#### Have you noticed - milk bottle tops have lost their colour?

Supermarkets are replacing coloured milk caps with white caps because they're easier to recycle; coloured caps are not suitable for producing foodgrade packaging.

By using white or clear caps, businesses and consumers can reduce colour contamination in the high-density polyethylene (HDPE) stream. This is important now that businesses are focussing on becoming less dependent on virgin plastic and recycled HDPE is in high demand.

#### **Dental care**

We would just like to remind all patients that we cannot provide antibiotics or painkillers for tooth problems. Prescriptions should be issued by your dentist. We would encourage all patients to ensure that they are registered with a dentist. If you are having problems finding a dentist to register you then please contact NHS England's Customer Care Service on 0300 311 2233.

#### **Firearms Applications**

There has been a change to the rules around firearms applications. GPs now have to check the past 30 years of GP records for new applicants, and the past 10 years for applicants making a renewal. We have had to increase our fees in light of this to  $\pounds 60$  for a new application and  $\pounds 45$  for a renewal. Payment is required with the form.

We are aware that the police provide a reminder for renewals 16 weeks prior to the licence expiry. Please contact the surgery with your form and payment as soon as you receive this. We have had some patients giving us only 1 or 2 weeks' notice and this is not enough.

#### **NHS App**

We have some queries regarding ordering prescriptions on the NHS App. If your prescription request is marked as approved this means that the GP has issued it. After that our dispensary team have to order the medication, wait for it to arrive and dispense it ready for you to collect.

#### Text messages

Recently we sent a text message to all our patients aged 45 years or over to ask if they had been lent a blood pressure machine from the surgery to return it after they had finished monitoring. We had a huge response from patients telling us that they had not had a blood pressure machine from us. Sometimes we will send text messages to a large number of patients. We will review the wording we use, but please ignore any messages which do not apply to you.

#### NHS Health checks

Recently we highlighted that we were restarting NHS healthchecks. There are specific criteria for patients who should be invited and each individual patient is entitled to one check every 5 years. We were contacted by some patients who had had a check more recently and are sorry that we are unable to offer another check until after five years.

#### **Tunnel Tech**

# Are you affected by the smell coming from Tunnel Tech? Does the smell prevent you from enjoying your garden?

On your behalf, Chilbolton Parish Council would like to address this issue, if possible.

To help the Parish Council achieve this we would like everyone to complete the TVBC ODOUR NUISANCE INCIDENT RECORD SHEET. Once your sheet is full, or monthly, please send your sheets to the Clerk

(Chilbolton.clerk@hotmail.co.uk) and importantly to TVBC too. This will provide CPC with the evidence they will require to progress the issue with TVBC.

The following information is extracted from the TVBC website and will help you understand the law and how TVBC handle such complaints. (NB: Mentions of 'Council' relates to TVBC).

#### What is the law concerning nuisance problems?

Under certain circumstances the Council can stop many types of nuisance problems from continuing. The relevant legal provisions for investigating and stopping nuisances are in Part III of the Environmental Act 1990. These include neighbour noise such as loud music and barking dogs, smoke from bonfires, odour from industrial premises and excessively bright lights. Nuisance problems that may be dealt with by the Council are legally known as 'statutory nuisances'. It is not possible to be precise as to the definition of a statutory nuisance, because reference must be made to past decisions by judges in various legal cases that have concerned nuisance problems. However, in very general terms, a statutory nuisance is a problem which interferes substantially and unreasonably with a person's wellbeing, comfort or the enjoyment of his/her property.

#### How nuisance smells are assessed

To work out whether smells are a statutory nuisance, councils can consider one or more of the following:

- where the smell is coming from
- the character of the area
- the number of people affected nearby
- if the smell interferes with the quality of life of people nearby (for example, if they avoid using their gardens)
- how often the smell is present
- the characteristics of the smell

Assessing smells can be difficult because people respond differently to them.

