#### Dear Friends

At the risk of seeming to continue to talk about the Royal wedding, when a cynical media all too often wants us to constantly move on to the next story of disaster and gloom, wasn't it a wonderful day for all concerned! The Royal wedding was an occasion that as individuals, a nation and indeed the world we wanted to be witness to and by so doing be part of that story. What is at the heart of that story and why is it so appealing to such a wide variety of people?

Can you, or indeed would you want to imagine a Royal wedding without all the ceremonial pomp, without the military in all their ceremonial uniforms and without a grand and imposing church being used? People from all around the world, spanning the political and celebrity spectrum, with all their transitory powers and fame sat in Westminster Abbey and were reminded of the eternal and universal power of God.

# CHILBOLTON PARISH COUNCIL

A new Parish Council was formed on the 5<sup>th</sup> of May. It convened for the first time at the Annual General Meeting on the 10<sup>th</sup> May and set out the programme for the year ahead. The AGM was followed by the Annual Parish Assembly when representatives of various clubs and associations presented their reports to the Parish Council and the members of the public attending as did local and county councillors.

The current council gave thanks to the retiring chairman, Jeremy Baines and the other councillors who did not seek re-election. It is easier for the new council to make progress when the affairs of the Council were left is such a good and ordered state. We are fortunate that there are four new members to the Parish Council namely Tony Ewer, Will Austin, and Patrick Coates who will bring energy and freshness to our debates. John Irish returned after a short absence. I am conscious that the Council does not have any young members, females or any members with young children so every effort will be made to canvass their views as to what they would like the Parish Council to do for them.

At the AGM the accounts were presented which show that the precept remained at £10,000 but after fixed costs such as insurance, hire of hall, the Clerk's salary and other expenses we only had circa £5,600 available to spend. The annual grant to maintain the Common is £6,265.

I can foresee that the problems of parking on the Common by visitors from far and wide on hot days will continue to cause difficulties. It could well be that we will have to have a further public meeting later this year to discuss more wide ranging ideas which might include restricting the parking along Village Street and on the Common itself. As you will be aware there are no rights to park on the Common something which is not known to outsiders. Any notions which called for radical proposals to control the visitors by cutting down on parking if they had the full support of the Village would then need to be discussed with TVBC and HCC. But this will be the subject of further discussions. There is no easy answer, the Common is owned by the Parish Council and the police will not usually take any action against those people who block access on the Common or to Joys Lane or light fires. The Council does not have the resources to police or take legal action against those who use the Common in contravention of the conditions imposed upon us by Natural England. This is a difficult problem with no easy solution.

The proposals for the play area suffered a setback as one of the main sponsors was unable to provide funding. But we still wish to proceed, after full consultation with local people, with a smaller scheme on the same site in the garden of the Abbots Mitre.

I am pleased to report that the boundary problems which had dogged us for several years at Grindstone Green looks to be at an end. I would like to record the Council's thanks to Gavin Hamilton and Helen Bradley for their advice and help in this matter.

So, with your help, guidance and contributions the Parish Council hopes to continue to improve and enhance this beautiful village in which we live.

The co-ordinators of the new Chilbolton Neighbourhood Watch Scheme had their first meeting on 18 April when it was decided not to pursue making the village a "No Cold Calling Zone". This decision was taken as it was thought that encouragement should be given to young people in this economic climate and that enforcement of the ruling would be almost impossible. Instead, door/gate stickers to say that goods and services are not bought at the door and not to cold call are available from your area coordinator or from me.

I have been made aware of the resurfacing of an old telephone scam where the caller threatens to cut off your phone unless you pay immediately by debit/credit card. This is just a ruse to get your card numbers which should never ever be given out over the phone and would never be requested by a bona fide company.

# **Tools For Self-Reliance**





**Tools for Self Reliance** is a small UK based charity working to help relieve poverty in Africa. Our approach to development is to focus on the artisan sector in rural communities. We have a small number of staff and hundreds of volunteers who help to collect and refurbish tools. At Netley Marsh, TFSR have a variety of workshops:

**The main tools workshop** – Here TFSR clean and repair hand tools, ranging from screwdrivers and saws to hand-operated pillar drills and blowlamps. Our few qualified electrical engineering volunteers carry out safety tests and repairs to the electric sewing machines and power tools that we send.

