Letter from Andrew Kent on behalf of Revd. Jax – May 2023

Without intending to make any political points, as time goes on I find myself becoming increasingly exasperated with the short-term approach which politicians of all parties often take on issues of crucial importance for all of us - and particularly important for our children and grandchildren. Of course, there is a limit to the resources which governments have available to fix things in the short term; but it does seem to me that careful and sensible long-term plans are seldom put in place, and then even more seldom carried-through. Climate emergencies, sewage management, health care and public safety are just a few of the vital issues we face right now, and although none of us want to pay the government even more tax money, I might be more convinced if I could see that what we already pay is actually being used sensibly and carefully. As they say, you would never run a business this way.

Anyway, having got that off my chest, there is also much to be hopeful about. The King's Coronation next week will be marked by celebrations across the Country, including parties in our two villages, and in my view rightly so. I plan to get to at least two of them. There will also be a Coronation Service for Chilbolton and Wherwell villagers in Chilbolton Church at 10am on Sunday 7th May - please come and join me in celebrating this once in a generation occasion.

Whether or not you support the Monarchy, it is a remarkable thing to take on the role of King after spending a lifetime of apprenticeship. As it happens the King and I are the same age, and I had cause to reflect on that a couple of months ago when I was required, by virtue of age, to stand down from active duty as one of His Majesty's Deputy Lieutenants for Hampshire. There I was, retiring after serving Queen Elizabeth and, latterly, King Charles, just as the King was stepping-up to the full-time role of Monarch - with all the work it entails and with no prospect of retirement at all. For him it will literally be a lifetime's work, as it was for Her Majesty, and it brought home to me what a life of duty really means.

But then it occurred to me that many of you, willingly and cheerfully, are in exactly the same situation, serving others in all sorts of ways with many acts of kindness - perhaps small things to you, but things of great importance to others. A kind word will often lighten a burden for someone in trouble, and a kind act may remove the burden entirely. Most of us probably won't know we're doing it; but in helping other people here in our own Communities and further afield - and then in turn sometimes gratefully accepting the care of others when we need it - we are selflessly living-out a life of duty and service as exemplified by Queen Elizabeth over all those years. We should be proud of doing so, and encourage our children and grandchildren to do so also.

Since I write this on behalf of Revd Jax as she recovers from her injury it's appropriate that I leave you with these words of Jesus Christ, recorded in the Gospel of St John:

"A new command I give you: love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know you are my disciples --- I am the way and the truth and the life. No-one comes to the Father except through me" - and He added: "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give you." And there's really nothing I can add to that.

We now are only a few days away from the Coronation of King Charles III. This may well be the first Coronation that many of us have experienced and represents the continuing and unique history of our England / United Kingdom.

Our parish will celebrate the Coronation on the afternoon of the Coronation ceremony with festivities and a BBQ at the Abbots Mitre on 6th May.

We are going to set up a public TV at the village hall so that anyone who wishes can join with their friends and watch the ceremony and procession with tea and coffee available.

In the afternoon there will be a procession from the Church to the Abbots Mitre starting about 3pm with refreshments for the children, provided by the parish council and normal drinks available from the Abbots Mitre. The BBQ will start a little later and continue into the evening. See notice boards for details nearer the time.

A new local plan (LP) now being prepared by Test Valley Borough Council (TVBC) will be issued about the beginning of June. The parish strategy working group (SWG) will be working on our response to this after the consulting document is published. The SWG is also preparing a proposal to set up a community land trust that will progress the 10 affordable homes and 10 downsize homes that have been agreed in our neighbourhood plan. The SWG minutes are on the parish council website and include a schedule of possible development sites in Chilbolton parish that have been put forward by local owners for consideration in the Strategic Housing and economic land availability assessment (SHELAA) of TVBC. It is important to be clear that land so put forward has NO approval for planning but is used by TVBC to satisfy the government that there is sufficient land available for development in the entire borough to meet the government housing targets. The new LP may, or may not, include housing targets for Chilbolton parish. A public meeting will be arranged to explain the LP and hear the views of local people before submitting the Chilbolton response.

Finally, with Summer here there will be heavy pressure on Chilbolton Cow Common and already there have been tents erected and campfires lit. Such activities are illegal and it is up to us to protect our common that is an important Site of special scientific interest (SSSI). The parish council relies on residents to report any such activities and to politely request that these activities cease immediately. The police will be called to take action.

Stockbridge Practice Patient News – April 2023

HRT - Patients who are prescribed HRT can apply for a pre-payment certificate for these items. Please see the news section of our website, stockbridgesurgery.co.uk for more information or ask the surgery to send you a text message with the relevant details.

Hayfever - This is a common condition affecting many children and adults. It can be safely treated with medication with can be bought at local pharmacies and supermarkets.

