Dear Friends,

Almost 250 years ago, in a poem called "Man was made to mourn," Robert Burns used these familiar words: "Man's inhumanity to man makes countless thousands mourn." Burns was campaigning against economic and social injustice, but his words could equally have applied then – and now – to the violence, oppression and warfare which increasingly seems to characterise our world. In those days warfare tended to be localised in area and scope, but today it is all made easier by rapid advances in weapons technology and our ability to communicate and travel quickly across continents, and into space – and developments in Artificial Intelligence (AI) will only accelerate this. As I write, the catastrophe of warfare in Israel and Gaza has just erupted, and I fear the violence will still be on-going as you read this.

There is a tendency to say "it was ever thus" – and after feeling genuine concern for the innocent victims of each conflict we move on with our lives. It seems that aggression and greed – in part at least – are hard-wired into human genes. For some, like Vladimir Putin, that has been given free rein, without care of the consequences of their actions on innocent victims. It need not be this way.

One thing we have learned, despite the history of violence in the world, is that by working together as Communities, locally, nationally and across continents - sharing our lives in the best interests of all - our genetic instincts to do good can overcome our instincts for violence. To achieve this, we need a Community framework which give us the freedom to act co-operatively in accordance with our consciences. History tells us that over time it is Democracy – government by the whole population, respecting human rights and fundamental freedoms – that gives us the best chance of avoiding largescale violence. It may be suggested that a system of benevolent authoritarianism will allow the same thing, in a more efficient way, but history shows us that every authoritarian regime in time becomes a dictatorship, and with it the opportunity for man's inhumanity to man flourishes.

Russia, China and Belarus are examples where powerful individuals have taken personal control of a whole State system, and where instincts for greed and violence without concern for others flourish. Democracy is a precious thing. We are fortunate to live in one, but democracies are always under attack from within – the USA clearly has some real problems just now – but recently we have also started to see the rapid rise of very powerful individuals, effectively unaccountable to anyone except themselves, who operate transnationally and are above any Government's effective control. Elon Musk is one such, and I confess to being quite worried about where he is going.

Having said all that, Democracy is still winning overall and we should be optimistic that our freedoms and our ability to care for others will flourish. In our own villages there is a great deal to be proud of – the Shop, the Pubs, the Village Halls and the Churches are all part of the glue that holds us together. Nicky, for example, puts a great deal of care and effort into serving our two Communities in all sorts of ways through the village shop, and we should celebrate what she and so many others do to help our Communities thrive.

Perhaps I can leave you with a short prayer for Peace:

"God, who gives us so many good things, most of which we take for granted, please remind us that we should not take it for granted – but that we must care for our world, as we care for others in our Communities, working together for the good of all. Remind us that in this way, bit by bit, Peace can prevail and spread across the world until Your Kingdom is lived-out here on earth."

#### Wherwell Solar Farm

In September, Wherwell Parish Council (WPC) called a public meeting following the submission of a planning application (23/02225/FULLN) to Test Valley Borough Council for a solar farm within the parish of Wherwell. The plans for this development can be found on the TVBC website (https://www.testvalley.gov.uk/planning-and-building/viewplanningapplicationsonline).

They propose the development of a 60-hectare site extending about 2.5 km along the B3420, comprising nearly 64 thousand panels plus required support structures. The development is anticipated to have a 40-year life span. *(continued)* 

The TVBC deadline for public comments to this application was 7<sup>th</sup> October but WPC was awarded a delay in their response until 25<sup>th</sup> October 2023.

The meeting was held on 13<sup>th</sup> October at Wherwell playing fields and was chaired by Mr Sean Hutton (Chairman of WPC). Over 60 members of the public attended.

Overall, there was considerable support for the production of green energy, including the development of solar farms. However, the vast majority considered this application should be refused on the basis of significant impacts on the local landscape character, visual amenity, heritage and ecology. Moreover, there are already 6 existing solar farms in the area so the cumulative impact may be considered overdevelopment.

Statements from the public pointed out the location of the proposed site is at a physical high point in the open chalklands of the Test and Anton valleys, which have a high sensitivity to visual intrusion from such developments. Impacts on visual amenity, and possibly glare, would be experienced by walkers on several public and permissive footpaths and by drivers on several roads as well as by local village residents.

