as young, but today some are coaches for Team GB.

For me, gliding progressed into sailing, I shared a 21ft Freedom with a friend and we spent several summers around the English Channel, the Channel Islands and the North Brittany coast. That progressed into cruising and racing a larger 33ft Sigma, which started to feel a bit like standing under the proverbial cold shower tearing up £20 notes.

It occurs to me that whatever one does as a hobby, whether it is gliding, sailing or bee keeping, it is the complete break from the day job that is so valuable. When we were sailing, frazzled merchant bankers, after a hard week in the city would stagger onto their boats on a Friday night and start a cross channel JOG race which would last all weekend. They would get virtually no sleep, sitting on the rail to keep the boat upright. On Sunday evening they were physically exhausted, but mentally relaxed, to start their jobs again on Monday morning.

John Fry has been carrying out a scientific experiment. He was convinced that the narrow hive entrances he had made for all our hives were sufficiently narrow to prevent mice from entering the hives during the winter. I wasn't convinced; I have read about how mice can squeeze through any opening they could fit their skulls through. So we have laboriously fitted metal mouse guards to every hive in October. John caught two mice and confined them inside a brood box, a glass sheet on top, with the narrow hive entrance open. The mice were still there three days later which proves, according to John, that we can dispense with the mouse guards. Chilbolton & Wherwell Wildlife

As I write it's a lovely sunny spring day! And the Brimstone butterflies are flying in my garden. The early butterflies emerging from hibernation are always a welcome sight; I've also seen a Peacock butterfly, and another villager reported seeing a Comma.



But the relatively small numbers of butterflies we see in March are as nothing compared with the moths. A few nights ago, on the first mild night for a while, I ran my light-trap in a Wherwell garden - adjacent to the Harewood Forest. In the morning, there were 1,400 moths inside the trap! Despite the numbers, there were in fact only sixteen species, and most were moths called "Quakers" (Small Quakers, Common Quakers, and Twinspotted Quakers) whose caterpillars feed mainly on Oak. Unlike the early butterflies that all hibernate as adults, the Quakers spend the winter as a chrysalis (pupa) – and then they hatch out in the first mild weather. I've never previously caught so many moths in one trap, and it may be that the cold December killed off parasites and fungal infections that would otherwise have reduced the number of pupae. The cold winter certainly didn't diminish the moth numbers! Needless to say (as I always hasten to add when mentioning moth-traps) all the moths were released unharmed.

At Chilbolton, another spring-time pleasure is provided by the nesting Lapwing in the telescope area, and their wonderful "pee-wit" calls and their aerobatic dive-bombing display flight. Numbers there have dwindled in recent years, very likely as a result of disturbance from less well-controlled dogs. But now that most of the area is well-fenced, it will be interesting to see if our local Lapwing population returns to previous levels. Early indications are that it will, and quite a lot of birds seemed to be setting up territory by mid-March.

I also recently saw a large flock of over 400 Golden Plover near the telescope. These birds are winter visitors and won't be staying around; they nest on the upland moors of Northern England and Scotland and will be heading back there by the time you read this edition of the magazine. And spring will be properly here. So why not join me for a spring-time **Dawn Chorus walk** – meet at the top car-park