National guidance advises: Hay fever is a common allergic condition that affects up to one in five people. There's currently no cure for hay fever, but most people with mild to moderate symptoms are able to relieve symptoms with over the counter treatments recommended by a pharmacist. The recommendation from NHS England is: A prescription for treatment of mild to moderate hay fever will not routinely be offered in primary care as the condition is appropriate for self-care.

Advice about managing hayfever in both adults and children can be found in the news section on our website; stockbridgesurgery.co.uk or we can send you a text with the appropriate link.

Self care - There are many conditions which can be managed with self-care, including sore throats, coughs and colds, head-lice, insect bites and stings, mouth ulcers, warts and verrucae. Information can be found by searching NHS and then the relevant condition.

For all eye problems we would encourage you to contact the National Eye Triage Service on 0300 303 4922. They can arrange an appointment with an optician if required (who have the relevant equipment to examine eyes) and also prescribe medication.

For parents we would encourage you to download the Healthier Together app or use the website: www.what0-18.nhs.uk

Accessing self-care first, specifically if you are usually fit and well, helps us to have more appointments available for patients with more serious conditions.

Medication over Easter and in May - Please do not submit your prescription early on bank holiday weeks unless you are going away and need them early. If you are going away please let us know so we understand your reason for putting your request in early. Otherwise, please give us one week to dispense your medication.

The prescription charge rises to £9.65 from 1 April 2023.



You'll need one of the following types of photo ID to vote:

- a UK or Northern Ireland photocard driving licence (full or provisional)
- a driving licence issued by the EU, Norway, Iceland, Liechtenstein, the Isle of Man or any of the Channel Islands
- a UK passport
- a passport issued by a Commonwealth country
- a passport or national identity card issued by the EU, Norway, Iceland or Liechtenstein
- a PASS card (National Proof of Age Standards Scheme)
- a Blue Badge
- a biometric residence permit (BRP)
- a Defence Identity Card (MOD form 90)
- a Northern Ireland Electoral Identity Card
- a Voter Authority Certificate (NB: see below)
- an Anonymous Elector's Document
- An acceptable travel pass, such as an older person's bus pass, a disabled person's bus pass, an Oyster 60+ card or a Freedom Pass

NB: The photo on your ID must look like you. You can still use your ID even if it has expired.

NB: You'll need to complete your application by 5pm on 25th April 2023 to get a Voter Authority Certificate for the 4th May 2023 elections.

Wherwell Parish Council Report from the meeting held on 11thth April 2023

The full Parish Council met in the Colonel Jenkins Memorial Hall, with County & District Councillor Drew, though no members of the public attended.

The minutes of the March meeting were agreed & signed.

The chair pointed out that it was **Cllr Hasselmann's last meeting** as she is not seeking re-election to the PC, standing instead for a Borough Councillor position with TVBC. The chair thanked her for all her work for WPC over many years, and wished her well in the coming borough elections.

It was noted that the willow fence around the new pond at **Purver's Patch** is a wonderful job, and thanks were extended to Harvey Sullivan for his work.

Finances were presented for the year end, showing a surplus in the year of £4k due principally to underspends on special projects in the year. The Funds remaining at the end of the year total £17k, including £8k reserved for restoration of the War Memorial. The accounts will now be prepared in statutory format for presentation at the AGM in May

Regarding planning the PC were informed of planning applications that have been approved by TVBC including various tree works, and an application to modify the gates at Freelands, all of which had been supported by the PC.

An application to build a second 5-bedroom house on the Lynchet site was objected to on the grounds of the size of the development and that the local Housing Needs Survey has highlighted a requirement for smaller properties for first time buyers and for downsizing.

It was noted that the PC had held a separate planning meeting where they objected to an application for an extension at Toll Cottage.

Councillors reported on their various portfolios:

Cllr Bryant reported that quotes are being obtained for stones engraved with the names from the War Memorial to be erected on the green.

Cllr Blazdell attended a useful TVBC Resilience Forum and has updated the Emergency Plan to include emergency contact numbers.

Cllr Hasselmann raised the proposed Solar Farm, and the PC agreed to form a committee to explore how best to obtain suitable community benefit from any developers.

Cllr Newell pointed out that the old Roman Road from the B3048 towards Winchester is due to be designated a bridleway, and asked if there were S106 funds available for a safe access layby on the road for parking for ramblers.

Cllr Oliver suggested the PC review the planning applications by Freelands to check if there was agreement to construct a gravel path around the new lake.

HCC & District Cllr Drew presented his report to the PC,

 Every second Sunday there are events planned in Andover town centre including street food and entertainment.

- The Council have been investing in green electric street cleaners and biodiesel bin lorries.
- Residents should note that they need to check that anyone they use to dispose of their rubbish has the proper licenses otherwise they can also be prosecuted and fined for fly tipping.
- HCC is investing in filling potholes. However, with a £50m deficit budget they need to focus resources on Social Services, and so there is more pressure on roads, and potholes need to be prioritized for the most dangerous first.