Councils usually use at least 2 human 'sniffers' to work out:

- the strength of the smell
- how often it's detectable and for how long
- when it's recognisable
- its offensiveness
- its character (using descriptions like 'fruity' or 'fishy')
- the emission rate

Wind direction and weather conditions should be taken into account as this can cause variations in smells.

Councils can also ask people to keep smell diaries, recording their perception of the smell and the effect it has on them.

#### Smells from industrial, trade or business premises: special rules

If an abatement notice for smells is served on industrial, trade or business premises and they've used the best practicable means to stop or reduce the smell, they may be able to use this as one of the following:

- grounds for appeal against the abatement notice
- a defence, if prosecuted for not complying with the abatement notice

#### Andover Crisis and Support Centre rebrands to Finding Freedom From Abuse and opens new outreach centre providing support to the whole of Test Valley

Andover Crisis and Support Centre, which has been helping local survivors of domestic and

sexual abuse move forward with their lives since 1975, has today announced it is changing its name to reflect the broader range of services it now offers.

Over the years the charity has expanded significantly since it started offering local people somewhere to stay in times of need. The organisation now includes a 19-bed refuge as well as a number of 'moving on' properties to help survivors of abuse gain their independence. It also offers a growing number of outreach services and education and therapeutic programmes designed to support children, women, men and LBGT+ across the Test Valley region to recognise and deal with any experience or fear of domestic and sexual violence or abuse.

The Domestic Abuse Act 2021 has recognised that children who see, hear or experience domestic abuse are victims of domestic abuse in their own right, and the charity has a Child and Young Person Outreach Worker providing support to any child over the age of 4.

**Donna Cullimore, CEO** of the charity commented: "Over recent years Andover Crisis and Support Centre has been hugely successful at offering support at the point of need and providing a place of refuge for those sheltering from sexual and domestic abuse. But we recognise that the demand for our services has grown and evolved over recent years. We are also here to offer our services to a wider group of people across the whole Test Valley region and not just Andover. We therefore want a new name and identity that better reflects who we now are and what we offer. Finding Freedom From Abuse brings to life the reason we exist as a charity, and the benefits of what we want to give to those that need our help."

**Councillor Tracey Tasker, Test Valley Borough Council**, with responsibility for Housing and Environmental Health (including Diversity and Inclusion), commented: "Test Valley Borough Council recognises the devastating impact domestic abuse has on not only those experiencing it but the wider community too. Finding Freedom from Abuse provides vital support across Test Valley through their safe accommodation and outreach services, helping those impacted by domestic abuse recover and rebuild their lives. They have been part of our community since 1975, and with their expanding services and new website more individuals and their families will be able to access the specialist support they need."

**Sue Filmer, Chair of Trustees** for the charity commented: "The vision for our organisation is to provide a life free from abusive relationships, and we feel that our new name enables us to better evidence how we can help survivors of domestic and sexual abuse move forward with their lives. We are incredibly passionate about helping local people prevent and recover from damaging relationships and we are very excited about how our new outreach services and centre can help us do this".

Finding Freedom From Abuse operates across the entire Test Valley region and provides a range of services and programmes that offer emotional and practical support including:

- Making sense of what's happened
- Exploring individuals' legal options
- Ensuring individuals' safety
- How it can impact the family
- Recognising the warning signs

The charity's outreach services are available for women, men, and children and young people and offer support and practical help. The programmes include a workshop for schools where healthy relationships and friendships are discussed, and the Freedom Programme for women who have experienced domestic abuse. The refuge provides a safe place where women and women with children can come to stay to be safe and get away from domestic abuse at home. The centre provides accommodation for up to 19 families with 4 moves on properties and is bright and friendly with outdoor and indoor play areas.

#### UKRAINE - WHAT'S NEEDED NOW

Major-General Tim Toyne Sewell - Commandant RMA Sandhurst 1991-94, will be speaking about the importance of leadership in the context of the Ukraine situation at Stockbridge Town Hall on Friday 17th February, as part of a briefing evening run by the Stockbridge-Ukraine Group.