The charity Campaign to Protect Rural England (CPRE) has submitted a written response to TVBC indicating that the application should be refused on the basis of the visual impact to the landscape. It was widely thought that the growth of 3-4m hedges as mitigations proposed to reduce visual intrusion would be inadequate and inherently intrusive and would destroy the panorama already enjoyed on the existing permissive pathway alongside the B3420.

The impact on the approach through the chalk downlands to the historically important medieval village of Wherwell was highlighted by several speakers.

Finally, issues were raised regarding inadequate consideration of impacts on local ecology and biodiversity. Harewood Forest is designated as semiancient forest and identified by TVBC as a site of Importance for Nature Conservation (SINC), which needs to be protected from inappropriate development. Located at a critical forest boundary, the proposed solar farm will impact the habitats and migration routes of several protected and/or endangered wildlife species well known to local villagers, including badgers, dormice, skylarks, various bats and insects. It may also increase wildlife traffic accidents.

There is still time to have your say by writing to TBVC quoting the application number. You can also request an extension of the response deadline from TVBC planning department.

If we are closed, or you have experienced an injury which may require an xray, stitches or other treatment we cannot provide at the surgery you can access 111 in the following ways:



#### Barbara North – a Tribute



My mother, Barbara, grew up in Sutton Scotney with her twin brother Eddie and younger brother Andy. She passed her 11+ and went to Winchester County High School for Girls. After finishing school, she enjoyed a period of time living away from home. Lord Rank, who owned Sutton Scotney Manor Estate, arranged for her to live with his relations, the Cowans, during which time she experienced a very different kind of life.

She was much loved by the Cowan family, and after her death Huxley Cowan wrote: "I felt your mother was one of our family and we will all miss her terribly... she was like (another) big sister and was great fun to have around".

Later, in 1977, she married Robin, my father, whom she had known since childhood.

Mum was always ambitious and by the early 80s was one of the most senior females in banking at TSB. We would often have conversations about her experience as a woman working in a male dominated environment and the challenges involved. She returned to full-time work at TSB just 6 weeks after having me, but would still come home every lunchtime to feed me. Despite working full-time she also built us our family home in Chilbolton. She project-managed it from start to finish, sourcing and purchasing all the materials herself, and achieved all this, with hard work and determination, on a modest budget.

She never forgot how much she didn't have growing up, so she counted and valued every penny for the rest of her life. She often told my boys how she remembered asking her mother for money for sweets at the end of the week and her mother would open her purse and turn it upside down to show her there was nothing in there.

When her job relocated to Birmingham in the early 90s, Mum left TSB and full-time work. She quickly got involved with other pursuits including becoming a governor of Wherwell Primary School and a Lay OFSTED Inspector. She was also very involved in village and church life in Chilbolton. It wasn't long before she wanted something more stimulating so she took on a series of non-executive roles in the NHS, including becoming Chair of Winchester and Eastleigh Healthcare NHS Trust.

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In her work, as in all aspects of her life, she displayed unerring integrity, holding not just herself, but those she worked with, to high ethical standards. When working for the Trust, she would never shy away from difficult decisions if she felt they would benefit the people the Trust served.

After leaving the Trust, my mother continued to play a big part of the local communities she lived in. When she and Robin moved to Stockbridge 14 years ago, she became a prominent and active member of the Parochial Church Council for many years. When Michael Ford, the treasurer sadly died, she took on this demanding position and excelled in the role. She also took on responsibility for the care of the two church buildings, only giving up both onerous duties when the pressure of caring for my father became too much. She played a valuable role in many church fundraising activities, and notably, managed the entire bell restoration programme, spearheaded by Gerald Lambert.

Barbara was an organiser, planner and researcher who didn't believe that many things in this life happen by accident, and that you have to go out and make it happen. Unsurprisingly, her parenting and grand parenting style was unique but powerful. She had an absolute and unshakable belief in me. Whatever the endeavour, she backed me to the hilt and it has been the same for her grandsons Charlie and George; every achievement big or small was celebrated. She came to every school concert, sports match, play and prize giving event. She was immensely proud of them and was a wonderful hands-on grandmother who would feed them, have them overnight for sleepovers and even took them on trips to explore places as distant as Rome and Northern Ireland, always on her own. My boys were lucky to have such a strong capable and loving grandmother in their lives.

