Rain, Tankers, Ground Water, Rivers, andOverpumping.

Rain? The UK Centre for Ecology and Hydrology has reported 2023 the wettest July-December period since records began in 1890. Ground water levels were reaching their highest ever recorded levels locally, reported the government's Environment Agency (EA) who are responsible for monitoring both groundwater and river levels. All the stores for water are full, river, surface and groundwater stores, no trees, no evaporation and still it rains! So, water everywhere, including underground.

Ground water? This is water from rain that is soaked up by the rocks and the ground like a sponge. Underground it travels to the rivers and then flows away. Since 2013 the Chilbolton Flood Advisory Group (FAG, see below) has been recording ground water levels monthly at a local dip for the Environment Agency. We saw the highest ground water levels ever in December 2023. When these underground stores are full, there is nowhere for the water to go, so it appears at the surface, through floors, along the roads, into holes in the sewage pipes underground filling them up so the sewage pumping plant (designed primarily to handle solid waste) can't cope.

Rivers? In January 2024 every river in the area was so full they were overtopping their banks and despite a dry spell, the river levels just didn't fall as the ground water continued to feed them.

And in Chilbolton.....?

Tankers? Southern Water (SW) used three tankers an hour in December and January to pump ground water surpluses away from SW's main sewage pumping station. SW paid for them to ensure sewage did not back up into people's homes through the drains or pour out onto the street and into people's gardens. The tankering lowered the ground water levels near the main Chilbolton Sewage Pumping station significantly and averted the threat there. Many local villages are the same. But tankers are 24/7, noisy, disruptive and expensive in manpower and energy. The alternative?

Overpumping. A bland term for discharging the water that is flooding the sewage pumping station into the River Test. It is piped through filtration tanks and regularly changed filter bags into the Abbotts stream and under the Sleeper bridge on the Common.

This is very strictly controlled by the EA. A long-term Infiltration Reduction Plan (IRP) has to be produced by SW, and agreed by the EA. This was done by SW in 2018 and has been regularly reviewed. Overpumping cannot happen until the ground water in specified EA boreholes reaches a certain level. This level was triggered in October 2023. Despite permission, SW then delayed overpumping and continuing tankering. As ground water levels slowly fell SW announced that overpumping would not be needed and the pumps etc were removed; tankering continues.

The decision to overpump is not the Chilbolton Parish Council's or FAG's, it is solely in the hands of SW and the EA. We liaise but have to accept their assurance that minimal pollution will occur. Natural England, who oversee the Common SSSI, are also aware.

The Flood Advisory Group (FAG) was set up in 2002 to advise Chilbolton Parish Council on water issues and to ensure that they are well informed and that the village is as resilient as practically possible to both ground water and river floods. We bring in key personnel to advise. Brilliant members have been out digging out ditches, clearing drains, rodding our culverts, nagging the County to clear their culverts, liaising effectively with the Environment Agency, Southern Water and with local people at risk and, since 2013, monitoring ground water levels with monthly dips. Major decisions though, like overpumping, are regulated by Government Agencies and the water companies. A letter from the President

In 2014, when the Home Guard Club reopened, I was proud to have been elected Chairman. At the time I said that I would stand for five years, if the membership wanted me to. Enormous thanks go to all of the villagers and others, who rallied round to keep the Club open by becoming members.

In order to ensure that the Club stayed in the hands of those members of five years continuous standing, we re-wrote the constitution and set the annual membership fee at £15.00. There were also small fees for welcomed guests to enjoy the bar and any events, such as bingo evenings, the Sunday quiz, game shows, gin nights, televised sporting events on the big screen or hiring the hall for a family get-together.

The Club bar is always well stocked with a wide variety of bottled beers and spirits, as well as tea and coffee. The staffing of the bar and the committee has been completely voluntary and my sincere thanks go all those volunteers who have willingly donated their time. Without them we would not have a Club.

Unlike some villages, Wherwell is very lucky to have a sports pavilion, village hall and a pub. Our Home Guard Club aims to compliment these other facilities and we are proud to serve the community by offering a place to meet others at a time when it seems that people can easily become isolated and lonely.

The membership subscriptions, and the income from the bar, have enabled us to improve the building and maintain its interior. Recently we have installed a kitchen and repaired soffits, fascias and gutters. At the AGM in 2023 it was decided to increase the annual membership fee to £20.00. At just 39p per week this is enormously good value.

For those who rarely come to the Club we encourage you to drop in at any time. We are open four nights a week (Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday) with a monthly Sunday Quiz. Why not come and give us a try?

On my retirement as Chairman I was asked to become the Club President. This is a great honour that I have been proud to accept. Sandie Bastable has taken over as Chairperson and is doing a wonderful job.

In closing, I would like to thank the membership for their support for the Club, it's Chairman and it's Committee. I especially want to thank those who have served on the Committee since the relaunch and those who have been members for much longer.