Tim's military career (1959-1994) included being Chief of Staff Falkland Islands (1983) and commanding 19th Infantry Brigade, to training, amalgamating and creating a new army from the opposing Zimbabwean factions at the end of the civil war (1980). Finally, he was Commandant of RMA Sandhurst, with its worldwide reputation for young officer leadership training. As Commandant he paid interesting visits to the Russian Military Academy and to West Point. His distinguished post-military career made best use of his expertise in this field. He will talk about leadership in the Ukrainian conflict and take questions.

Second speaker, Charlie Hutchinson, has spent six years in Eastern Ukraine deployed by the FCDO as a military observer to the Organisation for Security and Cooperation in Europe. Charlie will fascinate with his direct experiences in eastern Ukraine, both in the separatist areas and the government held territory (Mariupol, at that time), together with his impressions from a recent return visit.

The evening will finish with inspirational Chilbolton mum, Harriet Asher, telling us why, desperate to help, she travelled to Poland but found herself crossing the border into Ukraine. There she quickly identified a need for safe travel for refugees. She set up a Go Fund me page to pay for accommodation, coaches and air travel. Harriet will update us on her ongoing humanitarian efforts, now sourcing items required on the ground in Ukraine, these have ranged from generators and medical supplies to warm clothing for orphans.

This is a fund-raising event. Tickets are £10 and can be purchased from Ukraine - what is needed now? Tickets, Fri 17 Feb 2023 at  $18:00 \mid$  Eventbrite Doors and bar open at 6 pm, first speaker at 6.30 pm. All proceeds from ticket sales and fund raising will be used to fund generators, medical supplies and other items required on the ground in Ukraine.

1. The event is hosted by Stockbridge-Ukraine, a group of Test Valley residents set up at the beginning of the conflict, to support hosts and their Ukrainian guests. The focus of the group has expanded to assist with providing support needed on the ground in Ukraine. For more details go to https://sites.google.com/view/slhuk/home

- 2. Major -General Tim Toyne-Sewell was a career soldier. An infantryman, he became a helicopter pilot for four years but, after crashing three times, was ordered back to marching by his wife. He was Chief of Staff in the Falkland Islands (1983) and then commanded the training team in Zimbabwe before ending his career as Commandant of Sandhurst 1991-1994. He then became Director of Goodenough College in London for 12 years. The college is home to 650 international postgraduates who are studying at the universities and other postgraduate institutions in London. He then chaired United World Colleges, a group of 18 international sixth form schools. He now lives in Nether Wallop."
- Charlie Hutchinson spent six years in Eastern Ukraine, deployed by the FCDO to the Organisation for Security and Cooperation in Europe as a military observer. He spent 2015-2018 in Donetsk city, under



the control of pro-Russian separatists. He then spent 6 months as a Liaison Officer to the Ukrainian and Russian Armed Forces and his final 3 years in Mariupol, from where he evacuated in February 2022. Charlie speaks Russian and spent time in Russia prior to his Ukraine deployment. He wrote his Masters dissertation on the Ukraine conflict and the mobilisation of the separatist militias."

4. Harriet Asher, a young mum of three from Chilbolton, was recently named as one of 50 people on the Independent newspaper's "Happy

List" for her work helping refugees get of Ukraine. She organizes evacuations, houses, and safe passage for those wanting to leave all parts of Ukraine to safety. More recently, she sources items such as generators and medical supplies and arranges delivery of these items into Ukraine. Fundraiser by

#### Chilbolton's Coronation Tree Part 2- The Sequel!

Last month we read of the planting of the Coronation tree in 1911 near the river and the restoration of the land on which it stood in 1987. The picture below shows the chestnut tree (for that was the village's choice) standing in an almost treeless riverside scene with two cyclists enjoying its shade. I would guess this was around 1930, the tree is quite young, and the photo was taken from nearby on West Down.

