Pause for Thought

Dear Friends,

We've reached the time of the year when the clocks have gone back, the dark evenings are here, Hallowe'en and Bonfire Night are past and we're looking towards Christmas. Actually, the commercial world seems to have been looking forward to Christmas from the moment that the suntan lotion and holiday brochures disappeared from the shelves. But let's not go too fast. There are lots of preparations to be made before we reach Christmas Day. Already a feeling of panic may have come over us, as we wonder how we shall ever have everything done in time; the cards sent, the presents bought and wrapped, the food prepared.

In the rush, do we stop to ask ourselves why we're making all these preparations? If the question is asked, various answers may be given: "Well, the family expect it"; "It's a holiday from work, though it's too long"; "You can't disappoint the kids, can you? It's really for them, isn't it?" Some people don't seem to see any point: "It's just a commercial spree"; "I can't be bothered with it." Yet stopping to ask the question and to think through the answer helps us to see life in a very different way.

A child once said: "Christmas is really good; Jesus has the birthday and we get the presents." There's a lot of 'getting' during the Christmas season. Most of us probably appreciate the presents, apart from the occasional "white elephant" that seems to find its way onto the Christmas tree, ending

up forever in the drawer, or at the next jumble sale. There's no reason why we shouldn't enjoy receiving. After all, it's the other side of giving, which is at the heart of the Christmas festival. Christmas begins with that. It was God who first gave to us, out of his love for us. He sent Jesus, his beloved Son, as the child born to Mary, so that we might become forever God's children.

The Church calls the celebration of the birth of Jesus the Feast of the Incarnation. This is a way of saying that Jesus took on human flesh. He came to share our human life. The Bible tells us about his experiences. He lived a family life as a child. As an adult he knew deprivation and temptation; he had friends and enemies; he relaxed with his friends at a wedding and later was deserted by them; he felt pity and was moved to tears, mourning the loss of a friend. Finally he met death. Whilst he shared our life he was sharing his life with us, showing us what God is like. In the words of the Christmas gospel, Jesus is "full of grace and truth" and he shows us that our God is a God of love.

This is the joy and wonder of Christmas. Our God has become one of us, lived our life and died our death. At Easter, we rejoice that he has overcome death for us. Christ's Resurrection is central to our faith. But there could have been no Resurrection without the Incarnation. The birth of Jesus is so important that some of the gospel writers wanted to explain the circumstances of it, telling us of angels, shepherds and wise men. We may or may not find this helpful. But this we may know: in the Christ Child, God became man for love of us. O come let us adore him.

Like our Christmas gifts, God's gift of love needs to be received. Are we going to receive and use it? Or is it going to suffer the same fate as those unsuccessful presents, put away in a drawer and gathering dust? We in turn are called to give in love, as God in his love gives to us.

A well known Christmas carol starts with the words:

"Joy to the world, the Lord has come, Let earth receive her king".

With all the members of the ministry team I wish you all a Christmas filled with joy and wonder and a New Year of giving and receiving in love.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT FOR DECEMBER

Your Council met on 3rd November. In the main, it was routine housekeeping which featured on the agenda. All outstanding Highway matters had been discussed with the Highways Engineer, principal among which was the road between Chilbolton and Wherwell which is still only part completed. Meanwhile, Liz Blakemore, the Clerk, verified that Chilbolton is on the list for leaf sweeping in December.

The Council was told of mole infestation on the playing fields and of the new orientation maps which, we hope, will reduce the car parking problem on Cow Common by showing where cars may be left elsewhere in the village.

Developers are obliged to contribute to village recreational projects and currently funds earmarked for Chilbolton are held by TVBC. The Parish Council is considering how they could be used and are open to suggestions. In addition, a recent grant from HCC will enable improvements to the village shop to be started.

HCC Adult Services is keen that elderly people should not economise on heating during the winter. They ask that friends and neighbours keep an eye open for those who might be vulnerable in this respect and bring it to the attention of the Parish Council, if appropriate. Similarly, any matters of Police business can be brought to the attention of PC Bonser, who will be available in the Village Hall half an hour before each Council meeting.