Wherwell Parish Council Report from the meeting held on 9thth Jan 2024

The Parish Council met in the Colonel Jenkins Memorial Hall, one member of the public in attendance.

The minutes of the November meeting were agreed & signed.

Matters arising included:

- 1. using the Playing Fields Pavilion as an emergency hub now the emergency generator is in situ and wired, and
- 2. Cllrs Young and Newell taking on responsibility for developing better communications with local residents, including updating the PC website, and developing a new residents communications pack,

Finances were presented by the Responsible Finance Officer. The PC signed a cheque due and discussed the ongoing problems in setting up an online bank account. After discussing the cost pressure faced by the PC (particularly a £1,000+ increase in insurance costs) Cllrs agreed to increase the precept for 2024/25 by £1,000 to £10,500. This would represent an increase of less than £4.00 per band D equivalent household. The PC then discussed and approved S137 grants to be awarded form the 24/25 budget.

Various **Assets of Community Value** were registered with TVBC in November 2018. These all lapsed after 5 years in November 2023. The PC were concerned about the White Lion being put up for sale by Punch Taverns as soon as the listing had lapsed, it was recognized that a listing as an Asset of Community Value would have some worth in helping to maintain community assets within the village. It was therefore agreed that applications should be renewed to TVBC for The White Lion, the church, and the Home Guards Club.

Regarding planning

- 1. The PC were informed of planning applications that have been approved by TVBC including a greenhouse and garden barn at Freelands, and various tree works
- 2. They noted the applications pending decision by TVBC that are approved by the PC for Installation of a ground mounted solar array at Abbey Oak and a single storey rear extension at The Coach House, Fullerton Road

3. They noted that the application for a solar farm has been delayed pending request for further information from the applicant, particularly in respect of landscaping and views. Cllrs discussed and agreed not to pay for legal advice concerning a potential contract for a community benefit fund, but would have informal discussions with a local lawyer.

Reporting on **Special projects and Cllrs portfolios**:

There were no further reports on special projects, and District Cllr Drew was unable to attend to present his usual briefing on TVBC and HCC matters.

The next scheduled meeting will be on Tuesday 12th March at the new regular time of 6:30 pm, to which local residents are welcome to attend and bring any comments or concerns.

Chilbolton Parish Council

We all have a busy month ahead of us and all residents are requested to respond to the **3 surveys** delivered with this magazine by the **26th March** so that we can incorporate the results with the parish council responses. There will also be a public meeting. Please return the housing needs survey to TV in the envelope provided and the others to the drop off box in the shop as indicated.

Threatened Pumping into the River Test

Everyone was very concerned about the excessive flow of water and effluent and the need for 24-hour removal by tankers. Southern Water could have legally started pumping directly into the river through filters when acquifer levels rose to the highest level recorded in October in terms of an agreement with the Environment Agency. Acquifer levels are now receding.

The Parish Council objected strongly at the contemplated discharge onto our SSSI Common and the unique River Test.

Regular contact with Southern Water by our Flood Advisory Committee avoided any pumping but when Southern Water delivered a large pump unit and pipes onto Grindstone Green the objections were also taken up by river keepers, owners of fishing rights and politicians with extensive media coverage.

This led to a statement by Southern Water:

"We are not, and will not be, using the pipes set up to pump into the Test. At the moment tankers are taking excess flows away for normal treatment. This plan would only have been implemented in extremis as an absolute last resort to prevent flooding within homes, schools and businesses because groundwater levels are exceptionally high and overloading the system. We have no current plans to initiate this, but we were testing our preparedness. It was last used during floods about three years ago and would operate for as short a period as possible.

Releasing highly diluted waste water into a watercourse like this is something we do everything in our power to avoid -- but the alternative might have meant homes suffering internal flooding."

1. Housing Need Survey

Parishioners are asked to complete a new housing need survey to update the housing need before moving ahead with the planned build of 10 affordable and 10 downsize homes. We need to be sure that the needs have not changed and that the homes are still needed.

This survey will be independently analysed by Test Valley Borough Council who will issue a report.

2. Reg. 18 Consultation on draft 2040 Local Plan

The first full draft of the Local Plan 2040 (Reg 18, Stage 2) is out for public consultation with a closing date of 2^{nd} April.

The papers are available on the Test Valley Borough Council (TVBC) website. The Local Plan will set out the TVBC proposals for housing, settlement boundaries and planning policy in the borough and the parish council will be making a formal response to matters that concern us. Any resident can respond directly.

3. <u>Referendum on removal of part of Test Valley Farm (TVF) from the</u> settlement boundary.

The proposed settlement boundary methodology in the TVBC 2040 Draft Local plan includes removal from settlement boundaries of non-developed land that has a closer functional relationship with the adjoining countryside including open space, recreation grounds, allotments, school playing fields and farm complexes.