Regarding other matters, it was noted that the PC had previously discussed the planning application for an anaerobic digester plant near the A303 on Cowdown Lane. As the application was not within the Parish the PC was not notifiable; the PC raised no objections to the application.

The next scheduled meeting will be the Parish Assembly which will take place on Tuesday 9th May at 7:00 pm, followed by WPC's AGM.

What is Healthy Start?

If you're more than 10 weeks pregnant or have a child under 4, you may be entitled to get help to buy healthy food and milk.

If you're eligible, you'll be sent a Healthy Start card with money on it that you can use in some UK shops. We'll add your benefit onto this card every 4 weeks.

You can use your card to buy:

- plain liquid cow's milk
- fresh, frozen, and tinned fruit and vegetables
- fresh, dried, and tinned pulses
- infant formula milk based on cow's milk

You can also use your card to collect:

- Healthy Start vitamins these support you during pregnancy and breastfeeding
- vitamin drops for babies and young children these are suitable from birth to 4 years old

Frequently Asked Questions

I do not want to buy milk, fruit, or vegetables – can I spend my payment on something else for me or my baby?

If you do not want to buy cow's milk, fresh, frozen, or tinned fruit and vegetables, you could use your Healthy Start payment to buy infant formula or fresh, dried, or tinned pulses. The Healthy Start card can only be used to buy:

- plain liquid cow's milk
- fresh, frozen, and tinned fruit and vegetables
- fresh, dried, and tinned pulses
- infant formula milk based on cow's milk

Can I buy follow on formula with my Healthy Start card?

Healthy Start card cannot be used to buy follow on formula. However, you can use your card to buy infant formula labelled 'suitable from birth'.

Can I use my Healthy Start card for online shopping?

No. However, the Healthy Start card can be used in any shop that sells healthy food and milk and accepts Mastercard®.

Can I use my Healthy Start card to withdraw money from an ATM or request cashback?

No, the card can only be used in store. You cannot purchase more than the balance on your card. You can check your balance at an ATM or by calling us on 0300 330 7010.

Wherwell History Group – Illustrated Talk

Simon Moore – **Mud larking in the River Thames**History revealed by scavenging in river mud



May 19th at 8.00pm

at **Wherwell Village Hall**Church Street, Wherwell, SP11 7JJ

A mudlark is someone who scavenges in river mud for items of value, a term used specially to describe those who scavenged this way in London during the late 18th and 19th centuries.

"In 1977, a colleague at the Natural History Museum asked Simon Moore if he'd like to accompany him to search the Thames foreshore for ancient relics. Already having an interest in antique eating and folding cutlery, Simon readily agreed and shortly afterwards acquired a rare medieval pocket knife, followed by other eating knives, spoons and the occasional fork. Over many years, the river Thames has revealed pins, thimbles, an intact wine bottle c1670, bellarmine bottle, pilgrim signs and more."

On 19th May, Simon will be talking about his mud larking adventures and the many relics of everyday life from previous centuries that he has discovered.

After a distinguished career with the British Museum (Natural History) and the Hampshire County Council Museums Service (Conservator of Natural Sciences), Simon retired in November 2009 to become a full-time freelance conservator. He is still very much available for presentations, advice, training, preventive and remedial conservation work, just the same as ever.

Beautiful Beetles

Did you know that Wherwell provides a home to a very special, and increasingly rare, insect – the Violet Oil Beetle (*Meloe violaeaus*)? Visitors to the Wherwell Sports and Social Club during late March would have seen hundreds of these large, colourful beetles marching across the road and car park towards the playing fields from their over-winter woodland homes on the opposite bank.



The preferred food of adult Violet Oil Beetles are wildflowers, especially dandelions and celandine, but, like most beetles, they have a complicated life style. Eggs are laid in soft dry soil and after hatching the tiny louse-like juveniles (called

triungulin) climb adjacent herbs to hitch a ride on passing solitary mining bees (*Andrena haemorrhoa*). The bees then carry them back to their nest where the juveniles feed on the bee eggs and larvae. Solitary mining bees nest in the bare loose soils of woodland fringes. The complex lifestyle of these beautiful beetles, therefore, requires a very specialised habitat of woodland adjacent to wild flower grasslands and bare soil.

The Violet Oil Beetle has suffered drastic declines over the past 100 years and is a UK Biodiversity Action Plan priority species. However, it is only one of over 4000 beetle species in the UK, the most well-known being the ladybird. Some beetle species populations are declining by as much as 30% per decade, mainly because their complex habitats are being destroyed by changes in countryside management. Woodland fringes are particularly important for insect survival because they sustain a wide range of habitats. Our beautiful rural environment in Wherwell and Chilbolton provides each of us with a huge responsibility to minimise our impact on such unique habitats by looking after our native trees, maintaining the woodland shrubby understories, leaving fallen leaves and dead wood, and encouraging wildflower fringes.