When Robin became ill and decided not to have treatment, she was totally dedicated to caring for him. She made sure that he was able to stay at home and pulled on every old NHS string and contact she had to ensure he had everything he needed. Dad had relied on her throughout their relationship because she was so capable, resourceful and organised, but in these last few months of his life, he needed her like never before and I know he shared with her in his last few days how much she meant to him. Theirs was a long and devoted bond.

My mother always ensured that we were all part of an extended family with the children of Robin's first marriage and it is thanks to her that I have strong ties with my brother and sister.

Many Hampshire residents have shared their deep sadness at her loss. She was a large personality with a good sense of humour and much loved by her many friends. We will all miss her.

#### **Chilbolton Parish Council**

Now that Summer is behind us and the nights are beginning to draw in, I wonder whether parishioners could consider volunteering for local activities?

Almost all parish activities rely on volunteers and the many things that we take for granted simply would not be possible without volunteers. Some examples are the Parish Council and subcommittees, especially the Open Spaces Committee (COSC) that manages Chilbolton Cow Common, West Down, the War Memorial Playing Field, school visits to the Common and regular clearing and maintenance of footpaths and ditches; the magazine, Village Hall including film shows, coffee morning, Brownies; Wherwell School governors, St Mary-the -Less, the Church Fete and the Parochial Church Council and the Warm Hub where residents meet for soup and a chat. There are more, but the point is, that without our precious volunteers our parish would be a poorer, duller place rather than our very desirable and much-loved home.

There is a cost implication too. The parish share of rates is one of the lowest in the borough at just over £18,000 a year – about £40 per household and £20 per resident PER YEAR! If volunteers were replaced by employees the rates would need to increase by some £100,000 per year.

Bless and give thanks to our many volunteers but please consider offering some of YOUR time as a volunteer. Most parish volunteers are elderly and becoming less able physically. So, many younger residents need to step up and support our community. This is vital for the Common and West Down and only requires a few days each year. Over to YOU!

It is pleasing to report that the Open Gardens event made  $\pounds 1954$  and that 50% was donated to the Air Ambulance. Thank you to the organisers and the residents who opened their gardens.

Our village shop is struggling and could become financially unviable. A village needs a village shop, church and pub and without these most properties would be worth considerably less. A number of local residents have joined a scheme to set up a standing order of £10 per month to the shop. Contributors will have a birthday cake baked for them as well as other benefits whilst helping to keep our shop viable. Please give this latest initiative to keep the shop open your consideration.




#### AN OPPORTUNITY TO GROW YOUR OWN

#### Would you like to learn how to treat:

- \* An unresponsive adult casualty,
- \* Bleeding (minor and severe),
- \* Burns (minor),
- \* Chest pains and other medical emergencies?
- \* Would you like to learn resuscitation and basic defibrillator use?

Chilbolton Parish Council is considering holding a First Aid training course (primarily for Chilbolton residents) before the end of March 2024 and would like to know how many people would be interested in attending.

The course could cost around  $\pounds 150$  per person (if 20 or more people attend), but this could be reduced if CPC can apply for grant funding.

If CPC use St John Ambulance to run the course, successful attendees will receive a St John Ambulance certificate, which will be valid for three years.



#### Our clock 'went back' to GMT on Sunday 29 October

Every quarter hour of every day and every hour of every night the Wherwell church clock, segments village life. Time to get up, leave for school or when your next Zoom video call is about to start. Like a heartbeat you are not aware of it, but pause and it's there—keeping our lives moving forward TOGETHER.



The clock was installed in 1911 to mark the Coronation of King George V. It is a cast iron flatbed clock with ting-tang quarters and hour strike controlled by two count wheels. It has as a deadbeat escapement and pendulum action driving one dial and the clock has three automatic winders. It's serviced by the same engineers who also look after the Great Clock of Westminster that chimes the Big Ben Bell.

A dedicated team of villagers try to keep the clock running a few seconds fast every day. This makes the time adjustment easy—stop the pendulum for a few seconds to bring it back on time. When it gets a bit colder it speeds up, so we have to lengthen the pendulum by a few millimetres to slow it down again—it's a living piece of engineering built into the top of our church tower.


# Stockbridge Cinema – December Films