**The machine shop** – Here TFSR have a range of machines, including a grit blaster, several bench grinders, a lathe for more technical jobs and some specialist saw-sharpening machines which are used to speed up refurbishing.

**The special projects room** – for the occasional refurbishment of machinery such as lathes, planers, power pillar drills.

**The sewing machine workshop** -- At least a third of the kits TFSR send are sewing kits, which contain one or more sewing machines; all expertly serviced and ready to be used for many years to come.

**The wood workshop** – primarily for making boxes to house the tool kits and treadle sewing machines, using second-hand timber free from local companies. TFSR need 400 boxes a year to protect the kits in their container voyage from Netley to Africa.

One of my ex-IBM colleagues is a TFSR volunteer. If you have any tools suitable for a new lease of life in Africa, please contact me and I will make arrangements for collection. Thank you.

# **Wherwell Church Restoration Project**

# ARE YOU A BELLRINGER IN THE MAKING?



You are probably aware of the major restoration of St. Peter and Holy Cross Church in Wherwell; with Phase 1 (the replacement of the Nave roof and the re-shingling of the tower and spire) having commenced in March. But did you know that as part of the overall restoration programme, we are going to get the peal of five bells (four of which date from 1707) ringing again?

Initially, principally because of cost, we are going to put in some equipment called an Ellacombe chiming frame to enable the bells to be chimed by one person. This apparatus will be installed towards the end of this year and we hope to have the bells ringing out again before Christmas.

In the future, we hope to get back to "full circle" ringing of the bells, while still retaining the chiming equipment. Much of the funding for this work should be from various grant-making bodies although we are still looking to raise funds from within the community. Moving to full circle ringing will depend on the community's wish to have the bells fully reinstated and also being able to train up and maintain a ringing team.

# **VOLUNTEERS NEEDED – LEARN HOW TO RING THE BELLS!**

We are now looking to enrol a few more people from the local area to join a small group who have already indicated an interest in learning to chime. The group will be trained to use the Ellacombe chiming equipment and taught a number of methods, tunes and chords that can then be rung (chimed) on the five bells. Learning to use the apparatus is simple and not overly strenuous and learning the method ringing in this form is also relatively simple.

Edmund Wratten, our Tower Correspondent, is an experienced bell ringer and has offered to help train up the team. Within the Downs Benefice, Tim Speakman of St. Catherine's Church Littleton, who manages their chiming apparatus, has also offered to help.

Once competent, the team working in pairs would run a rota system that would probably mean only having to chime the bells once every five weeks or so, for up to fifteen minutes ahead of the Sunday service plus ringing at weddings and the occasional practice session.

So if you are interested please get in touch with me. You never know this might be the first step in getting involved with a team of bell ringers who one day will be ringing a full peal of Gransire or Stedman Doubles on the Wherwell bells! What's that you ask? Well ring me and find out!

# <u>Recipe for afternoon tea scones</u> (with thanks to Sue Williams)

8oz or 225g flour (strong plain flour is best)

2 tsp baking powder 2oz or 50g margarine or butter 1oz or 25g caster sugar 1 egg beaten and made up to ¼ pint or 150ml with milk

Pre- heat oven to 220 C, grease a baking sheet.

#### Method

Rub butter into the flour and baking powder. Add sugar. Then add egg and milk and mix to make a soft dough.

Roll out dough on floured board to a thickness of about ¾ inch or 2 cm. Use a 2 inch or 4.5cm cutter and place scones on greased tray. Dust each one with flour.

Bake near the top of the oven for 12-15 minutes.

# WHERWELL PARISH COUNCIL

The last meeting was in April which dealt solely with tying up loose ends of business at the end of the financial year. The AGM and Annual Parish Assembly was held on 17<sup>th</sup> May, but as this was after the deadline for this month's magazine, the report will be in the July issue.

Since the last full PC meeting in March a lot of work has been going on. Cllrs. had to complete the paperwork for the PC elections, but with no other candidates the members of the PC remains unchanged.