On 11 November, Cllrs Baines and Gossling and Mrs Moya Grove attended a Campaign to Protect Rural England (CPRE) seminar for those "interested in the welfare of our Hampshire countryside". The subjects covered included CPRE's Vision for the Countryside, influencing development through Landscape Character Assessments, traffic calming and litter campaigns. CPRE are our natural allies, with Cow Common and West Down on our doorstep, and we have asked them to write for a future Parish Magazine a short article covering their work. Meanwhile anyone wanting to know more about this important body should contact one of the three of us.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be at 8pm on 1 December in the Village Hall. By then, we will be well into the seasonal countdown and it only remains for me to wish all parishioners a very happy Christmas and a peaceful and prosperous 2010.

WHERWELL PARISH COUNCIL

We were very pleased to welcome nine members of the public at our recent meeting. Several of them spoke during the open session when the public are invited to address the Council. The new owner of Heather Cottage showed us the plans he has for a new shed and storage area. The Council agreed that it was a vast improvement on the current shed but suggested that TVBC Planning be approached for preliminary advice prior to undertaking any work.

In spite of all the drainage works that has taken place, part of the High Street was recently flooded, during a torrential downpour, as fallen leaves had blocked the drain cover. It is difficult to offer a solution but HCC Highways were informed of the problem and immediately came out to deal with it.

Mr Hellier advised that he has been asked to be Wherwell representative for the TVBC Strategic Partnership. This will involve him completing a number of surveys each year.

The clerk is to investigate why the 99 bus service to Wherwell is no longer showing on the indicator board at the Andover bus station. She is also asking if a police officer could attend the monthly coffee morning as this could be more beneficial than the previous monthly visits which have now been suspended.

The contents of an email from some parents at the school expressing concerns about the design of the new Play Area had been passed on to HCC as part of the initial consultation process. The new plans that have been drawn up will provide an imaginative play area with sympathetic landscaping for children up to 13 years of age. They will be on show at the next coffee morning and at the school. Hopefully the plans for the new implement building will be processed by the Planning Department shortly. It is disappointing that the decision from TVBC regarding funding for the rabbit proof fencing is still awaited.

The planning application for New Barn, New Barn Lane has been approved. The PC gave its full support to the appeal that has been made by the owner of Windwhistle Cottage to the Secretary of State for Planning regarding the planning condition set by TVBC prescribing that long straw has to be used for the new thatch at the cottage following the catastrophic fire there last year.

The Head of Planning at TVBC has been asked to intercede regarding the derelict mobile home, vehicles and farm machinery on the corner of Beech Grove as the Planning Enforcement Officer has failed to resolve the situation.

The Council will endeavour to clarify whether the lay- by in Mill Lane is solely for the use of the owners of Mill Close properties.

Damage to the road sign at Winchester Corner and also to the bollard on the cobbled corner opposite the White Lion has been reported.

Daffodil bulbs have been planted where the new soak away has been dug on the corner on Old Winchester Hill. The bench at Chant Close has been cleaned and will be treated when the weather permits.

Having finally received the drawings and costings for the footpath down from Chant Close in front of the pub, the PC unanimously agreed to go ahead with the scheme. Testway Housing will be asked to contribute to the cost which is likely to be in the region of £9K.

Recent proposals to overcome the imminent lack of burial space in the churchyard, outlined in the last magazine, should create enough space for the next twenty years.

The recently erected new signpost to the church on the Memorial Green is to be re-sited on the bank outside Manor Farmhouse. 'Village Hall' is to be added to the sign.

It was agreed to commission a replica of the original cockatrice, the emblem of the village, to be made using a template of the original which is in the Andover Museum. The cost will be in the region of £400. Testway Housing is to be asked again to consider allowing the cockatrice to be mounted on the Old Chapel in the High Street. It is hoped to erect a wall plaque which will detail the mythology of the cockatrice.

The organisers of the recent school ball were congratulated on running such a successful evening. It was reported that there are 120 pupils in the school this year. Financially the school is in a good financial position but fundraising by the excellent PTA remains an integral part of the school budget.

Grants are to be investigated to help with the costs of producing leaflets and wall maps of local footpaths. Better signage of the Testway in Harewood Forest has been requested.

Thanks to the efforts of Cllr Horne the Wherwell Directory is now on the website. The PC website is being updated to include the agendas and minutes of PC meetings.

Discussions are continuing with Vodafone and O2 regarding the poor service coverage in the area.