In those days West Down was a chalk downland and was kept that way by two flocks of sheep which grazed up there and found water by the river; no fences in those days and lots of grass. In the early spring the sheep would be led down the path (called Whitelands) to the fields in the valley and the Common where they would get an early bite of spring grass. The path is now part of the long-distance footpath called the Test Way. Eleanor Lockyer, who many of you will remember, told me that village children used to swim in the river there from the open downland. Different times!

Sadly, the chestnut tree became rotten, and was too near the footpath to be safe and in the early 90's, (can anyone check the date?) it was felled. In 1995 Test Valley Borough Council had a tree planting week. Trees were supplied free, all you had to do was claim one and plant it. An oak sapling was chosen and David Waghorn, Chris Grove and I planted it and cared for it while it established. Now it's flourishing and, since oaks host a huge variety of living things, is humming with life. The seat once enjoyed a lovely view of the river; we would love this to be restored.

Let's look after our trees, many grand mature specimens are being lost on private land and of course the various diseases imported from abroad are playing havoc. Please consider the tree's residents and us before you consider felling.

## Beware of the remote support computer scam



These days, unfortunately, there isn't a week that goes by without us hearing that someone has been scammed...

ElpaTech have been providing computer technical support for 13 years, and regretfully this issue is only getting worse as time goes by. Perhaps with many more people now relying so heavily on computers, and them being used so much more now as an essential way of keeping in touch, the pool of available victims is much greater.

Thankfully, awareness of scams is higher than ever; we all regularly see and hear warnings on TV, radio, and social media. But it can catch people regardless. All it takes is one moment of weakness.

Many of the people who have been caught by the "remote support" scam all have one thing in common: they were expecting something similar at the time. Consequently, had just enough credibility to let their guard down, even just for a second. For instance, some had recently reported a broadband fault to their internet provider. Or their computer had been misbehaving, and – just coincidentally – someone from "Microsoft Windows 365" claimed to be calling to help...

That second of uncertainty can be all a fraudster needs. If you give anyone untrusted access to your computer, they can leave behind remote access software to control your computer, and sometimes without your knowledge. If you have saved passwords on your computer, including by saving them into your browser or by putting them in a document or spreadsheet, you could be exposing yourself to serious risk of identity fraud if you allow such a scammer access.

It can never be said often enough... Microsoft will never spontaneously contact you about a problem on your computer. Be wary of anyone claiming to be from a firm wanting to talk about your computer... and if you do sadly fall victim, turn off your broadband router/hub immediately and give us a call.

#### Warning from DVLA when Selling a Second-hand vehicle



As a wave of owners, after the pandemic, flock to sell their vehicles privately DVLA have issued a warning about scammers stealing your car!

It is a requirement that to sell a car, it must come complete with a logbook - or V5C document - which contains all the vehicle's statistics as well as

ownership details. It's shockingly common for people to share an image of the logbook when listing their vehicle on sites like Autotrader. Too many people don't realise how easy it is for scammers to steal their identity from this document, gain access to bank accounts, or even forge fake number plates and ownership of another person's car from the information in the photo.

According to the DVLA, drivers should not "share photos of a V5C logbook on social media or selling sites, as scammers can use them for identity theft."

Scammers can also commit fraud by posing as interested buyers, visiting your house, and asking to check your V5C logbook. For example, a motorist on *MoneySavingExpert* said: "I listed my car on Autotrader just over a week ago, the first interested buyer that came to look at the car has somehow taken the reference number from the V5C document and registered my car in a new name and address. I must admit, the man seemed nice and polite, but I have been well and truly scammed."

Anyone who is the victim of a scam or aware of suspicious behaviour should inform Action Fraud and the DVLA.

#### My Mother the Land Girl

My mother, Betty, was born and brought up in Bermondsey, in the heart of the East End of London. After leaving school she entered the millinery trade and trained to shape feathers for hats. Then WWII arrived and, despite her only knowledge of the countryside being the annual family holiday hop picking in Kent, she enrolled in the Land Army. Her stories of her first experiences with milking cows, planting potatoes, and harvesting crops kept me amused throughout my childhood. They were memories with mixed emotions of rural hardship and lasting friendships.