Concerns were again raised at the March meeting regarding the danger of speeding vehicles going through the village. Several complaints have also been made regarding the problems of vehicles parking on the junction of Church Street and Winchester Street and also in close proximity to the junction of Mill Lane, Fullerton Road Other problems causing concern are the number and High Street. of HGVs coming through the village and the increase in parking in the vicinity of the Long Bridge especially over the Bank Holidays. County Cllr. Andrew Gibson, District Councillor Jim Neal, HCC Highways Department, TVBC traffic Management and PC Richard Jewell our beat policeman have all been informed of these concerns. Whilst attending the opening of the new IT department at the school I took the opportunity to talk to Caroline Nokes, our MP, about the problems and to ask for her support to instigate 20 mph speed limits in all villages that do not have adequate pavements. As she had recently been campaigning in the area she was well aware of the dangers from speeding traffic within Wherwell and Chilbolton. On occasions many drivers are guilty of driving a little over the speed limit. However, if the limit is lowered to 20 mph then, hopefully, most cars would then be going slower than 30 mph. Statistically there is a significantly better chance of a pedestrian surviving a collision with a vehicle travelling below 30mph than above it.

Risk assessments have to be done for just about every aspect of our lives but as far as road safety is concerned, until there is a serious accident, there it is no consideration for preventative measures being introduced to prevent an accident occurring.

An argument against lowering the speed limit is the difficulty of policing it. As the 30mph limit is so rarely policed in our village this does not seem a relevant argument. Having been on the back burner for a few months, it seems that, with a contribution from parish councils, the police should soon have more hand held speeding guns and will be using them more regularly. However, if a vehicle is doing less than 30 mph, in the centre of the village, although this is, without doubt dangerous, could any action be taken if the speed limit is not being exceeded? Realistically it is going to be tough to get the speed limit lowered but we must do everything possible to make villages safer for pedestrians. Continuing the theme of road safety the provision of the footway around the corner of the White Lion is delayed awaiting the legalities involved in the transfer of land from the brewery to HCC. Testway should be praised for their very prompt agreement and offer of funding for this project. We also hope that the installation of a 40 mph speed limit will commence shortly along part of the Longparish Road.

Cllr. Andrew Gibson and Cllr. Jim Neal were also contacted about the ongoing road works on the Winchester Road leading in and out of Andover. On occasions there have been long tailbacks particularly going into town. It was suggested that signs warning of possible delays should have been installed.

Formatting of the 'Exploring Wherwell' footpath leaflet and the map boards has taken a lot of time. We are now awaiting the final proofs and hope that these projects will be finished very soon.

# **Charity Cycling in Chilbolton**

I would welcome hearing about any Chilbolton based cycling stories to support the growing interest in the village for increased exercise and healthy living.

Following a fast Charity fundraising ride from John O'Groats to Lands End (1,000 miles

plus) over Easter, in aid of Andover Young Carer's, my son and I (plus 16 others) will be cycling to raise money for Cancer Research UK (CRUK) by riding from Switzerland to Sicily in June. The Italian ride is over 950 mile through some of the most beautiful countryside in Europe so it should be a brilliant experience. We will be meeting the Head of CRUK, Professor Peter Johnson, in Lugano where he will start the ride during a brief gap in his lecture at a conference in Lugano, Switzerland. The details of the trip are as follows:

# **Italy Top to Toe**

Inspired Living, a branch of CRUK, following the success of the Winchester to Gibraltar fundraising event last year, has focussed its fundraising efforts on Italy for 2011. The Gibraltar event and the Cycle4Life mass ride in September, 2010, together raised £89,000 for CRUK. The Inspired Living committee was a really focussed group of very professional people who effectively achieved the impossible.

In 2011 Inspired Living has the Italian Top to Toe event between the 15<sup>th</sup> June and 26<sup>th</sup> June and this will link into the mass event with the Tour of the Meon Valley on 4<sup>th</sup> September starting and finishing at St Swithun's School Winchester. All the Italian team will ride the Tour of the Meon valley supported by their families.

The Italian event will be started in Lugano, Switzerland by the eminent Professor Peter Johnson from Cancer Research UK who will be lecturing in Lugano.