The TVF land included in the settlement boundary is heavily wooded and partly a grazing field with a derelict building. It is separated from houses on the Southern part of Chilbolton by a public footpath and mature woodland only accessible by a narrow farm lane that follows an indirect route and is isolated from village facilities. It bears no relationship to Chilbolton village and certainly could not be said to relate to the built form of the settlement.

TVF most certainly does relate better to the countryside and it is part of an earlier farm complex. There is overwhelming objection by parishioners to development on TVF and so far development has been refused on this land although a planning application for 4 houses awaits decision.

The referendum is to provide evidence of public support to request the removal of TVF from the settlement boundary.

Please complete these questionnaires and referendum because a large response provides necessary evidence to support the Parish response and prioritises projects should funding become available.

Closing date is 27th March.

White Knight rescues White Lion

2023 was a strange year for Wherwell's beloved, if not particularly well frequented pub. After ten years of relative torpor, in which trade dwindled, especially after successive lockdowns, the pub's enforced closure in late 2022 heralded an uncertain future, with the permanent loss of a 400-year-old institution a distinct possibility. Then along came Jane and Rachel, with their welcome enthusiasm and plans to negotiate a lease with Punch Taverns, the freeholder. All of a sudden, we wondered if a new era beckoned. The village responded eagerly to the new landladies' menu ideas and regular quiz and theme nights. It seemed as though a long-term agreement with Punch was on the cards, bringing with it the promise of



serious capital injection to improve the tired facilities. Sadly, however, it appears that the long period of underinvestment in the pub's infrastructure was just too much for a workable agreement to materialise.

Then came the news in December 2023 that the pub was up for sale with Savills. The village panic button was well and truly pressed - steam emerging from the village WhatsApp as it went into overdrive. The talk turned to how the pub could be saved from the hands of greedy developers who would turn it into residential property, with a car park full of flats. So, there was a mixture of apprehension and curiosity in January, when news dropped of the pub's purchase by John Dodd, the new owner of Wherwell Priory. With an almost immediate announcement that the pub was to be closed in late January, the magazine politely asked for an interview with Mr Dodd, which he very kindly granted.

Why buy your local pub?

It may come as a surprise to readers that Mr. Dodd has previous experience of pub renovation. (Continued)

As a part-Scotsman and recent resident of Glenogil in Scotland, he bought and modernised The Drovers, a

well-known pub in the village of Memus in Angus. The project was particularly popular with the local community and fishing fraternity on the nearby river South Esk. His motivation for buying the White Lion is similar - to preserve an asset for the community. He was familiar with the pub from friends who had visited it long ago and was keen to devote his resource to maintaining the vibrancy of what he describes as Hampshire's most beautiful village.

Why did the pub need to close?

A quick tour of the building reveals its extremely poor condition. Everyone knows how bad the loos are. Add to that the parlous state of the kitchen, cellar and accommodation, along with a leaking roof, disintegrating gutters and downpipes, and it is easy to see that huge investment is needed to restore the pub to a safe, hygienic and tradeable condition. And that's before you consider the poor state of the 'patio', the sorry look of the Lion's Den and, of course, the derelict barn.

Anyone who has used the pub would agree that a purely cosmetic treatment falls well short of what is necessary to attract customers from a decent radius. Repeat business is essential to supplement the volume of trade that a small village like Wherwell can provide on its own. And yet it is hard to imagine that many outsiders who visited the pub over the last twelve months would consider returning, given the very strong competition in the area. A lengthy period of closure is therefore to be expected, but with updates to be provided as the work progresses.

What happens next?

Within an hour of completing the purchase on 12th February, a team of six chaps were working to clear the building of rubbish, broken fittings and anything that a posed an immediate health risk. Mr Dodd has already engaged an architect and surveyor to draw up a plan for renovation and stabilisation, but in a building that is Grade II listed, the process of agreeing with the planning department what can and (Continued)

can't be done in terms of alterations and improvements may take a while. There will then follow the more enjoyable task of pulling together designs for the interior. Mr Dodd says it is too early to discuss how the bar will look and feel post renovation. The main objective is to turn the pub into a comfortable local serving traditional drinks and


food, with an emphasis on seasonal products. When asked whether there will be pies on the menu, Mr Dodd replies that "there will certainly be *a* pie, but not *nothing but pies*".

As for the letting rooms upstairs and the outbuildings, it is very much a case of seeing what the planners say and assessing viability. In terms of community use, Mr Dodd certainly wants the pub to be available for use by local groups and societies.

Good news for Wherwell?

After the uncertainty regarding the pub's future and frustration at what many see as a failure to tap into the White Lion's undoubted potential, there is no question that this is a very positive step in the right direction. The last twelve months have shown that there is great support in the village for a well-run pub serving quality nosh. Alongside renovating the pub, Mr. Dodd is also busy undertaking a huge refurbishment of The Priory, where he and his family hope to settle for the long term. He is a man with a lot on his plate.