Her time in the Land Army changed her life for ever. There she met my father, Gerald Slightam. My father is the best one to tell of this meeting. His eulogy at her funeral went as follows :- "My memories (of her) begin in later 1942 when some rowdy young RAF cadets from RAF Halton boarded a bus to Aylesbury for an evening on the town. During our rather loud conversation

I happened to use a swear word and someone in the seat behind said "Stop swearing". I turned around and there was this auburnhaired, freckle-faced girl in a Land Army uniform glaring at me. You know, later in the war I took part in some 40 bombing raids over Europe, and I don't think I was ever so scared as I was at that moment".

#### **A Tale of Three Generators**

Like many, I buy charity cards and sponsor friends entering marathons in aid of worthy causes. However, I had never felt truly involved in any fundraising activities. Then at October's Stockbridge-Ukraine Support Group I was motivated and humbled by Harriet Asher's heartfelt account of just how much one driven individual can achieve through private fundraising and independent initiatives. I was compelled to get involved and this is where the tale starts.

It was becoming evident that Ukrainians needed generators to keep alive. Mindful of the panic on my local What's App groups last February when residents were without power for 48 hours, I resolved to do my bit to make a difference and I contacted Harriet. From her humanitarian work, Harriet assured me every penny donated would be used to procure and deliver essential equipment to individuals in need and known personally within her network. Funds were accumulated to purchase three generators and in the week before Christmas Harriet sent me photos of one of the donee families near Zaporizhzhia. They would house one generator which would support half a dozen families in their village, providing a daily hot meal and dry clothing for up to 30 people.

Yet the most exciting and unexpected turn of events for me occurred on Christmas Eve. I was at the bar, getting the first round in on our annual bicycle pub crawl, when the What's App messages came flooding in. From an anecdotal conversation some time ago, we had been introduced to Charlie Hutchinson who had independently helped rescue Ukrainians from what subsequently became Russian occupied territory. Having lived in Eastern Ukraine for over six years, Charlie was still in direct contact with friends fighting in occupied territories. Coincidentally one such friend had just asked Charlie if he could source a generator for a military unit on the eastern front line; Charlie had heard of our initiative and wondered if we could help.

There ensued an hour of frenetic messaging. I wondered whether this was how it might have felt to be in the Resistance: a request for the drop-off coordinates to be given by coded message, a photo of "Sergei" who was to take delivery, confirmation that all concerned had the same secure messaging and translation apps; a diversion while our delivery men received a request from Ukrainian medics for a third generator (which they eventually got after some farcical misunderstandings with predictive text and a lost telephone number); a hitch when we learned they wouldn't get past the checkpoints and an alternate drop-off location was arranged. From request to receipt on the ground in Ukraine, the supply had taken less than 48 hours over Christmas and Boxing Day.

As I was snuggling into bed under my electric blanket that night I reflected. Having had the privilege to be involved in this team, and see for

myself each individual playing their part, was the best Christmas present. Being part of an independent initiative gave a strong sense of personal involvement; it was incredible to see how swiftly a tangible result could be achieved by a network of people on the ground, risking their personal safety to deliver aid to those in need.

We live in challenging economic times. Events in Ukraine make the UK news some days but not others and it's perhaps convenient to consign the war as a conflict happening in another part of the world. However, even those who can't spare money or time can still make a difference by spreading the word. The chance conversation, which put our local contact in touch with the shipment of generators, may have made the difference between life and death for someone less fortunate than us.

## THE PLOUGH INN

Villagers who brought a historic pub under community ownership receive a national award from CAMRA.

Efforts to safeguard the future of the Plough Inn in Longparish, Hampshire, which dates to 1721, have been recognised by the Campaign for Real Ale's Pub Saving Award, which celebrates people who have come together to save a pub from closure.