I am a new Chilbolton Parish Councilor, responsible for Amenities. As such an interesting item has come to my attention which I would like to promote via the magazine. 'The scheme is called 'Wheels to Work' and is a moped loan scheme for young people between the ages of 16 and 25, living in the Test Valley, who do not have access to good public or private transport to get them to a job, vocational training or to attend interviews. A moped can be loaned for 3 to 12 months depending on circumstances. The 50cc moped, fully



taxed and insured with breakdown cover and is supplied with a helmet, high visibility vest and CBT training! A small weekly hire charge is requested but other than that, the only costs are the fuel you use. A reference and/or guarantor is required.

Jane's Kitchen

I was never a very proficient Girl Guide but I have stuck with their motto 'be prepared' and at Christmas this is a life-saver! So prepare ahead to prevent panic setting in – here are a couple of vegetable dishes that have become family favourites.

Sherried Potatoes

1 kilo potatoes

2 oz butter

1oz soft brown sugar

1 teaspn. each nutmeg and black pepper

1 large egg 2–3 tablespoons sherry Juice and grated rind of 1 orange 1 oz nibbed almonds

Salt to taste

Peel and cook the potatoes, mash with butter sugar and seasoning. Beat egg together with orange juice and sherry and add to the potatoes. Pile into a baking/serving dish. (If freezing – freeze a this stage) Sprinkle the almonds on top (optional) and bake for 20 minutes in a medium to hot oven until hot and brown on top.

Parsnips Molly Parkin (a vegetarian dish on its own or to serve with any red meat/turkey/chicken/game)

2lb prepared parsnips – thinly sliced Oil for frying

1 ½ lb tomatoes 2 level tablespn brown sugar

6oz strong cheddar cheese ½ pt double cream

3 oz butter

3 tablespoons fresh bread crumbs

Fry the parsnips on both sides until golden brown. Layer in a well buttered casserole dish with the tomatoes and cheese, sprinkle each layer with salt pepper and sugar. Finish with a layer of parsnips and pour over the cream and remaining cheese together with the breadcrumbs. Bake 40-50 mins until vegetables are soft and the top golden brown.

You can also make a complaint. For example, you can claim compensation if your letters arrive very late, are damaged or don't arrive at all. Your postal provider is usually the Royal Mail. Phyllis and Dennis Harding have been organising the collection of Shoeboxes in Wherwell for over 10 years; just one of the many good deeds they do in our village. In that time they have helped put a smile on the faces of over 300 girls and boys at this special time in the Christian year.

This year, 31 shoeboxes were collected in Wherwell; each carefully wrapped in colourful paper and filled with small toys, soap and toothbrush, colouring books & pens, puzzles, small musical instruments, and last but not least - a cuddly toy!

Chilbolton & Wherwell Wildlife

Autumn is a time of year when birds are on the move. Our Swallows and House Martins leave to the south, and the Redwings and Fieldfare arrive from the north and east. With some species though, it's difficult to know which birds are coming and which ones are going.

I guess that a male Blackcap on 26th September was a local breeding bird that would be fattening up before a flight to Spain for the winter. But almost certainly, the female bird that visited my garden bird-bath on 29th October, would have been the first of our regular wintering birds - arriving from perhaps Germany or further east. Another species that, surprisingly, even seems to confuse the experts – is the Woodpigeon. Large flocks are seen passing over at daybreak on clear mornings in early-November, and there's great debate about whether these are our local British birds on the move, or whether they are continental birds passing by on their way to Spain. Maybe it's a mixture of both, and maybe some of our Woodpigeons that are generally thought to be stay-at-home resident birds, now migrate with their continental cousins?!

Rarer birds also occur in our gardens during this season of migration; on 30th September my own garden was visited by a Firecrest, and in another garden nearby, a Black Redstart was a rare visitor on 8th November. Redstarts and Black Redstarts are not always easy to tell apart – especially if all you see is the flicker of the orange-red tail. But in Hampshire during November, we can be fairly sure that a robin-sized bird with a red tail, is a wintering Black Redstart.

Looking forward to December and January, there are many species to look out for. Brambling, Siskins and Redpoll should be visiting the garden seed-feeders by New Year time. And when you're out in the countryside on those crisp winter walks, watch out for some of our rarer winter visitors. Just in the past week I've seen both Peregrine and Merlin nearby, and somewhere in our two parishes I soon expect to be seeing species such as Golden Plover, Snipe, Stonechat, and maybe if I'm lucky, a Hen Harrier or Short-eared Owl. Best wishes for Christmas, and do let me know about the birds you see over the holiday period.