# Chilbolton and Wherwell Wildlife



The hot dry April weather was a problem for gardeners and farmers, but was much appreciated by some of the spring-flying butterflies. West Down's special chalk downland species, the Grizzled Skipper and Brown Argus, were flying in profusion by early May. We also saw the slightly more unusual Dingy Skipper for the first time at West Down, and then to our amazement a real rarity – the Pearl-bordered Fritillary. We're not too sure where this species might have come from (there aren't any colonies nearby), but the caterpillars feed on Dog Violets so West Down may now be to its liking. Meanwhile, and not to be out-done, Harewood Forest was also in the *Lepidoptera* limelight, with reports there of the rare "Duke of Burgundy" fritillary, and a very rare sunshine-loving moth – the "Argent and Sable". Apparently, both the Duke of Burgundy and the Pearl-bordered Fritillary have done exceptionally well everywhere in Southern England this year, so maybe they'll now stick around in our area.

The month of May is a time when many of our migrant birds are arriving in numbers, and sometimes we see unusual birds that are just passing through. Common Sandpiper is one species I see every year along our river as they head for the upland streams of northern England. And most years, river-keepers and fishermen report that they've seen Ospreys – pausing to take a fish whilst on their way, probably to Scotland. But I was surprised to see an Osprey myself this year as it headed overland several miles from the river. It was a beautiful clear morning, and Sheila and I were treated to the amazing sight of three Buzzards, two Red Kites, and the Osprey, all in view at the same time. And all within the parish of Chilbolton! So do keep your eyes open you never know what you might see in the sky.

By the time you read this, we'll be into June. There'll be a lot more butterflies, and the garden birds will all be feeding their young. Do tell me if you see a Spotted Flycatcher; they're increasingly rare but still a few coming to the Test Valley villages. And don't forget our **West Down Glow-worm** hunt – 9.00pm, Friday 24<sup>th</sup> June. Meet at top car-park. We'll need to stay till after dark for this one, so at least till 11.00pm.

# Bee Diary June 2011



One reads constantly in the press about how bees are under pressure, about colony losses, disease, loss of pollination, resulting food shortages, apocalypse tomorrow. The one gleaming light in all this is that the bees don't read the press.

This spring has been the best season for honey bees that I can recall since I started beekeeping again in the early 1990s. We came through winter with all 24 colonies intact. Of these only two were slightly weak, all the others were fighting fit and started to expand with astonishing rapidity, we had some hives with two supers of honey almost full by the middle of April, even before the rape started flowering, which is unheard of. It means that the hives were about one month advanced upon their normal expansion programme. This is all to do with the exceptional spring weather, which suited the bees.

Of course this advanced state means that attempts to swarm have been very common through May and June, so we have been working every weekend to persuade the bees not to swarm. The normal way to prevent swarming is to split colonies into two, but you have to have enough spare hives to do this, and no beekeeper ever has enough spare hives when the bees are swarming.

As well as the bees expanding well, so is Andover Beekeepers Association. From a low point of 18 members 5 years ago, we now have about 95 members. If you were in the middle of Chilbolton village on Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> May, you may have seen a convocation of white suited beekeepers who came to see our bees and afterwards came in for tea. There was some alarm amongst the habitués of the Abbots Mitre, when one of the wits of our association made out that we were chemical and biological warfare specialists about to descend upon the establishment.

Whilst the hives are full of bees, the temperature inside the hive remains warm, and prevents the honey from setting. Rape combined with tree honey is very prone to set hard in the combs and if allowed to cool it will set very rapidly. We therefore had a race against time in mid May to prevent the bees from swarming and to remove the first honey crop whilst it was still in a liquid state. The warm weather in April and early May had allowed the bees to reduce the water content of the honey to a very low level which results in a thicker and denser honey. There will be some of this excellent 2011 spring vintage Chilbolton Honey on sale at the Fete on 25<sup>th</sup> June.

Throughout June we will be continuing our swarm prevention measures, with 24 hives it takes us about a full day every week to get round the 4 apiaries. June is a tricky time for the bees, the spring flowers are over and the summer flowers are yet to come out. In some years this "June Gap" can cause the bees to go hungry if too much honey has been removed from the hive during the May spring honey harvest.