When the pub closed its doors - seemingly for good - in December 2015, local villagers sprung into action, lobbying local planning officers to deny planning permission to turn the pub into a residence. They subsequently used grants, donations, and a community share scheme - which attracted over 300 investors - to purchase the pub, in conjunction with the Parish Council, in February 2021. After months of incredibly hard work, completely refurbishing the property inside and out, and three hundred years after it first began trading, The Plough Inn is once again at the heart of the Longparish community. Bought with help from their Parish Council who now own the Plough Inn, local villagers have taken on a 99-year lease from the council for the exclusive use of the property to secure and safeguard the future of the Plough Inn as a public house and promote it as an amenity of prime importance to the community. Andy Jolliffe, chair of Longparish Community Pub Ltd said: "At the core of a community pub is the local people that it serves. Our aim in taking over the Plough Inn has been to provide a range of services much wider than just the provision of food and drinks to the local community.

"To see the Plough Inn thriving once again, both as a popular destination pub, and a vibrant and valued community asset at the heart of Longparish village is a fantastic achievement." Paul Ainsworth, Coordinator for CAMRA's Pub Saving Award said: "Huge congratulations to the dedicated villagers who have saved the Plough Inn in Longparish. Pubs play an irreplaceable role in bringing people together, and the decision to purchase and run a pub as a community is a real commitment to preserving its future for generations to come. It is a real privilege to be able to highlight these efforts. Well done to everyone involved."

The pub was presented with the award on 6th January.

## Wherwell History Group – Illustrated Talk



February 17<sup>th</sup> Tim Craven (Zoom) Norman Thelwell (1923 - 2004) celebrated cartoonist and artist

This talk traces the life, passions, and artistic development of Norman Thelwell from his early years and formative wartime experiences to his subsequent rise to become one of the nation's best known and loved cartoonists of his era. Thelwell produced 1,500 cartoons, 60 front covers for the famed *Punch* magazine and 32 books translated into a dozen different languages. Due to his consummate draughtsmanship and contrary to prevailing trends in cartoons of the time, his works were full of beautifully observed detail of mostly rural subjects, including country and leisure pursuits, sport, stately homes, gardening and sailing. Thelwell was an early and passionate campaigner for the environment and his many cartoons of factory farming, the destruction of habitat and pollution came together in his 1971 publication, *The Effluent Society*.

Thelwell's international fame was perhaps boosted by his most iconic and instantly recognised subject of small, fat, hairy ponies ridden at fulltilt by alarming young ladies. His greatest love though was for his "serious" watercolour landscapes, a medium of which he was a true master. Thelwell's distinctive and evocative paintings reflected his profound love for the English countryside.

## Recipe of the month Pancake Toppings (Serves 4)



1. Bananas and Chocolate Sauce

200g dark chocolate 250ml double cream 50ml milk 25gm unsalted butter 4 warm pancakes

- 1. To make chocolate sauce, put broken choc., 150ml of cream, milk and butter in heatproof bowl over pan of simmering water until melted and stir
- 2. Lightly whisk rest of cream to soft peaks.
- 3. Place warm pancakes on 4 serving plates
- 4. Slice bananas and lay on one half of pancake. Fold and drizzle with warm chocolate sauce.

### 2. Honeyed Apples and Cinnamon

#### 2 apples 1 tbsp butter 2 tbsp honey or maple syrup Pinch cinnamon

- 3. Core 2 apples and cut each one into 12 wedges.
- 4. Warm 1 tbsp butter in frying pan and add apples
- 5. Cook over medium heat for 10 mins, turning until starting to soften
- 6. Add 2 tbsp honey or maple syrup and a pinch of cinnamon
- 7. Cook for 5 mins until sticky and caramelised

#### 3. Blueberries and Lime

Punnet of blueberries

#### lime

- 1. Tip punnet of blueberries into pan and add dash of water
- 2. Gently heat for 5 mins until fruit softened
- 3. Add a squeeze of lime and a little sugar (optional) Serve each with a dollop of whipped cream or vanilla ice cream
